ARCHBISHOP McEVAY DIED AT EARLY HOUR THIS MORNING

Distinguished Prelate Had Been Seriously Ill for a Year Past—Was a Native of Lindsay—Translated from Diocese of London in 1908—Of Striking and Dignified Personality.

After an illness of more than a year, Most Rev. Fergus Patrick McEvay, Archbishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Toronto, passed away peacefully at 12.25 o'clock this morning at the palace, 510 Sherbourne-street. Those present when the end came were his nephew, Father McGuire, Rev. Father Burke, editor of The Catholic Register and Extension; Father Kidd, Father Whelan, Dr. R. J. Dwyer and a number of sisters of the church.

Toronto, The Canadian Northern, and Transcontinental Services.

The Laurier government has introduced legislation to guarantee the bond of a detour Northern from Montreal to Port Arthur, thus making provision for the completion of their line from Montreal to the Atlantic Ocean.

The people of Toronto, therefore, would like especially to see this portion of the system rapidly completed, as it will be of immediate service to Toronto, and ultimately to the whole eastern portion of Canada.

The World, therefore, trusts that the management of the road will be in a position to rush this portion of construction, both on account of the railway's own interests, on account of the interests of Southern Ontario, and, most of all, on account of the interests of New Ontario, which will receive a fresh impetus in the way of settlement and development of her natural resources by the establishment of railway communication thru the great city belt.

In this connection, all the indications go to show that North Toronto will be the centre of the transcontinental passenger business in and out of this city. The Canadian Northern are to-day busy joining their Parry Sound line and their Toronto-Ottawa line (which will be running in a few weeks) with a short cut-off from a point one mile this side of Duanean (11 miles from the Union Station), to a point in Scarborough two miles east of the York and Scarborough town line.

From all of which it follows that the absolute essential to the railroad passenger business going to North Toronto is a municipal-owned passenger service in the form of a tube under Yonge-street from Union Station to a point north of St. Clair-avenue on Upper Yonge-street.

Mr. D. McNicoll, vice-president of the C. P. R., left Montreal last night to be at Victoria Harbor to-day. He will be in Toronto to-morrow, and Friday in connection with the various Canadian Pacific improvements and policy in this locality and province.

PRESBYTERIAN SYNOOD ELECTS NEW MODERATOR

Rev. Dr. Fraser, Pioneer Medical Missionary to Formosa, Honored—Financial Statement.

Rev. Dr. Fraser, clerk of the Presbytery of Owen Sound, was elected moderator, by acclamation, at the meeting of the synod of Toronto and Kingston at St. James-square Church last night.

The new moderator of the synod is a brother of Rev. Dr. Fraser, of the Presbyterian publications, Toronto. He was in early manhood an associate of Rev. Dr. McKay, as medical missionary in Formosa. Returning to Ontario Rev. Dr. Fraser became minister at Annapolis, Owen Sound Presbytery, where he has been for 27 years.

In assuming office Dr. Fraser expressed the hope the synod would exhibit the unity of the spirit and the bond of peace.

Rev. Dr. Turnbull, retiring moderator, delivered an impressive sermon from the text, "I am the good shepherd." John 10: 11.

R. C. Jennings, treasurer, reported total receipts of the year at \$112,446, which, with last year's balance, made a cash balance in hand of \$112,112. This will, however, be largely expended in the expenses of the synod and the necessary printing for the year.

In addition to the usual synod business a banquet will be held in the church parlors this evening, followed by a meeting of the synod in the Royal Alexandra Theatre.

RAILROAD TELEGRAPHERS PROSPER. An unparalleled year of progress and prosperity has been the lot of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers, as shown in the reports given at yesterday's session.

In the last two years the organization has made and revised 113 schedules, and these amendments have given its members over \$2,000,000 increase of wages.

The purchase of 127 feet 6 inches square of land in the most important downtown district of St. Louis, cost \$51,000, and already is worth \$75,000 to \$100,000. On this is to be erected an office building fifteen or sixteen stories in height, and let for office purposes, besides being headquarters for the order. It will cost about \$600,000.

The evening was given up to pleasure, the delegates being entertained at the Royal Alexandra Theatre.

