He Shows That the Government Has Increased the can't be Debt Notwithstanding a Much Larger Revenue --- Provincial Deficit Now is \$400,000.

ment recently issued by the local government, J. K. Flemming, M. P. P., this Provincial hospital ......

has submitted a statement of revenue and expenditure for the fiscal year ended Oct. 31st last.

A little investigation will result in the conviction that our finances are not in a satisfactory condition. The ordinary revenue of the year was large, being over \$104,000 in excess of last year. The increased of revenue was from two sources, the increase of our dominion subsidy and the increased revenue.

A prudent government, with this large increase of revenue, would have closed the year with a substantial surplus. Our present provincial administration have failed to do this, for they began the year with a credit on consolidated revenue account of \$77,616.09, and closed the year with a banace on the same account of \$85,389.48, so that their own showing admits a deficit.

Our government has increased the permanent debt of the province by the following amounts: Loan made in London, \$1,461,000; debentures, York and Carleton \$2,500; debentures, York and Carleton \$2,500; debentures to purchase railway lands, \$37, 191; total, \$1,511,903.50.

owing to the agitation for home rule in India. When the delegates assembled to-day, their overheated passions broke loose a second time, and the platform, from which moderation and constitutional action had been advised was rushed by the extremists in a body, who loudly demanded the speedy establishment of complete home rule. The Moderates have issued an announcement that the congress is an ijourned sine die. They will meet alone to morrow and sign a covenant to carry on the movement for colonial self-government on constitutional lines."

The danger involved in this agitation is the possibility of proceeding too rapidly. Impartial observers agree that to grant home rule to India in the present state of civilization in that country, with its numerous divisions of population having different ideals, and without experience in self-government, would be nothing short of disastrous. It would set back for generations the progress of the country toward real self-government. The problem which confronts the British government in India is a very serious one, and the most hopeful feature of the situation is the fact that there is a strong party of moderates, who will not agree to any other than constitutional means to achieve their ends. Hon. Morgan G. Bulkeley United States senator from Connecticut since 1905 was born at East Haddan, Conn., on December 26th, 1837. He was educated in the schools at Hartford and in early manhood went to Brooklyn, where he entered into mercantile pursuits. He became a successful merchant in Brooklyn and amassed a comfortable fortune with which he returned to Hartford in 1872. He later became president of the Etna Life Insur-
