Varsity had a good workout yesterday afternoon, and the boys are getting in shape again for a hard game next Saturday.

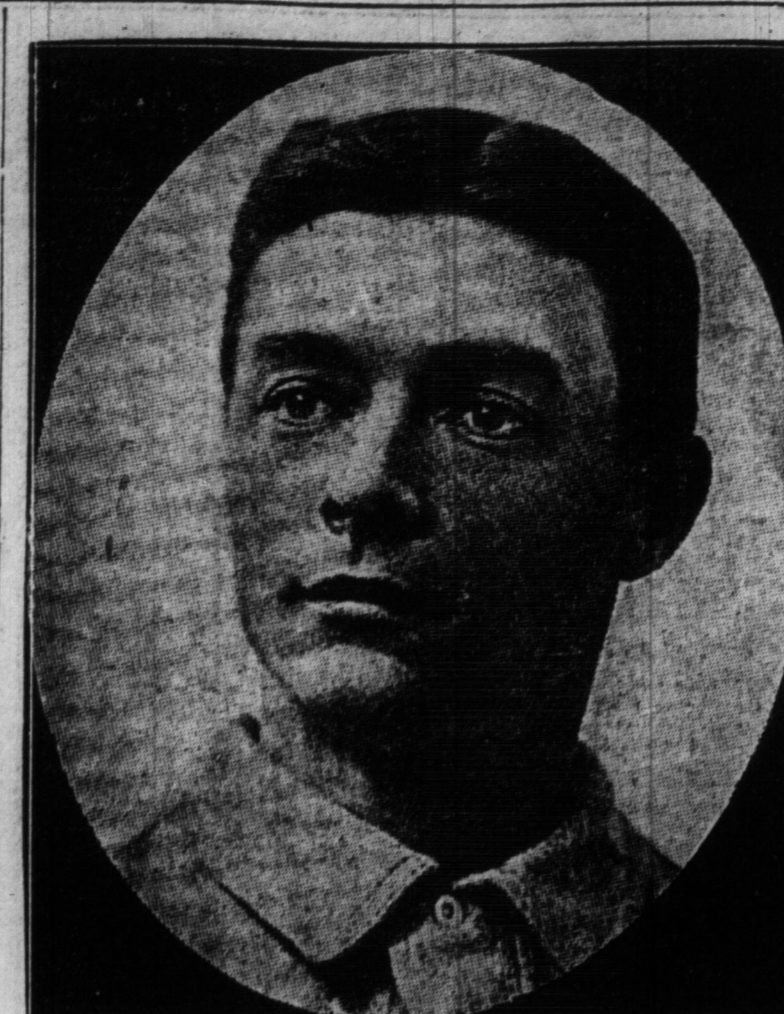

ONTARIO IS WITH BISHOP FALLON

Nobody in this province doubts the statement of Bishop Fallon in regard to the condition of education in the French parishes of Essex and Kent, in the diocese of London. The bishop has made out his case and nobody has been able to refute it. Under the circumstances it is the duty of the bishop not only to see that the wretched condition that educational affairs have fallen into in those counties is ended, but that steps are taken to have good schools based on English teaching put in the place of the present inefficient ones.

Again we say in the kindest spirit to the "blaybodies" in the Province of Quebec—"Attend to your own knitting, and devote any surplus energy to improving the education in your province." We will look after Ontario in good shape. We notice that one of the French papers is speaking very authoritatively about "the rights of our compatriots in the Province of Ontario." The chief right of any and every citizen in Ontario is to get an education, and this province will see that that right is vindicated.

PUBLIC OWNERSHIP AND CHEAP POWER.

There are still politicians in Ontario, who do not think it necessary to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth, and we fear it is not due to ignorance either. The Port Arthur Evening Chronicle published an article the other day under the caption "A Halfway Measure," which illustrates the survival of the barbarous methods of political incompetency. The proper way when an opponent does something good is to do something better, but The Evening Chronicle is still in the early stages of primitive statercraft.

The article contends that there are two classes of people opposed to the hydro-electric legislation: those who are opposed to all forms of public ownership, and those who demand that the principle shall be applied in its entirety. And The Chronicle declares that the power scheme is not truly a public ownership scheme because it provides for the payment of money into the coffers of a company. And it objects to the power legislation because, it declares, "the government has not developed one power yet."

