Paris, Dec. 19-The French War Office this afternoon gave out an official

"From the Lys to the Oise, we have progressed in the regions of Notre Dame de Consolation, to the south of Lebassee by more than one kilometre. During the last two days we also made progress in the direction of Carency,

St. Laurent and Blagny.

"In the region of Albert, during the night of December 17-18 and during the day of the 18th, we advanced under a very violent fire of the enemy, and we reached the barbed wire entanglements of the second line of German trenches. To the north of Maricourt, we were obliged to abandon a trench occupied the night before, and set on fire by the enemy by means of hand gren-

"Several German trenches have been occupied in the region of Mamets, and in the vicinity of Liehons three violent counter-attacks on the part of the Ger-

"In the region of the Ainse there have been artillery engagements and in Champagne the artillery of the enemy showed decreased activity as compared to the 17th. In the Argonne, in the forest of La Grurie we blew up a German undermining trench. Near St. Hubert the enemy, by a very spirited attack,

succeeded in making slight progress.

"It has been confirmed that on the heights of the Meuse our fire directed by aviators demolished two heavy batteries of the enemy and damaged a

It is asserted that in each of these cases the proof of guilt was complete and convincing, but that the gallantry of male jurors seemingly caused them to look upon sex as a sufficient excuse for murder.

The situation in Chicago became so serious that there was talk of asking the legislature to enact a law to permit the selection of a female jury to try women. If the new precedent established is not merely the exception which proves the rule the very unusual expedient of female juries will be unnecessary.

Lloyd George Tells of Examples on

Battlefield

London, Dec. 19—Chancellor Lloyd George has contributed a message to the Christmas number of the Methodist Times, in which he says:

"I recently visited one of the battlefields of France. I saw in a village being shelled by German guns a prisoner of war just being brought into the French lines. He was in a motor car under guard. He was wounded and looked ill and in pain.

"The French general with whom I had gone into the front went up to the wounded Prussian and told him he need not worry; he would be taken straight to the hospital and looked after as if he were one of our own men. The Prussian replied: 'We treated your wounded exactly in the same way."

"It was a curious rivalry under these conditions; for you could hear the 'wizzie.' of the German shells and the shuddering crack with which they exploded, dealing out death and destruction in the French trenches close by. We were in sight of a powerful French battery, which was preparing to send its deadly messages into the Prussian ranks.

A little farther on I marvelled that this exhibition of good will among the men who were sworn foes should be possible amid such surroundings until my eyes happened to wander down a lane where I saw a long row of wagons, each marked with a great red cross. 


the creamery at Bridgewater served a very large section of the territory along the railway passing through that town. 



The Canadian Record Office is kept busy with enquiries from wives who have been deserted by their husbands or from mothers whose sons have not been heard from for years. 


