

IN BRITISH SPECTACLES

America is Not to be Congratulated in Her Choice of McKinley as a Candidate.

Republican Victory Means an Era of Exclusive Tariffs, Powerful Monopolies.

Platonic Gold Plank and Barricade Protection are Impossible Together.

London, June 18.—Nearly all the morning papers comment upon the results of the St. Louis convention yesterday.

The Chronicle says: "Yesterday's ballots show a high tariff and sound money to be the watchword of the Republican party. We would heartily congratulate the Republicans upon the success of these if we did not fear that our words might be used to injure them."

The Graphic says: "Mr. McKinley will have his hands full if he conscientiously tries to realize the platform adopted in favor of gold side by side with a solemn profession of ultra protectionism."

The Times says: "Mr. McKinley won the first heat in the presidential race hands down, but the battle is not finally won. The silverites appear to find some comfort in the coincidence in the date of Waterloo, which seems to them an evil omen for the leader who purchased victory at their expense."

The financial article in the Times says: "Speculators in the American railroad market yesterday were disappointed. The public did not come in as was hoped on the mere announcement that a gold plank had been included in the Republican platform."

The Standard says: "The important fact is, not Mr. McKinley's nomination, which was generally anticipated, but that he was compelled to stand on a gold platform. The significance of the adoption of the gold standard is two-fold. It shows that the great party which is now believed to control the political destinies of the United States repudiates all designs of tampering with the currency."

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The gold standard platonic affirmation and protectionism of the barricade order are impossible together on the same programme. We take it that if hard and fast protection wins the day next November a hard currency is almost certain to follow.

A WAR CLOUD DISPELLED.

But British Columbia Will Disappoint Her Badly by Breaking Her Bonds.

Victoria Post Office Clerks' Particular Friend Secures a Constituency.

Ottawa, June 20.—Reports received here from all over the Dominion go to show that the government will be badly defeated. Mr. Laurier, who is making his last speech of the campaign in Ontario to-day at Alexandria, will have a large majority against the government.

In Toronto, last night, although the crowd was admitted to Massey hall by ticket, they refused to listen to Sir Charles.

Mr. McVeity gave the name of Mr. Stewart, government contractor, a well known supporter of Tupper, and now actively engaged in this campaign, as the one who approached and assured him of the government nomination if McVeity would give a pledge to support remedial legislation.

The government are hurrying up the Goodwin case so that a judgment favorable to Goodwin may be reached to-night in the exchequer court.

Montreal, June 20.—Sir A. P. Caron is now the Conservative candidate for the county of St. Maurice, Desaulniers, the second Conservative nominated, having been appointed clerk of the legislative assembly of Quebec. It was at first supposed that Sir A. P. Caron intended retiring, but he will now run.

POLITICAL BISHOPS

Francis Episcopal Effort to Help the Tupper Family Back to Power.

Clergy are Instructed to Read the Mandement and Comment on it Strongly.

The Church Deliberately Lowered to the Level of a Political Instrument.

Ottawa, June 19.—Archbishop Duhamel has issued a circular letter to all clergy in his diocese asking them to again read the mandement on Sunday next.

It is understood that the bishops elsewhere in Quebec and Ottawa diocese will do the same thing. It has been discovered that the reading of the mandement on the 17th of May last, without comment, had not the desired effect, and that the Liberals have not lost anything by the action of the church in this regard.

The lines on which their comment is to be made are laid down by his grace. He says that after reading all the mandement they are to read the printed one which sets forth the right of bishops to instruct their clergy on matters of a religious character.

Sir Charles Tupper is said to approve of this course of the bishops, but it will do more harm than good. The bishop's letter explains the action of the bishops at Grenville, when he held up Mr. Laurier to some of his parishioners as an Orange rag.

Grenville is in Argenteuil, where Dr. Christie, a Protestant, is running. Father Gascoie told some of his parishioners that to vote for Dr. Christie would be a "mortal" sin.

Montreal, June 19.—Mr. Laurier spoke at Farnham, in the eastern townships, to a mingled French and English audience to-day. There was much enthusiasm shown.

The long list of successes which has characterized the tour of the Liberal leader throughout Ontario and Quebec, suffered no interruption by his visit to Coaticook yesterday. When the train arrived at the station there was an immense crowd there to welcome him.

GOOD PROSPECTS.

The News from the East Entirely Satisfactory to the Liberals.

Vancouver, June 20.—The World's big seventh edition, now out consists of fifty-two pages. It contains special reports from all the eastern cities and political centres in the west, from leading citizens and newspapers, stating that the fate of the Tupper government is sealed and the Liberal wave now passing over the Dominion will beyond doubt carry Laurier and Laurier to victory next Tuesday.

TIRED OF TUPPER.

The "Prince of Political Cracksmen" Hissed by Thousands Last Evening.

The Present Premier is a Man Repugnant to the Canadian People.

The Final Blow Dealt Tupperism at Last Night's Toronto Meeting.

Toronto, June 20.—The mass meeting held in Massey Hall last evening in the interest of the government candidates in the city proved fully as turbulent as was expected. The doors were open to ticket holders at half-past five and the body of the hall was pretty well filled by them.

Kirkfield, Ont., June 20.—Delamere, the independent candidate in North Victoria, spoke to a great crowd last evening. He stated that three weeks ago he was offered a government position worth \$1200 a year if he would resign his candidature.

Toronto, June 20.—The Globe has a Baltimore dispatch giving an interview with Cardinal Gibbons on the school question. He said to the interviewer: "With such good men as Laurier the truth will prevail."

JOHN BEVERLY ROBINSON. The Ex-Lieutenant Governor of Ontario Dies Suddenly. Toronto, June 20.—John Beverly Robinson was killed to speak at the Conservative mass meeting held here last evening, and drove to the hall accompanied by Sir Charles Tupper.

Toronto, July 19.—Arrangements are being made for the great meeting here to-night when Sir Charles Tupper is billed to speak at Massey Hall. He will be the guest of Senator Allen during the day, but will rest quietly.

BRIGHTEST PROSPECTS

Evidences of a Sweeping Victory for Liberalism, Liberty and Laurier.

Canada Awakening to a Sense of Her Degradation Under Tupper Family Rule.

Margellous Enthusiasm for Laurier—Careful Forecast of the Situation.

Toronto, June 20.—Day by day the prospects of an overwhelming Liberal victory in Ontario grow brighter. The best estimates give the Liberals from 55 to 60 seats in this province and the remaining seats to the government, Patrons and McCarthies.

All over the country the Liberal meetings are crowded to overflowing and the enthusiasm unprecedented in any election since confederation. It is doubtful if even in Toronto the government will elect one candidate.

In Western Ontario the Government will scarcely carry a seat, with, perhaps, the exception of Hamilton and of East Middlesex. In Hamilton it seems certain that both Liberal candidates will win and will carry at least one seat in Ottawa.

Private advices from Quebec are to the effect that there is marvellous enthusiasm for Laurier all over the province, and that no power can prevent him from carrying Quebec by at least 12 or 15 of a majority.

Advices from Prince Edward Island are that the Liberals will carry every seat. In New Brunswick at least six seats are conceded to Laurier.

As a party the Liberals were never so thoroughly united as they are at present. The McCarthies and the Patrons are working hand in hand with the Liberals to overthrow the Tupper government, about whose fate there is no manner of doubt now.

Winnipeg, June 20.—Hugh John Macdonald will be snored under. A thousand Conservatives in Winnipeg will vote to abolish Tupperism.—James Patterson.

TEN THOUSAND DROWNED.
