HAMILTON HAPPENINGS IT'S STUDDOLME VS. SCOTT FOR SEAT IN LEGISLATURE

East Hamilton Nomination Meeting Rather Tame—Hon. Mr. Monteth Opens Poultry Show. Hamilton, Nov. 27.—(Special.)—The nomination proceedings for East Hamilton to-day were rather tame. The following were nominated: Allen Studdolme, labor candidate, by Walter R. Rollo and Charles G. Bird; John Peabody, agent.

Mr. Studdolme went for Mr. Scott, declaring that it was a corporation lawyer, and only wanted to go to the legislature to be on the inside for big contracts, etc. Mr. Scott, he said, was boasting about the Ontario Normal College, but he was not saying anything about the cheap labor imported from the United States.

Mr. Scott, said Mr. Studdolme, had stated that neither he nor his friends were in favor of the Ontario Normal College. "What about Mr. Southern of the Spectator?" enquired the speaker.

Mr. Studdolme also declared that Mr. Scott had helped to get the street railway an extension of its franchise, and had, therefore, extended the time in which the street railway could be taken over by the people from seven to 22 years. Mr. Scott denied that he had any part in this.

Mr. Scott, continued his labor man, boasting about the houses he has built for the working people. These were worth \$8 or \$8 a month, and were rented for \$1.50 a month.

FINED \$18,000.

American Sugar Refining Co. Penalties for Taking Rebates.

New York, Nov. 27.—A fine of \$18,000 was imposed upon the American Sugar Refining Co. by Judge Hugh in the United States circuit court today for accepting rebates from the New York Central Railroad Co.

The company was allowed 60 days to appeal the case. The rebates amounted to \$28,000.

It is understood that within a few weeks the United States Attorney Stinson will move for trial some of the pending rebate cases. The Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railway Co. on one of the companies against which indictments have been brought, and additional indictments are pending against the New York Central, the American Sugar Refining Co. of New York, and the American Sugar Refining Co. of New Jersey, and several individuals, including Vice-President Nathan Guilford of the New York Central.

It is also said that the federal grand jury will shortly resume the rebating inquiry, and that the carrying of commodities other than sugar to be included in the investigation.

Floods in Chinese District Destroy 40,000 Square Miles of Crops.

Shanghai, Nov. 27.—An international committee, composed of the consuls, missionaries and Chinese officials, has decided to appeal to Europe and America, to assist in relieving the distressed inhabitants of the Province of Kiang Su, where the floods have completely destroyed the crops in an area of over 40,000 square miles, resulting in ten million people being on the point of starvation.

RUSSIAN EDUCATION REFORM

M. Kauffman Submits His Plan—Abandons Old Policy.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 27.—The minister of education, M. Kauffman, has submitted to the cabinet a plan for the reform of the primary educational system of Russia, which, next to the agrarian reforms, is recognized as the gravest problem confronting the Russian Government.

The most important feature of the minister's proposals is one providing for the abandonment of the old policy, which, in accordance with the dictum of M. Pobedonostsev, ex-procurator-general of the holy synod, that education was synonymous with revolution, threw hindrances in the way of the efforts of the government and private persons to spread elementary knowledge among the ignorant masses of the Russian peasantry, and even imposed a veto on instruction being given in history and other similar branches of education.

M. Kauffman recommends instead that the centre of government support, materially and morally, all such efforts and assume the payment of minimum salaries to teachers in the popular schools opened by the zemstvos and other local administrations. As the greatest difficulty in the way of a speedy institution of general, obligatory elementary education is the lack of capable teachers, the minister proposes to enlarge, at the state's expense, the number of normal schools, and to increase the allowances made to the existing institutions.

In regard to the schools for the non-Russian population, the minister proposes to permit elementary education to be given to pupils in their mother tongue, on the condition that the teaching of Russian history and geography must be in Russian.

ON TRAIL OF THE N.A.T.

London, Nov. 27.—(C. A. P.)—C. H. Beddoe, accountant of the department of the interior at Ottawa, is here on his way to Amsterdam to investigate the affairs of the North Atlantic Trading Co., known as Taylor's Corners.

Game Commissioner's Meeting.

The Ontario game commission met yesterday, three members being present, H. S. Oeler, K.C., chairman; S. Buchanan, Windsor, and H. M. Graydon, London. The commission is an advisory body, and Hon. Dr. Reame, who was present, discussed with them details of the working of the game laws with a view to future amendments.

Preaches for the West.