Instead of praising the government for supporting the companies, with which it argues, the government should not compete, it censures the whole government policy. The object of the hydro-electric legislation was to bring cheap power to the people. The Whitney Government, by adopting the people's policy as formulated by a union of municipalities, has accomplished this. It has brought cheap power to the people, and its consequent competition will be effective in procuring cheaper power from the companies.

Bilingual Schools

Startling Statements As to a French Canadian Propaganda in Ontario.

From The Ottawa Citizen, Oct. 17: Sooner or later the English-speaking people of Ontario were due to awaken to a realization of the French-Canadian propaganda in this province. Of course French-Canadians, as well as any other variety of Canadians, have a perfect right to move about as they please, either within or without the Dominion. But the French-Canadian movement into Ontario is on the extension of the French language, manners and customs into this province as a means of acquiring greater power politically and otherwise.

Not only this, but the movement has extended into eastern Ontario, and within the past year attention has been forcibly drawn to the manner in which the school laws of Ontario are being quietly but firmly set aside. The charges made in that connection being sufficiently startling, but do not appear to have had the effect of any remedial measures up to the present time.

Finally we are informed on irrefutable authority that even in a western county of the Ontario peninsula French influence has acquired such a hold upon the schools of this English province that it is actually possible that young Canadians in the County of Essex are prevented from learning the English language, and grow up on this continent with the population of 100,000 English-speaking people, handicapped by inability to speak or understand that language.

A despatch on another page of The Citizen, outlining the position of Rev. Bishop Fallon on the bilingual school question, mentions that the facts to be brought to light will open the eyes of the provincial press and the people of Ontario generally. The Citizen believes that if the facts are brought out they will certainly open the eyes of the people of central and western Ontario and Bishop Fallon, whose experience in western Ontario thoroughly qualifies him to discuss the question with authority, is well equipped for the task of being the first to bring the charge of being "down on the French" because he has the courage to make a stand against the quiet, systematic policy of encroachment which has been in progress for some years past.

There is also an immediate and instructive lesson for the government of Ontario in the strength and ramifications of this movement in some of the bilingual schools of Essex. Evidently knowing what was to be expected of Bishop Fallon's high sense of duty those interested in the French propaganda took alarm from the moment he was appointed to the Diocese of London, and a certain section of the French-Canadian press immediately developed a remarkable interest in the bilingual schools of Essex. Articles and articles were published containing erroneous statements regarding Bishop Fallon, subtly calculated to lay a basis for charges of prejudice against the French-Canadians. Every child shall be educated to speak and write the English language and shall not have its future handicapped by being turned out upon the world unable to speak and write the language of this country and of this continent, which is besides the language most generally spoken thruout the whole world.

