



Ottawa, July 26 — An attack on the Hon. William Pugsley for the improvement of a New Brunswick port by dredging an entrance was made the excuse for the obstruction in the commons today. O. S. Crocket, Conservative member for York (N. B.), condemned the dredging done at the entrance of the Gaspereaux River by the Maritime Dredging Company to afford an entrance to Port Elgin. He concluded by moving that the payment of \$33,969 to the Maritime Dredging Company at Gaspereaux discloses a wasteful and illegal expenditure of public money which deserves the censure of this house.

VIR. CROCKET MADE

BUT POOR SHOWING

Hon. H. R. Emmerson declared that he was responsible for the Gaspereaux dredging having been undertaken. It had been done in the constituency of Westmorland. Port Elgin had important milling and fish-curing industries which struggled against the disadvantage of having no adequate water transportation, owing to the river having blocked the harbor entrance by forming a bar 1,500 feet across. The people had pressed for the cutting of the bar and dredging of the harbor in 1900. He had promised to use his influence to have it done for them.

He had sought an appropriation for the dredging from Hon. Mr. Tarte and from Hon. Mr. Hyman but there was no dredge available capable of doing the work. He had succeeded in getting an appropriation in 1908 and tenders had been called. The dredge had been sent there and set to work on the understanding that all dredging done would be paid for at the rate of the lowest tender received, and that if a tender lower than the Maritime Company's was received the lowest tenderer should do the remainder of the work.

The situation was an exposed one and the work difficult. The Maritime company was the only one which had tendered and their tender had been for ninety cents. The work was commenced in the fall. A storm carried away and destroyed the tug and scows of the company. They lost so much money and encountered such weather difficulties they refused in the following spring to continue the work at any price. A year later the government dredge MacKenzie had carried the work further and arrangements were now being made for completion of the work.

"The work is needed," declared Hon. Mr. Emmerson, "and if it is not carried to completion the government need not expect the continuance of my support or the support of the peole of that district."

WOOD PULP FROM N. B. FREE UNTIL OCTOBER 1

Washington, July 26—Speaker Clark and Vice-President Sherman today signed the Canadian reciprocity bill. It was at once forwarded to the president, who immediateforwarded to the president, who immediately signed it.

Instructions for the administration of so much of the law as is effective till the whole agreement is ratified by the Canadian parliament were telegraphed to customs collectors along the Canadian border today. The regulations provide for proper identification of the imports to prove that they are of Canadian origin and the state department has been asked to instruct consular officers in Canada to add their certificates to the declarations of the importers.

Until the Canadian parliament has ratified the agreement only section two, which covers wood pulp, paper and paper board, will be effective. The regulations under the new law provide free entry to all such imports from private lands or from crown lands, provided no export tax has been levied. British Columbia, Ontario and Quebec impose export duties on wood. New