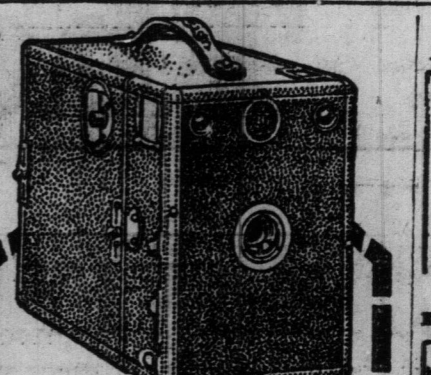

Yesterday evening a number were turned away from the Queen's and were only able to procure rooms at the King Edward at a late hour. There are seven hundred members of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers in the city attending the annual convention. This is the first occasion on which the convention has met in Toronto. It will probably meet in San Francisco in 1912.

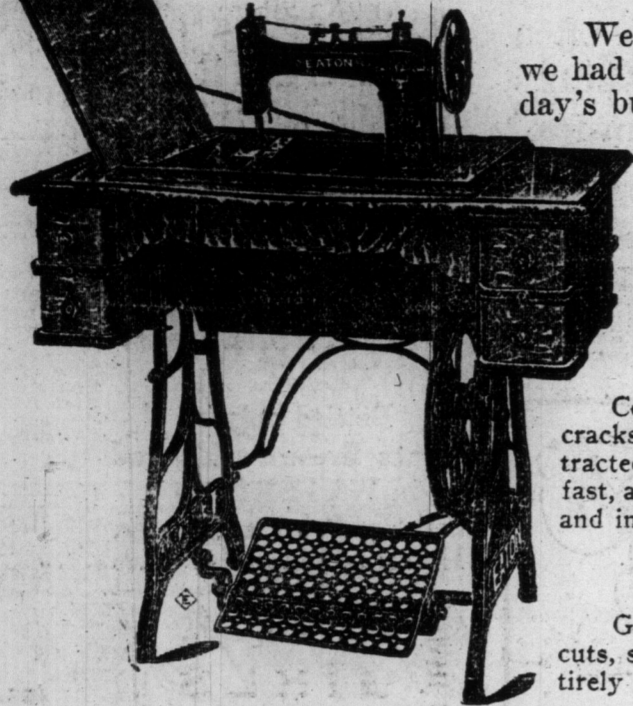

CHANCELLOR M'KAY TO GET \$5000 A YEAR

Special Committee Unanimous in Recommendation—Central Building Plan is Favored.

The advisory industrial committee, working on technical education, under the board of education, yesterday unanimously endorsed the recommendation of the sub-committee that Chancellor A. C. McKay of McMaster University be appointed to the principalship of the new technical school. Although it had been announced that the initial salary would be \$4000 a year, it was the unanimous opinion of the committee that for a man of Dr. McKay's calibre \$5000 was more to be expected, and they will recommend to that effect.

Forty of them gathered at the board of control meeting yesterday, and asked for the appointment of a fair wage officer to see that these contractors paid the men the union rate.

BOARD WENT TOO FAR

City, While Resentful, Will Furnish Information on Car Lines Demanded. City officials have waxed warm over the report of the Ontario Railway Board relating to the civic car lines issue on Monday. One and all claim that the board has gone too far, and that their powers in dispensing their approval to new railway enterprises changed not whether it be to a private corporation or to a municipality. The mayor and the board of control point out that the civic car line scheme is not necessarily one for civic profits, but only that citizens in outlying parts of the city may not have excessively long walks to the car lines. After a private conference it was stated by the mayor that the estimates of the lines had been received and gone over, and that they would be examined by the board of control again today. These estimates include the construction cost of five different lines. It was thought would reduce the cost of operation, but they were not finally decided upon. Mayor Gesty declared that, as the railway board had not finally decided upon the matter, these mere complete plans and estimates would go back to them again, probably by today or tomorrow. "Altogether it looks as if the railway board would get what they asked for without any trouble."

