New Westminster Keeps the Cup

Note and Comment

New Westminster refused to let go the Minto Cup, the Tecumseh would surely have won had several other incidents turned out differently. Now it's up to Vancouver and a westerner at present in the city declares the Salmonbellies will get their first defeat of the year when they play their league game away from home next Saturday, and by the end of the season the lacrosse championship trophy will surely change its location.

Lord Minto hung up the mug in 1901. The Caps of Ottawa being the first holders, due to a victory over Cornwall. Next the cup went to Shamrocks as N. L. U. winners. In 1902 New Westminster made their first attempt and the Shamrocks won. The Irishman held it 1903, 1904 and Brantford, the Vancouver Y. M. C. 1905. Caps won the Cup of Ottawa and St. Catharines in challenge series, also a joke from the League and last year the Caps won the Cup and beat the Tecumsehs, who had then their first try for the mug. Shamrocks won the N. L. U. next year and last fall the Salmon Bellies came east, won both games of the series, and yesterday made good again as holders of the world's championship.

Charlie Cushman is dead. He was the bench manager when Toronto won its first baseball championship in 1887. It was the J. J. McCaffery of St. E. who was the first to win the cup those days and when Ned Crane one after two victories over the pennant the president made good when he mounted the trophy which was held by the players' bench and asked, "Citizens, you content?" The line-up included: Crane, Doc Shepherd, Baker, pitcher; Odfield, C. Fozz, lb.; Kearns, 2b.; Alberts, c.; McCormick, rf.; Bueckler, 3b.; Burke and Blatter, outfielders. How could they lose?

It was the International League in those days. In 1887 there were ten teams, the finish being: Toronto 443, Buffalo, 411, Syracuse, 404, Newark, 362, Hamilton 355, New York City 404, Rochester 448, Elizabethton 369, Wilkesbarre 257 and Scranton 266.

Cushman moved from Toronto to Milwaukee and met with only moderate success in business and has been ill the past few years. He died yesterday, aged 52 years.

It's no championship team this year of grace, due principally to Montreal putting the Canadian sign on the other side of the line. Of fourteen games to date, Casey's team have won ten, Kelley's another nine and the end is not yet.

RAKE OFF OF SPECULATORS IN COBALT MARKET

Men Who Invest Their Money in Mines Entitled to a Due Consideration.

"Play the mine and not the market" were the words of a prominent New York financier, in discussing the situation of the Cobalt stocks yesterday.

The same gentleman in talking over the situation was thorough for a long while with the World's contention for a long while that too many speculators are endeavoring to live on the actual investors in the finest silver camp in the world.

Mines are not developed by the money of individuals who simply go into the proposition for a few days and sell again at a small profit to a similar individual, who repeats the operation.

What Cobalt wants and what every mining camp wants for development purposes is the money of the investor who is willing to put in his funds after having satisfied himself that there is a fair opportunity of a return on his original investment, with a reasonable profit for the adventure.

The legitimate investors have gone into the market believing that they are getting a fair return for their money. They are perhaps ignorant of the stock market end of the proposition and it is on this ignorance that the professionals thrive.

In many cases the stock of the investor is left in the hands of those who purchased it for the purpose of making the frequent drives against prices. As an investor who has no other camp in the world presents such opportunities as Cobalt, but the public which has put its money into the development of the camp has not received the advantages to which it is entitled, owing to the tremendous rake-off which has been taken by the stock market operators.

A species of disgust evidently pervades the public mind on account of the manner in which they have been treated in the past. There is a good reason for this, and unless a fair and square treatment is meted out to the ordinary investor it is but a question of time before the confidence of the market will be lost and the market become stagnant for the want of outside interest.

The outside investor owes one duty to himself, and that is to buy good Cobalt stocks, accept delivery and keep the stock of the market, thus preventing the use of his securities in making damaging speculations against the security to which he has pinned his faith.

NO NEW INSPECTOR Police Commissioners Will Worry Along With Present Staff.

No inspector will be appointed for the new police divisions added by the taking in of East and West Toronto at present. The police commissioners met yesterday for the last time until September, and save for a possible special meeting, they will take no action in police matters until then.

LA ROSE THE ONLY FEATURE OF STRENGTH.

A feeble effort to accord with the upward movement at the New York Market was made at the local Stock Exchange to-day. Dominion Steel rallied a point on pool support, but other stocks, such as Rio, Mackay and Sao Paulo, made lower prices on realizing sales.

The one and only feature of strength was La Rose, which sold up again and had the strongest kind of undertone at the highest price yet reached. With odd exceptions the public are not participants in the daily operations, the present fluctuations representing the in and out dealing of professionals.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, June 29. A species of irregularity, not altogether explainable developed at the Toronto stock market to-day. Spots of strength were offset by similar spots of weakness, neither movement being accounted for by any special news development.

