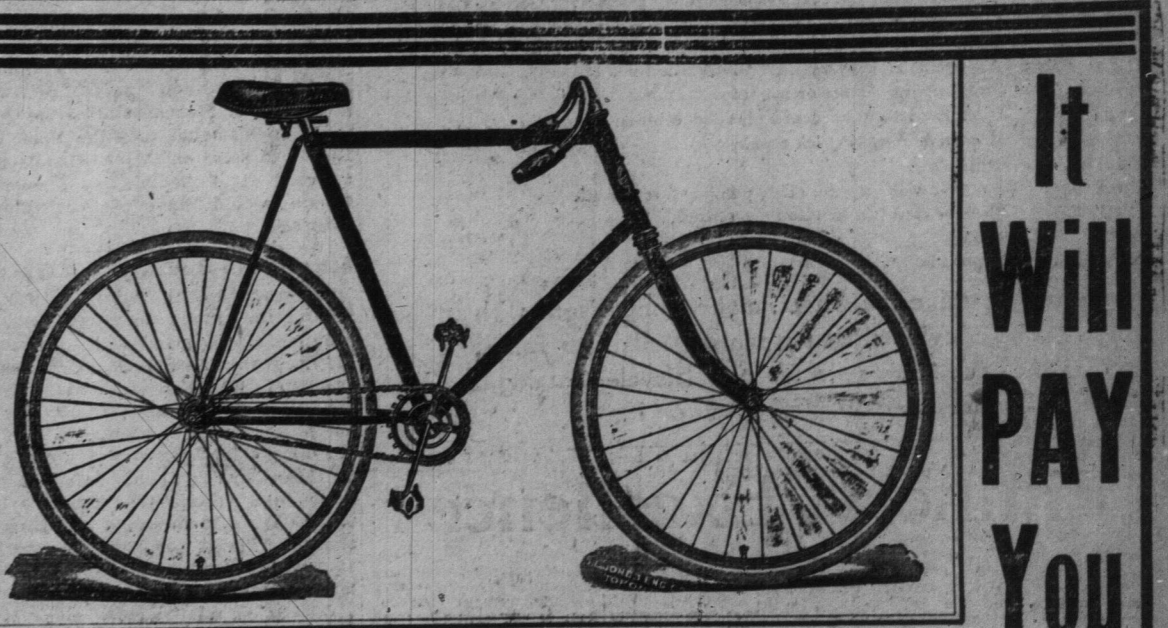

The Paros News. Asim Bey has handed to M. Skouzes, the Greek Minister of Foreign Affairs, the following note: "In consequence of the aggressive attitude of Greece, diplomatic relations between the King of the Hellenes and His Imperial Majesty the Sultan of Turkey and their respective Governments are hereby broken off. The Greek Consuls at Constantinople and the Greek Consulate have been ordered to quit Turkish territory. For the same reason the Turkish Consuls in Greece have been recalled to Constantinople. Within a fortnight from the date of this announcement all Greek subjects must leave Turkish territory and all subjects of the Sultan must leave Greece within the same period."

Turks in Greek Territory. Constantinople, April 18.—The Porte has received a despatch from Edhem Pasha, the Turkish commander-in-chief at Ellassona, dated Saturday, saying that in consequence of an invasion by the Greeks of Turkish territory his troops have retired to the heights of Feriz and Velsheko. The fourth division from Ellassona, under Hamid Pasha, and a full brigade under Hamid Pasha, have entered Greek territory.

Distributing Arms. Arta, April 18.—The Mayor of Arta has distributed rifles to all male inhabitants of the town. The transfer of all public offices and official records from Arta to Koniope is now proceeding. The town is almost deserted. The news of the capture of Arta has caused a panic among the population. A band of insurgents has entered Macedonia and is now advancing in the direction of Koniope.