5000 FISHERMEN STARVING

Relief Party Will Endeavor to Reach Battle Harbor, Labrador. ST. JOHN'S, N.F., May 9.—To-day's information from Battle Harbor, Labrador, that the 5000 inhabitants of the coast are starving was not wholly surprising to people here. It has been long known that a food shortage threatened the hardy fishers, and repeated efforts have been made to carry help to them. Vessels laden with supplies of food and clothing endeavored repeatedly to pierce the ice fields which enclosed the Labrador coast, but were always forced back, some times badly damaged. It is expected that the relief party organized here will be able soon to make its way to Battle Harbor, as the ice has broken up and is drifting south with the advancing spring.

\$30,000,000 LOAN TO CHINA FOR RAILWAYS

Authorized by Imperial Edict—Viceroy Exhorted to Abolish Opium Expenditure.

PEKIN, May 9.—An Imperial edict issued to-day authorizes the conclusion of the Hukwang loan of \$30,000,000 for railroad construction in Central China. The loan was signed a year ago this month by groups of financiers representing Great Britain, the United States, France and Germany. Despite provincial opposition the amount of the loan to the Chinese Government remains at \$30,000,000, and notwithstanding the elimination of a branch section of the railway, the four groups of bankers will participate. Another edict exhorts the viceroy to abolish the production of opium expeditiously. Great Britain having consented by the Anglo-Chinese agreement signed yesterday to reduce the exportation of Indian opium to China as rapidly as the home growth is exterminated. The anti-opium societies are most active and as the country has been aroused it is believed the government will succeed in abolishing the production of the poppy within a few years. The important edicts of to-day are the one of yesterday which abolished the grand council, substituting for it a constitutional cabinet of ten members, indicate that the government is assuming a responsibility which heretofore has lacked revolutionary evidence, and that the assembly's unadvised hostility has forced the government to lead or be led.

SUSPECTING THE CENSUS.

Taking the census appears to be an appalling business to some people, especially our foreign brethren, who associate all counting of noses with subsequent visitations of the tax collector. Much good will be done by those who understand the situation taking the trouble to explain to others less familiar with civilized methods, that the census officers have nothing to do with the tax department, nor even with the authority that levies taxes.

The census is needed in modern civilization, so far as taxes are involved at all, chiefly for the purpose of lowering taxes rather than raising them. If it were not known with some degree of accuracy how many people there were in the country, a much greater revenue than necessary would probably be raised.

The representation of the people in parliament is determined by the census returns and much assistance is given to trade and commerce and financial interests in general by a knowledge of the trend of population and the development of particular districts or cities.

So the census officer should be received with an open mind and a confiding heart. He is sworn to secrecy, and will tell no one what he hears.

A NATURAL QUESTION.

A great many people on reading the papers of yesterday morning asked if the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board was going crazy. But the document did not mean as much as it seemed to mean. We are still confident that Chairman Lettow would never dream of going behind the legislature and the people of Toronto to interfere with the building of city street car lines. It is the duty of the board to have sufficiently ample information to enable it to determine whether the lines are properly equipped, and capable of giving the passengers a comfortable and convenient service at a cost not exceeding two cents per mile. If there are any lines where these conditions do not prevail we believe it is not the fault of the board, but of officials or the public, who neglect to report the grievances.

But beyond this the board would not go. It is true that the by-law implies the submission to the board of the terms on which the lines should be built. And it is true that the Toronto Railway Co. and the electrical corporation interests would interpret that to mean that the board should handicap the city's enterprise that it could not do what it proposes to do—what the citizens propose to do for themselves—furnish a street car service outside the former city limits.

There is a gratuitous paragraph at the end of the board's judgment, which says:

"It is not necessary yet for the board to determine whether or not the scheme should be approved. If it becomes clear to the board that it will unquestionably turn out a financial failure."

It was after reading this that the people asked if the board had gone crazy. But it was only the board's little way. It sounds dignified and potential. There were people who said that the hydro-electric power scheme would "unquestionably" turn out a financial failure, and they got engineers to write letters to prove it. The railway board will not consult any such authorities concerning the new city railway lines. It will see that they are well and truly built, and it will be wise enough to restrict its interest to that point.

We are quite confident that the railway board is not crazy.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE IN BRITAIN.