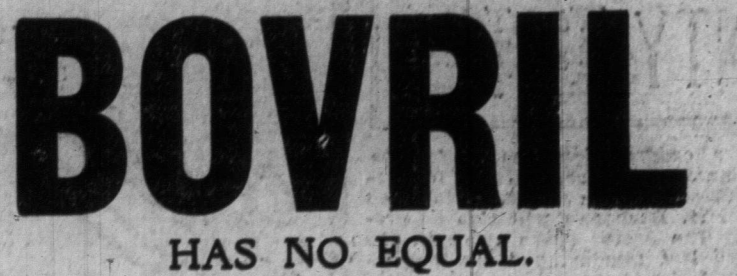

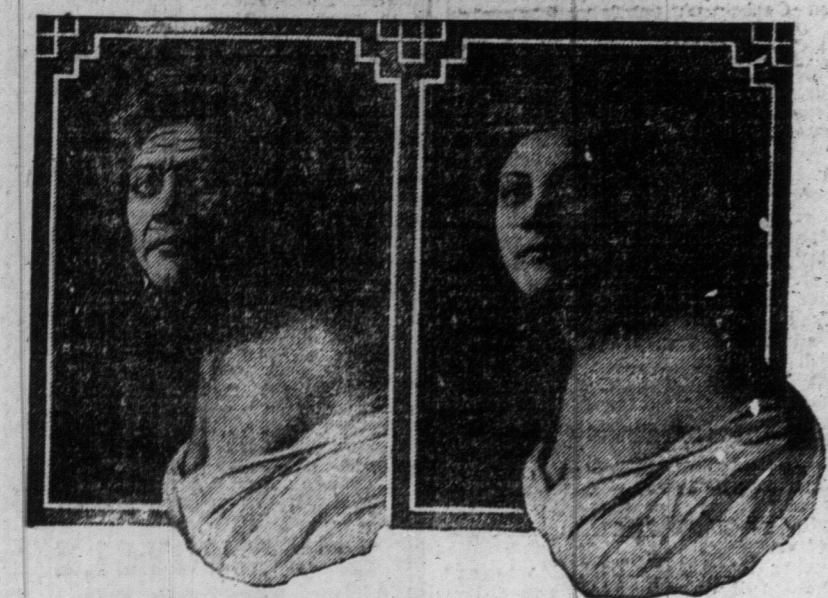

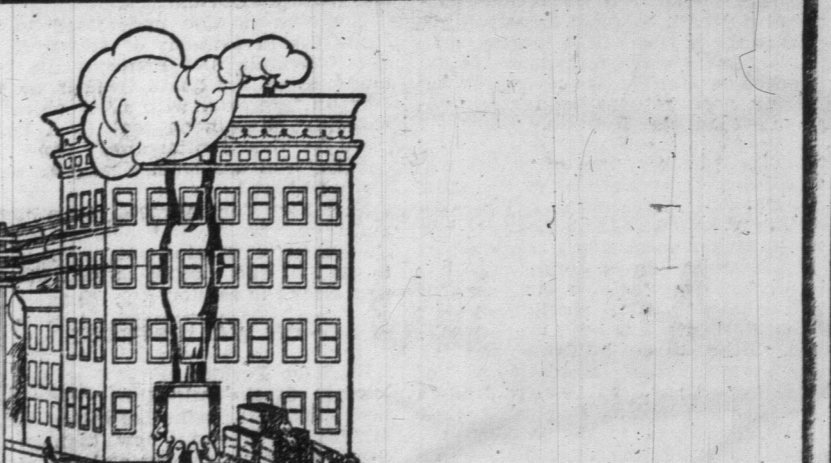

Railway News.

Great preparations are being made at the Don for the new high level passenger bridge, for which the railway commissioners have decided the city must pay the chief cost. The present bridge is now jacked up, and a temporary foundation will be laid in the river a few yards to the south, on which it will rest during the construction of the new bridge. It is expected that the operation of moving from one foundation to the other can be accomplished in a single night, track connections and all, so that there need be no stoppage of the street car traffic. Temporary tracks are now being laid from King and Queen-streets, on both sides of the river, and work has begun on the massive concrete abutments of the new bridge, on the west side of the river in the V-shaped territory formed by the junction of the two streets. The bridge improvement seems to have had a stimulating effect on business and real estate in the district, as a number of new buildings are being rushed to completion on both streets. James Murdoch, vice-president of the Brotherhood of Trainmen; S. N. Berry, of the Conductors' Association, and several other officials of the local railway organizations, went yesterday to Buffalo to attend the national convention, which is being held there this week. David Brown, who was appointed passenger yardmaster of the Grand Trunk at the time the strike was settled, has left the service of the company, being replaced by R. M. Mulrhead of the freight office. It is alleged that Mr. Brown was summarily dismissed for having shown favoritism to the old employees. The Grand Trunk Railway has completed arrangements for the transportation of several of the regiments to the scene of the sham battle along the Credit River on October 21. These regiments, which will be conveyed in special trains, are: the 16th of St. Catharines, 250 strong; the 38th of Brantford, 350; the 91st of Hamilton, 450; and the 13th of Hamilton, 450. A train of cavalry horses and about 100 men will also be sent from Toronto. The Toronto garrison representatives, whose headquarters will be near Lambton, are to be shipped via the C.P.R. G. T. Bell, assistant passenger traffic manager of the Grand Trunk, arrived in the city yesterday from Montreal, and spent the day looking over the Toronto passenger terminal. He was much pleased with the satisfactory state of local affairs, and left later for Buffalo and New York, to inspect the passenger departments there. Three orders were yesterday granted to the Grand Trunk at Osgoode Hall for immediate possession of three properties in Parkdale, on the land required by the railway in connection with their work of depressing and enlarging the right-of-way. The properties belong to Arthur M. Cowie, Empire-Street; R. J. McConochie, 1489 West King-street; and Maximilian Xerox, Dowling-avenue. Differences of opinion exist in each case as to the values of the properties, and the subject of arbitration will be discussed on Friday. A meeting of the Central Railway and Engineering Club of Canada was held last night in the Prince George Hotel. George Baldwin, first vice-president, occupied the chair, and a very instructive address was given by A. B. Hackett of Montreal, on the subject of signaling devices, as used by various railways on the continent, and the advisability of their use on the lines between Toronto and Montreal. About 100 members were present. The C.P.R. management in Montreal has authorized the installation of two new telephone train-dispatching systems, from Toronto to London, 115 miles, and London to St. Mary's, 114 miles. This will make a total of 230 miles operated entirely by phone, and satisfaction has been obtained from the present installation that it is expected that it will be only a matter of a short time before the whole C.P.R. system is so equipped. LISBON, Oct. 18.—The government of Portugal today issued a decree prescribing the Brazuca family to the position of an exiled house. Concerning the property in Portugal, owned personally by King Manuel and others of the royal family, the decree states that the matter would be settled as soon as possible. The government promises that the legitimate rights of the exiled royal family will be respected.

