#### JAMES MATTHEWSON CLARK.

James Matthewson Clark was born in the City of Toronto, May 10th, 1830. At the age of 16 he was converted to God, and received into the Church by the Rev. Samuel Rose, on the Yonge-Street Circuit, having removed with his parents to the township of Vaughan. Though surrounded by many influences calculated to lead him astray, yet, from the time fie united with the Church, he sustained the character of a consistent Enristian. He was always ready to bear his part in order to maintain and increase the spirituality of the Church in the community where he resided. In the year 1851 he engaged in the itinerant work under the direction of Rev. Lewis Warner, then Chairman of the Barrie District, and at the following Conference was received on trial. During the

few years he exercised his ministry, he was chiefly engaged in those remote parts of the work in which constant toil and self-denial mark the course of the Evangelist. His robust constitution and good health peculiarly fitted him for this; and he cheerfully performed his work without a murmur, in the name of that Redeemer to whose service he had dedicated his life. He was appointed to the Mono Circuit by the Conference of 1857, which field of labour he faithfully cultivated to the last Sabbath of his life, having preached twice and attended a prayer-meeting on that day. During the week he was attacked by a malicinant type of scarlet fever, and two days illness terminated his earthly existence. He died as he had lived, expressing unshaken confidence in the atonement of Christ, being within a few days of 27 years of age, and in the seventh of his ministry.

In reviewing the circumstances connected with the death of our brother, we are forcibly reminded of the language of the venerable Bishop Hedding, "our Preachers die well."

May we all

#### 2. James Morgan.

Br. Morgan died in Dundas, on the 4th day of February, 1858, in the 28th year of his age, and in the 3rd of his

Ministry, after an illness of nearly two months.

He was a native of England, and the son of Mr. John Morgan, of Franch Road, near Kidderminster. To the 15th year of his age he manifested no concern for his soul, and was, therefore, in great danger of being led astray by a wicked associate. He was not without friendly warnings and the strivings of the Holy Spirit. He began to reflect. At the same time he was pressingly invited to attend a class, and engaged to do so; and though he afterwards regretted having made the promise, yet he went. On that very night, however, the arrows of truth pierced his soul. He was in deep distress during the following week, till the next class

sight. At that time he was enabled to believe in Christ, when he received a full assurance of God's pardoning mercy. From that hour he went on his way rejoicing in God.

Mr. Morgan's first Circuit was Woodstock; his second, Aylmer; his third, Ingersoll; and his last one Dundas. To increase in love to God seemed to be his ardent desire for

menths previous to his last illness.

In his last illness he shewed that he possessed a genuine piety, and a clear experience of personal salvation. His life had been characterized by simplicity of purpose: and as a Gospel Minister, by an ardent and well-tempered zeal for God and the prosperity of his Church.

#### BENJAMIN SLIGHT, A. M.

Brother Slight was a native of Brigg, Lincolnshire. England, where he was born on the 13th of June, 1798. He was converted when he was about 20 years of age. Soon after he began to call sinners to repentance, and laboured with much acceptance in his native land. His convictions were that he should engage in the Mission work, and in due time was sent by the English Missionary Committee to Canada. For twenty-four years he diligently discharged the functions of his ministry in different parts of Eastern and Western Canada, and filled some of our important stations in these parts. After filling the responsible office of Chairman of the Quebec District for four years, he was transferred to the Chairmanship of the Kingston District, which honorable station he filled until his death, which took place at Napanee, the circuit on which he was stationed, on the 16th of January, 1858. His piety was deep and uniform, partaking more of the practical than of the emotional element, though by no means deficient of that joy in the Holy Ghost which is unspeakable and full of glory. His religious experience was steadily progressive, and his christian life shone with increasing lustre. As a preacher he was distinguished by lucid expositions of God's word, correct views, of christian doctrine, and an earnest enforcement of christian duties, which rendered his ministrations highly instructive and edifying to the Church of God.

As a pastor, he was faithful, firm but mild in the administration of discipline; affable in manner, meek in spirit, he received the esteem of all, among whom he labored. His literary attainments were of a superior order. His published works indicate a well-disciplined mind, logical precision and extensive philological acquirements. Though never of very robust health, he performed an amount of labour above the ordinary average, and has left an example of how much can be accomplished by patient determined unremitting exertion. His death was unexpected to himself and friends. He fell in the field clad in full armour, worn out by toil, and entered into his rest, after having for a number of years endured hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ.

- N. B. This Collection is to be made in the Classes as well as by general application.
- Collection to aid in the Education of Candidates for our Ministry, in the month of December.

### MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS.

On the composition of the Stationing Committee and the election of Chairmen to Districts.

