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

### PUT RESPONSIBILITY

While some of the more unscrupulous of the Tory newspapers are striving to make it appear that the Liberals are responsible for the agitation against conscription being carried on in the province of Quebec, the facts are squarely against them. The most treasonable talk so far included in against the proposal came from the lips of Mr. Bourassa's lieutenant, Armand Lavergne. He has included in a lot of wild and treasonable dulged in a lot of wild and treasonable talk and it is regrettable to note that his remarks seemed to strike a responsive chord. A press despatch reports him as saying that "the conscription of 1917 had its origin in 1899, when Canada had sent men to assist in crushing a small nation, the Transvaal, who only wanted the right to live. "England," he went on, "was strong enough to accomplish it herself, but she only wanted to establish the principle of Canada's participation in the wars of the Empire."

It was the Liberal government led by Sir Wilfrid Laurier which sent the Canadian troops to the aid of the Empire during the South African war, and for doing this it lost the support of Mr. Lavergne and his thief co-worker, Henri Bourassa. These men at once began a wicked and ill-advised campaign against Sir Wilfrid Laurisen Campaign against Sir Wilfrid Laurier in Quebec, in which they were aided and abetted by the Tory leaders who were willing to go to any extreme in order to "down Laurier." The outcome was the Conservative-Nationalist Alliance, which first asserted itself at the Drummond-Arthabaskaville by-election in 1910. In that election a Nationalist named Gilbert, with the active support of Bourassa and Lavergne, was able to defeat the Liberal candidate, and almost the first man to wire his congratulations to the victor was none other than Sir George E. Foster. In the gener-al election of 1911, both Bourassa and Lavergne allied themselves with Sir Robtion (which even paid for the circulation of LeDevoir, Mr. Bourassa's paper) car-

It is a matter of record that while Mr Borden was forming his cabinet, Mr. Lavergne journeyed to Ottawa by special train to see to it that the Naticalists were properly looked after in the distribution of portfolios. 

### **GOVERNMENT STILL MARKS TIME**

Ottawa, May 29-There was no outward development today indicating with any degree of certainty, where the political currents at the capital are leading. Talk of cabinet reconstruction, either by way of coalition or as a party measure of necessity forced upon Sir Robert Borden, is still in the air, but no one knows just how things are going to turn out. 