NO SIGNS OF SPIRITED TRADING. World Office. Tuesday Evening, Oct. 18. The reactionary character of the speculative end of the local market noted in yesterday's comment was carried still further to-day, although in some instances mere fractional rallies might be interpreted as an evidence of strength. The day's transactions were small and lacked altogether the spirit of a few days ago. The weak feature of the exchange was Porto Rico, which fell off two points further on selling induced by the announcement of an increase in the preferred capital of the company. The one satisfactory element in the market is the small amount of stock which is being offered, and because of this the declines are not likely to be carried to any material length.

Upward Trend is Renewed After Early Price Reaction

New York Market Shows Good Resisting Power When Liquidation is Forthcoming. World Office. Tuesday Evening, Oct. 18. Speculative business fell off considerably at the Toronto Stock Exchange to-day, and with the decline in the volume of transactions there was also a recession in the leading speculative securities. The action of the local market was unexplainable, as it was thought that the extreme buoyancy on Wall Street would assist, rather than retard, speculation in domestic stocks. Rio, Porto Rico, Mackay, and Twin City showed heaviness in the day's dealings, and ended with the exception of Mackay, with a loss from last night's quotations. The active upward movement in C. P. R. had no special interest for this market, although a few shares were traded in it. Dominion Steel Corporation shares were decidedly weak with sales below 60, a decline of nearly two points. There was a cessation in the investment demand to-day and taken together the market was not of the strongest character. WALL STREET POINTERS. American stocks in London heavy below parity. 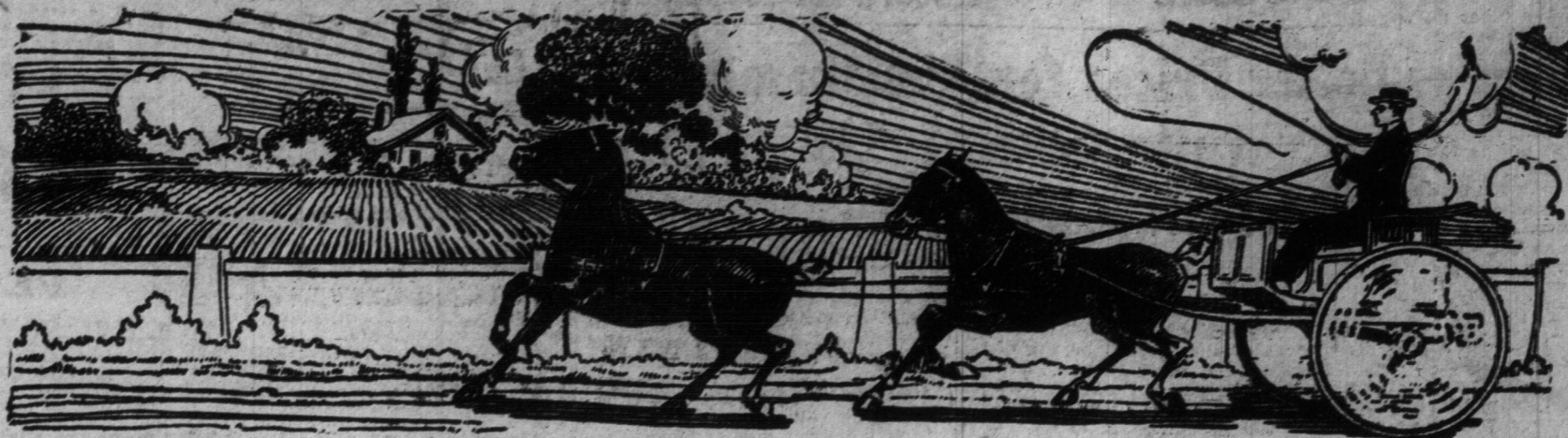