On Friday last the British House of Commons passed the second reading of the modified woman suffrage bill on the motion of Sir George Kemp by 255 to 157 votes, a majority of 157. In July of last year the motion to reject the bill then before the house was defeated by 228 votes to 196, a majority of 109. The cause evidently is making rapid progress in the United Kingdom and the new bill will undoubtedly go to the lords if the government afford facilities for its consideration in committee. Last year's measure was of a somewhat complicated character and Mr. Lloyd George considered it so badly drafted as to be incapable of amendment and on that ground refused his support, though in favor of the principle. Facilities for its further progress were not afforded, but in November Mr. Asquith promised that if the government continued in power facilities would be afforded in the next

parliament for effectively proceeding with a bill if framed so as to permit of free amendment.

The text of the bill now under consideration is extremely short and simply provides that every woman possessed of a household qualification within the meaning of the present representation act shall be entitled to be registered as a voter subject to the proviso that a husband and wife shall not both be registered as voters in the same parliamentary borough or county division. This proviso, the accompanying memorandum explains, is designed to prevent a man with two alternative qualifications in the same constituency from creating a "fagot" vote for his wife. Illustrative statistics are submitted to show that the upper and middle class elements participate to the extent of 10.9 per cent and the working class element to the extent of 89.1 per cent of the women affected. During last autumn no less than 4229 public meetings were held in support of the measure. The only plausible reason the government can offer for refusing facilities is the understanding that extensions of the franchise must be followed by an early appeal to the country.

QUOTING TO SUIT.

The Evening Telegram may do what it pleases by partial quotation to misrepresent The World, but this only confirms what we have said about The Telegram's proclivity to split hairs over non-existent issues. Controller Church's objection to the "fad" advocated by Controller Spence was not based on any desire to save the time of the officials, but on his reluctance to be severed from the incessant meddling in all departments of city activity which the new plan would confine to one alone. The "superintendence" goes on now with this difference that five men "superintend" all the departments, whereas the "fad" would confine one man to one department. We said we did not hope for much from the plan, but it was at least a step in the direction of non-interference with competent officials, which The Telegram professes to cherish as a principle.

The Telegram is really never concerned with principles, but always with persons. At present it is Controller Church who is the favored element. There was a time when Controller Spence was the white angel, and before his time, the archangel Robert was the unfallen figure. We have no fault to find with The Telegram's plan of supporting men, rather than measures. But as before, we protest against misrepresentation. Why did The Telegram omit this paragraph in its quotation:

"The secret of good government is efficiency and freedom for the efficient and responsible officials from the interference and obstruction of incompetent persons with axes to grind."

The Star does not understand sarcasm.

PASTORAL ON MIXED MARRIAGES

OTTAWA, May 9.—On May 21 there will be read in all the Anglican churches in Canada a pastoral letter signed by Archbishop Matheson of Winnipeg, primate of all Canada, and Archbishop Hamilton of Ottawa, metropolitan of the ecclesiastical province of Canada, on the question of mixed marriages. The pastoral will deprecate the performance of these marriages, but say that when once performed they are indissoluble by the Church of Rome. The disbelief of the Anglican Church in divorce is also strongly brought out, and the clergy are prohibited from remarrying divorced persons during the life of the other party to the first marriage.

Another Murder Trial Will Commence at the Soo This Morning.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., May 9.—(Special)—Angelina Napolitana was found guilty at the assizes this afternoon of the murder of her husband on Easter Sunday. Judge Britton sentenced the prisoner to hang on Aug. 9. U. Trading in Mining Shares Falls Off — Prices Are Easier

Sluggish Trading Continues Stocks Do Not Move Much

Porcupine Stocks Irregular, Small Advances and Declines Show— Cobalts Show No Distinctive Trend.

The mining markets have apparently run into a period where stocks are not in any too urgent demand. This was due on general principles after the upward movement of the latter half of last week, however, and it should not be taken for granted that the disposition to realize on holdings will be long continued.

The market to-day showed no new indications, and could not be taken as either of a bullish or bearish frame of mind. Few changes in values were made, and even in the special instances where trading was heaviest, the list showed little disposition to respond to the buying or selling orders.

The Porcupine shares were sluggish, and outside of a few of the specialties gave little opportunity for comment. Rea was in somewhat better demand, and as offerings were more subdued, the stock was run up ten points to \$6.60 with little difficulty. Hollinger showed no such activity as has characterized the issue of late, and the dealings in the security fell off considerably. Cobalts were practically lifeless, and gave no indications of either strength or weakness, prices holding comparatively unchanged throughout the list.