RULE I. The Stationing Committee shall consist of the President, and Secretary of Conference, Co-Delegate, Superintendent of Missions, Chairmen of Districts, and one member of Conference from each District elected by ballot at its Annual Meeting.

RULE. II. The Stationing Committee shall meet at the call of the President at the place appointed for holding the annual Conference, at least three days previous to the commencement of its sessions, to prepare a draft of the stations; which draft shall be printed and ready at the opening of the session, for the use of members of Conference.

RULE III. The Stationing Committee shall meet as often as may be deemed necessary during the sessions of the Conference, for the revision of the stations, and each member of Conference shall have the right to appear before the Committee to represent his case in regard to his appointment. The Ex-President and Ex-Secretary shall be members of the Stationing Committee in the revision of the Stations.

RULE IV. The first reading of the Stations, shall not be later than the first day of the second week of the Conference. The Stationing Committee shall meet again and revise the Stations, and at the second reading which shall not be later than the second Wednesday of the Conference, or at least one day previous to its close, the Stations shall be confirmed.

RULE V. As soon as the Stations are confirmed at the second reading, the Secretary shall read over successively the names of the preachers stationed in each District, and the Conference shall elect by ballot one of the members of Conference so stationed, to be Chairman for the ensuing year.

ON THE COMPOSITION OF THE MISSIONARY COMMITTEE AND THE MODE OF ITS APPOINTMENT.

The Committee on Missions shall consist of the President and Secretary of Conference, the Co-Delegate, the Superintendent of Missions, the Chairmen of Districts, and not less than seven other Ministers, nor more than the entire number of Chairmen, to be nominated by the Superintendent of Missions, and elected by the Conference, who, together with an equal number of laymen, shall possess and exercise all the powers now employed by the Missionary Committee and Board.

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Each District Meeting, when the Stewards are present, shall elect one layman, as a member of this Committee, and the Conference shall appoint the remaining number in the same way in which the Ministers of the Committee are appointed.

PERIOD WHENCE TO CALCULATE CLAIMS ON THE SUPERANNUATED MINISTERS' FUND.

Resolved—That the period for reckoning Ministers claims on the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, shall commence from the time of their being received by the Conference for our work. This to apply alike to those who are received by us from other Churches, as to such as are received as probationers for our Ministry. SUPERANNUATED MINISTERS' CHILDREN TO BE REGARDED AS CLAIMANTS ON THE CHILDREN'S FUND; AND THE ORDER IN WHICH DISTRICTS SHALL RETURN THE MINISTERS' CHILDREN IN THEIR DISTRICTS.

Resolved, That claims on the Children's Fund shall be allowed for the Children of Superannuated Ministers, such children having been born during the period of their father's service in the full work of the Ministry. In reporting the children for whom claims are authorized upon the Children's Fund, the District Meetings shall observe the following order:—

First, Children, whose fathers are now engaged in the work of the Ministry.

Second, Children whose fathers are Superannuated; whose mothers are widows; or, who are orphans.

Third, Special Cases: such as children who were born previous to the year 1855, in which period their fathers were engaged in the work of the Ministry, but not in full connexion with the Conference.

RESOLUTIONS ON THE NATURE OF THE WINE TO BE USED IN ADMINISTERING THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER.

Resolved,—That, whereas this Conference heretofore passed a rule requiring the use of the Port Wine of Commerce, in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper; and whereas, there is now made in Canada a pure Wine from the cultivated grape, the Conference now alters its aforesaid la \*, so as to allow the Wine made in the country from its own produced grape, when such is preferred by any of our Churches.

BOOK OF DISCIPLINE \_REVISING COMMITTEE APPOINTED.

Resolved,—That the President and Secretary of Conference, the Co-Delegate, the General Superintendent of Missions, the Editor and Book Steward; the Chairmen of Districts, and one member of Conference, chosen at the several Financial District Meetings for that purpose, shall revise and publish a new Book of Discipline for our Church.

Resolved,—That to the Revising Committee shall be submitted the following subjects:—A division of the Conference;
—A re-union of the several branches of Methodism in Canada;—and a revision of our Connexional Schedules.

MR. WESLEV'S RULE ON THE SALE AND USE OF INTOXICATING
LIQUORS RESTORED.

Resolved,—That Mr. Wesley's original rule on the sale and use of Intoxicating Liquors, shall be restored to our Rules of Church Membership.

### CIRCUIT BOOKS WITH NAMES OF MEMBERS.

Resolved,—That with a view of promoting uniformity in registering the names of Members of our Church in all our Circuits and Missions, the Book Steward is directed to prepare books suited for such an object, and to furnish them to Superintendents of Circuits or Missions, to whom they shall be charged.

### WHO CONSTITUTE A DISTRICT MEETING.

Resolved,—That a District Meeting is constituted of Ministers, who are members of Conference, Preachers received on trial by the Conference, and the Stewards elected for that purpose by their respective Quarterly Meetings.