London, Nov. 27.—(C. A. P.)—Archdeacon Lloyd, of the Colonial Continental Church Society, said "his own work was in the great Northwest Territory, which was the last country in the world where a new English-speaking nation was likely to arise. He did not intend to return to Canada; he had been agreed that 55 catechists and five clergymen will go back with him."

RUSSIAN EDUCATION REFORM

M. Kauffman Submits His Plan—Abandons Old Policy.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 27.—The minister of education, M. Kauffman, has submitted to the cabinet a plan for the reform of the primary educational system of Russia, which, next to the agrarian reforms, is recognized as the gravest problem confronting the Russian Government.

The most important feature of the minister's proposals is one providing for the abandonment of the old policy, which, in accordance with the dictum of M. Pobedonostsev, ex-procurator-general of the holy synod, that education was synonymous with revolution, threw hindrances in the way of the efforts of the government and private persons to spread elementary knowledge among the ignorant masses of the Russian peasantry, and even imposed a veto on instruction being given in history and other similar branches of education.

M. Kauffman recommends instead that the centre of government support, materially and morally, all such efforts and assume the payment of minimum salaries to teachers in the popular schools opened by the zemstvos and other local administrations. As the greatest difficulty in the way of a speedy institution of general, obligatory elementary education is the lack of capable teachers, the minister proposes to enlarge, at the state's expense, the number of normal schools, and to increase the allowances made to the existing institutions.

In regard to the schools for the non-Russian population, the minister proposes to permit elementary education to be given to pupils in their mother tongue, on the condition that the teaching of Russian history and geography must be in Russian.

London, Nov. 27.—(C. A. P.)—C. H. Beddoe, accountant of the department of the interior at Ottawa, is here on his way to Amsterdam to investigate the affairs of the North Atlantic Trading Co., known as Taylor's Corners.

## C.P.R. DIVIDES ONTARIO THREE DIVISIONS MADE

Why Superintendents Have Been Shuffled—Increase in Mileage the Cause.

The object of the C.P.R. in moving their superintendents around was made known at the Union Station yesterday. The company intend to divide the Ontario division into three districts. The first will be from Toronto east to Smith's Falls, the second from Toronto west to Windsor, and the third line north of Toronto. The first division will be in charge of J. R. Nelson, who is coming from North Bay, the second, in charge of Supt. C. Murphy, with headquarters at London, and the third will be supervised by A. L. Smith, present inspector of stations and despatchers of lines east of Port Arthur.

The object in dividing the Ontario division into three sections is the large increase in the mileage of the line, caused by the building of the Guelph & Goderich and the Sudbury line. A new accounting department will be necessary for the new division No. 3, and C. L. White, in the Union Station accounting department, has been slated for the post of superintendent.

A special meeting of the Eastern Canadian Passenger Agents' Association has been called for next Tuesday, Dec. 5. Several important matters will be discussed and arrangements made for the Toronto Board of Trade's excursion to the west next July.

R. Scott, C.P.R. agent at Woodstock, has been transferred to Chatham to succeed E. J. Downey. C.P.R. engine No. 300 blew out the joints of the air-pumps at Port Burwell while drawing a passenger train to St. Thomas. Another engine was sent from the Junction, and the disabled one sent to Woodstock.

The Canadian Freight Association has issued a supplement to No. 12 classification table. Several important reductions are contained in the supplement, and various changes in the rating of different articles.

Fourth Vice-President McGulgan and Roadmaster Ferguson, who arrived from London yesterday afternoon, where they were inspecting the work at that point. Roadmaster Ferguson stated that the company have hopes of running trains on a double track between London and Hyde Park by the first of the year. The grade at these points is being greatly reduced.

The time-table in connection with the opening of the Muskoka section of the C.P.R., Bolton to Gravenhurst, will be issued to-day. Two trains will leave Bolton daily, starting Dec. 1, one at 10.35 a.m. and one at 5.53 p.m.

The appointment of a trainmaster for the C.P.R. Sudbury line will shortly be made. Three men are named for the post: H. Collins, who is at present acting as trainmaster on the completed portion of the Guelph & Goderich; H. E. Swinerton, conductor, and A. C. Harshbarger, who is at present acting as trainmaster on the Muskoka section of the line.

The Grand Trunk ferry Ontario No. 1, which was to be launched at the Standard Building Company's yards on Dec. 1, will not be ready until the first week in January. Ontario No. 1 is the largest boat ever built in Toronto, and will be used by the Grand Trunk as a car ferry. The new boat is 320 feet long, 56 feet wide, and when loaded, will displace 15 feet of water. She will have a speed of fifteen miles an hour, being equipped with twin screw and expansion engines. The ferry will run from Charlotte to Port Hope and, probably, Cobourg, running winter and summer. The vessel will cost \$375,000.

