Woman Saves Dog and Bird, Then Kills Self By Turning on Gas

New Bedford, Dec. 20-Solicitous for the safety of a pet fox terrier and a canary, even while making arrangements for her own suicide, Miss Emily Grindrod, 45, of 36 Dudley street, removed them from the apartment of her sister, Mrs. Alice Holden, 35 Dudley street, before turning on the gas that ended her life. She carried the dog into the cellar and the bird in his

cage was found in the attic.

Her act of self-destruction is attributed to despondency, her relative Her act of self-destruction is attributed to despondency, her relatives saying that she has been brooding for several weeks. She arose at the usual hour and left ostensibly for her work at the Booth Mill, but falled to report there. Instead, during the absence of her sister and brother-in-law from their tenement, she obtained a key and gained entrance.

After stuffing the key-holes and other air passages with paper, Miss Grindrod placed a chair in the centre of a small room adjoining the kitchen, turned on the gas and sat down to wait for death. The body was found on the floor by the brother-in-law, Thomas Holden, when he returned from work.

Miss Grindrod was born in England, but has been a resident of this country for 20 years. When the body was found it was in front of the gas stove, one of the cocks of which was wide open. General Obregon's Forces Completely Defeat Rebels in Big Battle. PLAN NEW ATTACK

RETREATING

Fate of Revolution Hangs in the Balance-Many Prisoners Taken.

(British United Press.) Mexico City, Dec. 20.-General Obregon's forces completely defeated the rebels in the battle for San Marcos. insurgents retreating from that important railroad centre burn-

ed bridges and tore up tracks behind them. The Federals, however, expect to turn their attention to the Jalisco front once more and to launch a decisive attack on

Thursday. Scores of rebel prisoners were taken when the De La Huerta forces were defeated at San Marcos, and these were to be released tonight. President Obregon returned from the east front, apparently in good health, although he had a slight cough.

He received the Mexican and foreign press in his office at the National Palace and announced the success at San Marcos. Obregon said the Rebel General Figuroa still was operating in the State of Guerrero, but that in view of the fact that he was isolated and doing no harm his activities

were not considered important. (By Canadian Press.) Rebels Are Defeated.

LEVELS CHARGE AT **CUSTOMS OFFICERS**

Official at Ottawa Says There Was Collusion With Drug Smugglers.

Vancouver, B. C., Dec. 20.—F. W. Cowan, head of the opium narcotic drug section of the Department of Health in Ottawa, wrote to the director of prosecutions, also of Ottawa on August 18, 1921, charging that customs officers were in collusion with amugglers, according to information hehad received from special agent F. W. Eccles. This evidence was given yesterday at the investigation of charges made by Hon. A. M. Manson, attorney general, against the narcotle drug detective section of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, when a copy of the letter sent by Col. T. A. Wroughton, was read at the inquiry.

Further evidence of a similar character was given to Cimmissioner J. P. Smith, K. C., by Detective Constable W. L. Smith, who said that in the Ah Gow case, owing to lack of cooperation on the part of the customs officers, the police were prevented from making a complete seizure of all the narcotics. Instead of getting nine pounds of cocaine and 250 tins of opium, only the cocaine was secured.

SPEND MILLIONS ON NEW BUILDINGS

Yale Programme May Take \$64,000,000 — World's Finest Libraries.

New Haven, Conn., Dec. 20.-Yale's new library buildings, the \$8,000,000 gift of the Sterling estate, will be erected on the sites of the present gymnasium and Hopkins Hall, according to university authorities. Although the announcement that the new buildings were to be erected was issued several

for them had been the subject of long debate.

John W. Sterling of the law firm of Shearman & Sterling died July 5, 1918, leaving an estate of upward of \$20,000,000,000, which about \$18,000,000 was bequeathed to Yale University, of which he was an alumnus of the class of 1864. He was one of the wealthiest lawyers in New York, and a director of many railroads and other corporations and was unmarried.

The new libraries, it is said, will mark the first steps Yale is to take on a great building programme on which it is expected that about \$64,000,000 will be spent. The libraries are expected to be the finest of their kind in the world, and will probably be of Gothic design. All the new buildings to be erected by Yale will be of a type similar to that of the Harkness Memorial, according to James Gamble Rogers, consulting architect of Yale, and designer of the Harkness Memorial buildings.

After this sentence he was conveyed back to the Boys' Industrial Home at East St. John to serve out his sentence there. 