FREE GOLD IN QUARTZ ON JUPITER PROPERTY

Recent Find Made Looks Good to Porcupine Engineers—Vein is Seven Feet Wide.

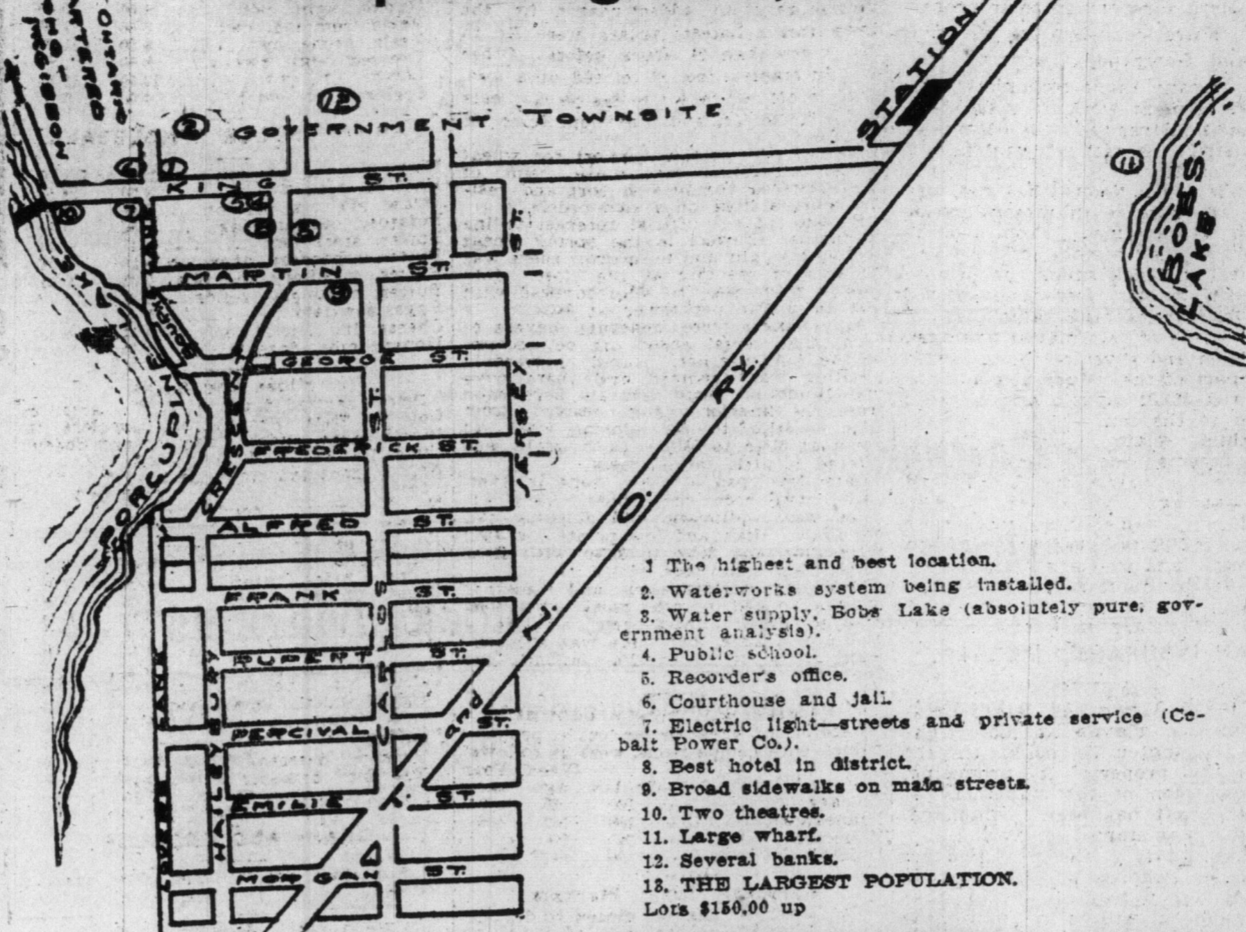