### HAD \$70,000 PREPARED TO BUY PITTSBURGH COUNCIL

One Alderman is in Jail—Sensational Delivery of Money Package to Detectives.

Pittsburg, Nov. 27.—City Councilman W. A. Martin, charged with bribery in connection with the alleged tube city railroad franchise scandal, was arrested to-day and locked up with C. S. Cameron, president of the Tube City Railroad Co. Later the two men were released on furnishing \$10,000 bonds each. Superintendent of Police McQuade, who laid the information against Martin and Cameron, said the hearings in the case would probably be held on Saturday. Several members of both branches of the council are reported to be under surveillance by detectives and any attempt to leave the city will, it is said, be followed by immediate arrest.

It having been learned that the sum of \$70,000 was to be used to bribe aldermen, the matter was placed in the hands of several detective agencies, one of which received a telephone message asking that all proceedings be dropped and the money should be handed over. The detectives were told to present themselves in a certain office building at a stated hour. They did so and had barely entered the corridor when a door at the other end of a bare arm protruded itself and hurled a package into the room. The detectives ran to the door, but it was locked. The package contained the \$70,000. It is alleged to-day that \$40,000 of the \$70,000 which went astray and caused the trouble, was already being distributed among 69 councilmen.

The miscreants pleaded hard with the magistrate to be allowed to go, but were remanded. In the meantime their past is being looked into.

Perhaps owing to its much greater compactness and the consequent closer attention paid to the doings of parliament, which unites in itself the functions of both federal and provincial legislatures, it is undoubtedly that much greater attention is paid in the United Kingdom to the record of individual representatives than is the case either in the United States or in Canada.

There can be no excuse for any sort of secrecy in the work of the bureau. It is based on the belief that there is no reason why any detail of the legislative work of this republic should be kept hidden.

CONDITIONS IN CUBA.

Resolving Report by Chairman of Pan-American Conference.

New York, Nov. 27.—William I. Buchanan of Buffalo, ex-minister to Argentina, first minister to the Republic of Panama, and chairman of the United States delegation to the Pan-American conference at Rio Janeiro, arrived from Havana this afternoon on board the steamship Mexico.

Mr. Buchanan is largely interested in banking and other enterprises in Cuba. Questioned as to the truth of the reports which have prevailed in Havana, during his visit of a month in Cuba, he has been gathering impressions as to political conditions in the island, which are to be reported to the government at Washington, together with possible recommendations as to whether the elections promised the Cubans shall be held in the near future, or deferred until next June or later, Mr. Buchanan said:

"I do not wish to discuss the political conditions of Cuba, because I was not there on any such business as has been stated. I was there purely on private business. I will say that I think many of the reports of disturbed conditions in Cuba have been exaggerated. I know of nothing there now, except peaceful conditions, and these are particularly shown in the increase of business. The daily growth of the National Bank of Cuba, which has a dozen branches throughout the island, is to my mind a very good indication of this."

"OPEN SHOP" V. UNIONISM WHICH AIDS CITY GROWTH?

Citizens' Industrial Association of America Will Consider Important Questions.

Chicago, Nov. 27.—(Special).—A claim that American cities prosper more and make greater progress under more

petition of labor than with labor unions in control of industry is to be made for prosecution by the general government of a number of labor organizations as "conspirators" within the meaning of the Sherman Anti-Trust Law, has resulted in an announcement that noted advocates of the "open-shop" movement throughout the country will attend the convention, among them, C. W. Post, of Battle Creek, Mich., president of the association; J. W. Van Cleave of St. Louis, president of the National Association of Manufacturers; C. Neumecher of Louisville, leading exponent of the "open shop" in the south, and C. Marshall of Dayton, O., known as the "father of the employers' movement."

During the convention, Judge Peter S. Grosscup of the United States circuit court in Chicago, Prof. L. Laurence Laughlin, head of the political economy department of the University of Chicago, will make addresses.

Canadian representation at the convention will be stronger than since the organization of the association four years ago. There will be delegations from the Ontario Manufacturers' Association, the Employers' Association of Toronto and Winnipeg, and the Shippers' Association of Montreal. Besides this there will be represented the 800,000 members of the National Free Labor Association of Great Britain. W. Collinson of London, secretary of the British association, will make an address.