The weakest feature of to-day's market was Rio, which fell three points further in the day's business, and closed weak at only a fractional rally. Sao Paulo was also heavy, but liquidated to a much smaller extent.

On the reverse side decided strength was shown in La Rose, which advanced to another new high level, selling up to \$3.14, and on the New York market four points higher than this.

Domestic Steel also developed some firmness, the influence in this issue being sympathetic with the movement in the Steel stocks in New York.

The market as a whole offered very little chance for criticism, the day's trading being of a small kind of calibre, and transactions of any moment only occurring in a few issues.

Speculative enthusiasm is evidently dormant at this market and shows no immediate signs of being stirred into action.

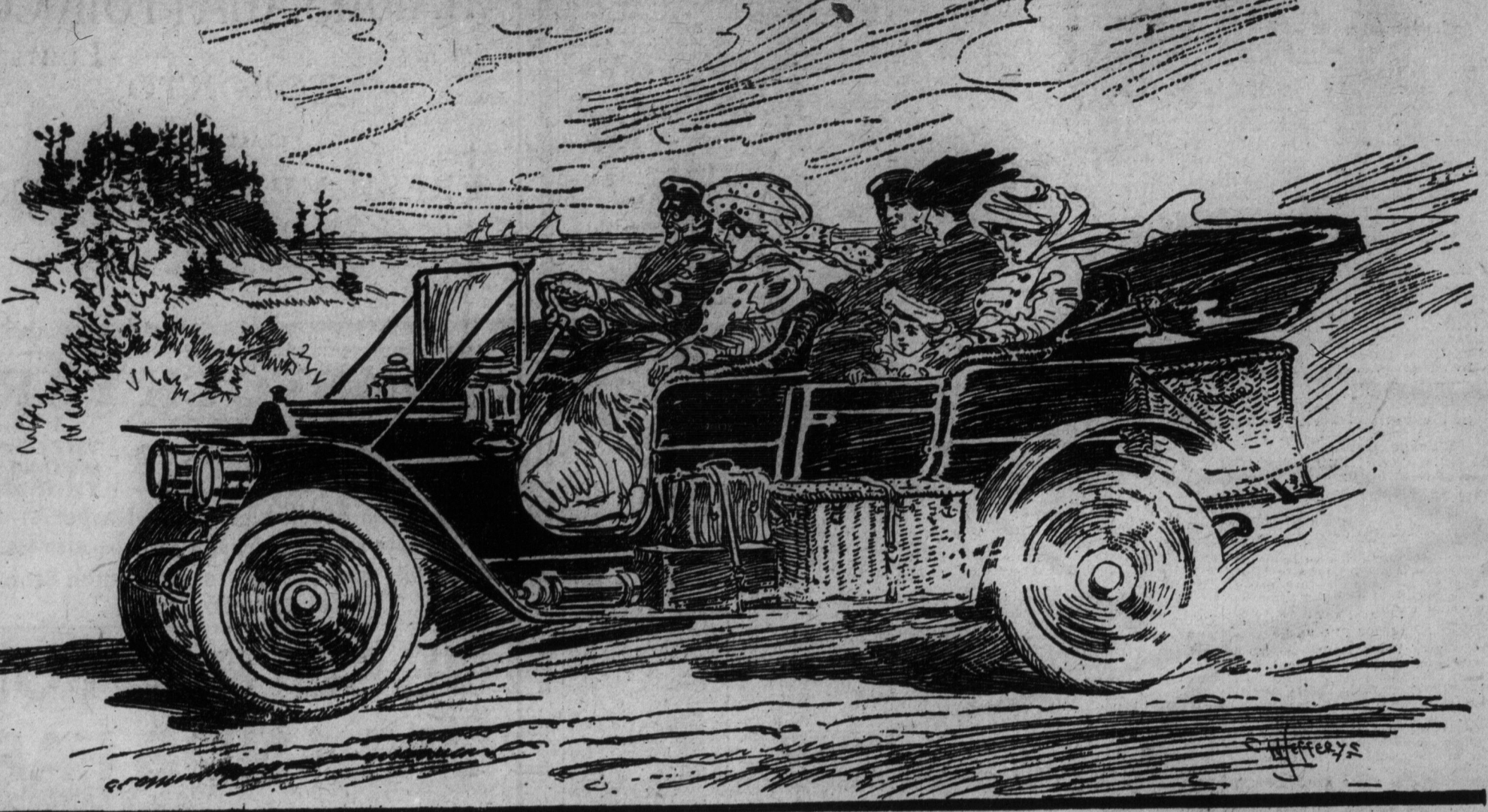