Turkish Batteries Destroyed. Athens, April 18, 9 p.m.—A despatch just received here says that the Scafidi batteries, which were attacked by Greek warships shortly before 3 o'clock this afternoon, have been completely destroyed. The Greek batteries at Kessaloponga co-operated effectively with the flotilla in the bombardment.

Turks in Full Retreat. Larissa, April 18 (headquarters of the Greek Army in Thessaly).—The Greeks have captured the Turkish positions from Neozokoukora, and the Turks are in full retreat toward the interior, where their forces are massing. The batteries at Menexa ceased firing at 11 p.m. Sunday.

SHOWS IT ALL OF GREECE. Turkish Government is Now Squaring Itself Before the World.

Constantinople, April 18.—An official communication to the newspapers states that the Imperial Government has ordered the breaking of diplomatic relations between the two governments and the recall of Asim Bey, the Turkish Minister, and the Turkish Consuls. It invites Prince Mavrocordato and all Greek consuls in Turkish territory to quit the country of the empire, giving them subjects 15 days' notice. Prince Mavrocordato has handed his passports to the war upon Greece. The Greek Minister to Turkey, together with a note announcing the breaking of diplomatic relations between the two governments and the recall of Asim Bey, the Turkish Minister, and the Turkish Consuls. It invites Prince Mavrocordato and all Greek consuls in Turkish territory to quit the country of the empire, giving them subjects 15 days' notice. Prince Mavrocordato has handed his passports to the war upon Greece.

Will the Powers Intervene? Paris, April 18.—The Times calls upon the powers to intervene by force of arms to stop Turkey and Greece from further fighting.

Fifty Thousand Men Engaged. Ellassona, April 18.—The Greeks from all their positions in the Karaya district began the advance toward the front at 7 o'clock on Friday evening. The fighting was all that night and extended on Saturday to within ten miles of the frontier. It is estimated that 15,000 Greeks were engaged. The battle continued with great vigor throughout Saturday, when altogether 50,000 were engaged.

On Sunday morning the fire was concentrated toward the southeast of Miloussa. About noon to-day (Sunday) the Greeks began to give way after the hottest fighting of the engagement. The Turks advanced only a little beyond the frontier into Greek territory. Considering the rapidity of the firing, the expenditure of ammunition, the number of killed is comparatively small, probably under 200. Altogether the behavior of the Turkish troops was better than that of the Greeks. Their officers remained cool and collected. The firing still continued, and it is expected to meet a nightfall, as the troops have been engaged for 20 hours without food or sleep.

May Break the Deadlock. London, April 18.—A despatch to The Times from Constantinople says that the Greek subjects there will probably remain under the protection of Mr. Terrell, the American Minister. It is believed that the hostilities will break the deadlock and lead up to an arrangement between Greece and Turkey.

Greek Troops at Provosa. Athens, April 18.—The Army says the Greek troops have occupied the citadel at Provosa, and it is believed the Turks are bombarding Vointra.

THE HOSPITAL AT ELASSONA.

Visited by The Times Correspondent—A Distressing Scene of Agony.

London, April 18.—The Times' correspondent at Ellassona says: "I visited the hospital to-day (Sunday) and found it admirably conducted. But the scene was most distressing, the wounded screaming in their agony and the feverish tearing of the bedding in babbling delirium. On Saturday's hill fighting the Turks had the advantage. BARON COUNCIL THE FIFTH. The French Jurist Likely to Be Agreed Upon in the Arbitration Between Britain and Venezuela.

Washington, April 18.—The name of Baron Courcel, the eminent French jurist and diplomat, is being suggested to Great Britain, will probably be suggested as the fifth or final arbitrator in the dispute between Great Britain, Venezuela and Great Britain. The treaty of arbitration recently ratified by these two Governments provides that the fifth arbitrator shall be chosen by the four designated to represent the two countries, and the result of their inability to agree on a fifth, then King Oscar of Norway and Sweden, the sixth arbitrator.