The convention is to open at the Auditorium Hotel on the morning of Dec. 3, and continue until the evening of Dec. 4, a banquet terminating the meeting the second day. Plans have been made at the hotel for accommodations for 700 delegates, besides those who will attend the convention as representatives of organizations in Chicago. These include the Chicago Chamber of Commerce, the Illinois Manufacturers' Association, and the Illinois Manufacturers' Association, as well as all those industrial associations connected with various industrial businesses in Chicago.

Among the 400 national and local organizations making up the convention body this year are a number whose work during the last few months has attracted particular attention. **ARSENIC IN THEIR FOODS.**

Mysterious Attempt to Poison a Whole Family.

Auburn, N.Y., Nov. 27.—After over a month's investigation by physicians and chemists it has been determined that the peculiar sickness in the family of William F. Wait is due to arsenical poisoning. Mr. Wait is still very ill at the City Hospital, and his son, Bryan, who recently graduated at Yale, is also confined here in a partially paralyzed condition. He has lost the use of his hands and legs, and physicians say he may not recover in years.  
Rev. Harvey Clements of Gloversville, a son-in-law, who recently spent a few days in the Wait household, was all ready to go abroad, but upon reaching New York City he contracted the malady and was ill for some time. Mrs. Wait was also desperately ill for several days. The servants in the household and the coachman were among the victims of the disease.

All symptoms pointed conclusively to arsenical poisoning, and as a last resort tests for arsenic were made. The results were called into the case, but the greatest secrecy was preserved. Analysis of sugar, flour, tea and other foodstuffs remaining in the house showed the presence of arsenic in sufficient quantities to produce death; indeed, it is supposed the victims were given over doses of horrible nausea followed meals, and this may have averted speedy death.

### T. & N. O. RY. EARNINGS.

For September They Totaled \$43,428, With Expenses \$31,810.

September earnings on the T. & N. O. were \$43,428, and the expenses \$31,810, leaving \$11,618 net earnings. The percentage of operating expenses is thus 73.03, about 20 per cent. above normal. This is due to a considerable amount which was charged to expense account, which might have been charged to capital. The money was spent in the elevation of curves and ballasting.

The total earnings for the year up till Sept. 30 were \$388,000, and the expenses \$242,788, leaving net \$145,212. Last year the net amount for the same period was \$71,342.

The train mileage for 1906 so far has been 23,344, as against 12,090 last year. Part of the increase comes from the extension of the road to Englehart.

The cost of advertising on a liberal scale for the fall fairs was included in the September expense account.

Judge Morson, while reserving judgment yesterday morning, expressed the opinion that it would be necessary to set aside the whole transaction first.

That Gold Discovery. W. McBean of Indian Head, Sask., is in the city, and says that the recent gold discoveries in Saskatchewan don't amount to much. There is gold in the sand, but in such small quantities as to be worthless for operating. Hundreds joined in the "rush" to the locality, which was about four hours run by train from Indian Head.

Veteran Got a Mine. Two veterans' land grant certificates, worth \$80 each, were the consideration for which Thomas Little secured a lot in Buckle Township next to the Green-Meehan property, which recently sold for \$200,000. The lot had been taken up under the Settlers' Act, which reserves minerals to the crown. Under the Veterans' Act the minerals go with the land to the veteran. About a dozen lawyers put it up to Hon. J. J. Foy yesterday to decide whether either act applied, and why, and how, and if the value of silver discovered on the lot would be valuable enough to appeal the case upon.

Back From the "New Cobalt." Hubert Southworth returned to Toronto yesterday morning, from the Temiscaming Reserve. He has been in the reserve near Lady Evelyn, where the recent finds have been made of cobalt and silver.

Mr. Southworth is reticent as to the value of the discoveries, but states that a great many claims have been staked. Russ Cryderman is another Cobalter who has been in that section and there is every indication that a richly mineralized stretch of country has been overlooked during the past season.

The weather was now unfavorable for prospecting, but where veins have been located development work can be done for some time. Native silver has been brought down the Montreal River, and the belief is firmly held that it came from near Lady Evelyn.

Cobalt is there in abundance, well defined veins having the same characteristics as the Cobalt camp, calcite and cobalt carrying silver vein.

The trip out was made by Mr. Southworth's party under difficulties. It lasted a week, and one of their party, Tom Macleod, from Latchford, nearly died with pneumonia.

An empty shack was found in which they remained for three days and nursed their sick comrade, who went into the bush a strong, husky fellow, weighing 175, but returned 50 pounds lighter. White Broke, were among the first to get in this "New Cobalt."

Another Strike. Cobalt, Nov. 27.—(Special.)—Another rich find was made on the McKinley-Darragh yesterday by Superintendent Macdonald.

In the drift at the 50-foot level a vein of cobalt richly impregnated was found. The vein runs over six inches in width, and the cobalt is held together by native silver, making it a solid mass of silver and cobalt, and has every appearance of being one of the rich veins of the camp.

MAY PROSECUTE STUDENTS FOR UNLAWFUL ASSEMBLY

Corporation Counsel Makes an Unexpected Move in Halloween Disturbance Enquiry.

The feature of the Halloween investigation before the police commissioners yesterday afternoon was the application made by Corporation Counsel Fullerton for authority to take up with the crown attorney the subject of arresting the students in the case for their conduct on the ground that they constituted an unlawful assembly. Several students and two policemen were examined.

Constable Christie, the university policeman, told of the attack of Police-ward on the Syrian, Eusef, and corroborated the evidence of the students, to the effect that no stones had been thrown. The case will proceed to-morrow afternoon at 10.30. Charles Eusef was recalled, and Mr. Fullerton read a letter from his employers, to the effect that he was at work on Nov. 27.

"You told us that you were not at work," said the corporation counsel. "Oh yes, you did. Now I want the truth this time. Did anyone point out Constable Ward to you before you gave your evidence? I have five witnesses to say that you were not at work, but witness positively denied that anyone had shown him the policeman who had hit him." Victor Bradshaw, 238 Jarvis-street, a clerk, was sitting in his room when he heard the boys coming up the street. They attracted his attention, and he watched them play. He saw the police turn on Carlton-street. A man walking down the street was approached from behind by a policeman, who was carrying a club. The man who might have been a student, on the head with his baton. The blow glanced off his shoulder. The man walked on down the street. Witness did not see any stones thrown. The students were singing, but not creating other disturbances.

Charles Gully of Uxbridge was out with the S.P.S. men on Halloween. He was hit three times on the head with a baton by the same policeman, while hurrying up the street at the time the police charged the students on Jarvis-street. On College-street he saw one hit, but saw no one else. Some of the students had hockey sticks, as there had been a roller hockey match that night.

Mr. Fullerton, witness told the names of several of the men who were in the procession up Jarvis-street. A car had been stopped, a couple of ladies were walking on the side of the road, and several lamps lowered.

Heard a Threat. N. S. Cumming of Hamilton saw three policemen talking to students on Yonge-street, above Carlton. One statement made by a constable was: "I'll give it to you again!"

John MacCracken of Brussels was struck by P.C. Christie, the university policeman, told of the making up of the procession and the small bonfire started by the students. He heard the police that direction. He saw a man lying on the ground and Police-ward hitting him with his baton. He saw the man get up six or eight times and kicked him three times, remarking: "Now will you go home?" Witness told "I ran to assist and helped the wounded man, who was insensible, to his feet. The witness knew of no stones being thrown, but a statement made by the students, except when they asked his advice what to do. He told them to go home and he would report the whole matter to the president.

George Hagan, the university night watchman, corroborated the evidence of the last witness. At this point the students' counsel announced that his case was closed, and Mr. Fullerton made application, in view of the evidence given by many of the students, proving that the offence amounted to the offence of unlawful assembly, for authority from the board to enable him to confer with the crown attorney and request him to take such proceedings as would cause the matter to be brought to the police magistrate.

Mr. Fullerton to take such action, but gave no opinion on the subject. Mr. Young characterized the city council's idea as a new conception of an "unlawful assembly."

For the Defence. Mr. Fullerton called his first witness, S. B. Zummelin, a motorman on a Yonge-street car, told of being surrounded by students who grabbed the sign of the car and rolled a barrel in front of the car.

P.C. Arthur Britton warned the students when they stopped the street car. They started on a run along Gould-street, where a shot was fired. Six or eight lights were lowered on Wilton-avenue and Gould-street. A large barricade was removed from Hayter-street.

Mr. Young witness said that a fellow officer had stated that the police had quite a time with the boys on Jarvis-street. He had gone off his beat to follow the boys.

P.C. Taylor told of phoning for relief, also corroborated by two men who demanded his business there, but he paid no attention. He was surrounded, and two students wanted to fight him. He was hit, but not as hard as he might. He struck three students, but no one on the head. Witness said that his relief did not charge without giving the students warning. The policemen mixed with the students in single file. He did not see any constables with his baton on the university grounds.