Resolved,—That when there are two or more Ministers or Preachers on a Circuit, the additional representative or representatives with the Recording Steward to the May DistrictMeeting, shall be elected by their Quarterly Meeting, the nomination being with the Chairman.

PRECAUTION TO BE TAKEN IN BUILDING CHURCHES TO PREVENT OPPRESSIVE DEUTS.

Resolved,—That in order more effectually to prevent our people from contracting debts which they are not able to discharge, it shall be the duty of the Quarterly Meeting of every Circuit or Station, where it is contemplated to build a house or houses of worship, to secure the ground or lot on which such church or churches are to be built, according to

our deed of settlement, which deed must be legally executed; also, said Quarterly Meeting shall appoint a judicious Committee of at least three members of our Church, who shall form an estimate of the amount necessary to build; and three-fourth's of the money, according to such estimate, shall be secured or subscribed, before any such building shall be commenced.

ON READING SERMONS DURING PUBLIC WORSHIP.

Resolved,—That this Conference regards the practice of reading Sermons from Manuscript by our Ministers or Preachers in their Pulpit Ministrations, as contrary to the spirit and usages of Methodism, and detrimental to the efficiency of the Ministry; and therefore directs that each candidate for admission to our Ministry, shall be examined on this point by the District Meeting, previous to his being recommended to the Conference.

SUBSCRIPTIONS TO THE SEVERAL FUNDS TO BE TRANSMITTED TO THEIR RESPECTIVE TREASURERS THROUGH THE FINANCIAL SECRETARIES OF THE DISTRICT.

Resolved,—That all monies raised on Circuits or Stations for Connexional Funds, (those for Missions excepted,) shall be paid to the Financial Secretary of the District in which they are raised, and by him to the Treasurer of the Fund for which they are designed.

MEANS TO BE ADOPTED FOR REMOVING THE FINANCIAL EMBAR-BASSMENT ON VICTORIA COLLEGE.

Resolved,—That a Committee, consisting of the College Board and the Chairmen of Districts, shall apportion an amount of the debt on Victoria College to each District, according to its members and wealth; and each District shall, at its Financial Meeting, distribute its amount amongst the several Circuits, the Superintendents of which Circuits being held responsible for the amount thus to be raised, at the next Conference.

RESTRICTING AND REGULATING THE ATTENDANCE, OF MINISTERS AND PREACHERS AT CONFERENCE.

Resolved,—That the appointment by the District Meetings of their Ministers and Preachers who shall attend Conference, shall be limited to those who are recommended to be received into full connexion, and those who have travelled four years since their reception into full connexion. Provided, however, that when there shall not be a sufficient number of brethren of four years standing to represent the District in the Conference Committees, the election may be made from other brethren in full connexion.

### TICKET OF MEMBERSHIP.

Resolved,—That Tickets of Membership, uniform for each quarter, shall be prepared by the Book Steward, and shall be ready for distribution, to our members by the first quarter of next year.

# BEPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTE.

It is the pleasing duty of the Committee on Sabbath Schools to report considerable progress in this department of church effort. The statistics of the present year show an increase in the number of Schools of thirty-eight. More than a thousand additional Teachers are engaged; while from six to seven thousand children have been added to the number reported last year. The Schools generally are represented as in a healthy condition—the Committees, Officers, and Teachers manifesting a marked interest in their work.

The high end of Sabbath School instruction has been attained in hundreds of cases: children have been converted to God. One School, and that a School organized during the year, reports twenty conversions, another fifteen, and so on. "The little children" are coming to Christ: "Young men and maidens," out of a true heart, "praise the name of the Lord," and augment the numbers of our Zion. The Committee recommends that, in future, each Circuit accurately report the number of conversions in connexion with its Schools.

Many Bible Classes and many Infant Classes are in efficient operation. By these auxiliaries to the ordinary Sabbath School Class, the time for acquiring scriptural knowledge is greatly extended, and made to cover the entire ground between mere infancy and manhood.

The Committee, on the ground that we, as a section of the Church, have a proper and lawful interest in the families of our own people, urges to the establishment of distinctively Methodistic Sabbath Schools in every place where it is practicable. Many instances have come under its notice in which the merging of our sectional peculiarities has operated very detrimentally to our progress as a Church. Attention is also called to the fact, that books other than Methodistic in their doctrines and principles are widely circulated amongst our Schools; and the Committee expresses its earnest hope, that steps will be taken to furnish all our Schools with sound Wesleyan literature, at prices which shall leave no room for seeking supplies elsewhere on the ground of economy.

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Vast numbers of the children and youth of our province are trained up to a system of deadly error. Antichrist holds wide dominion. Irreligion in its varied forms, and with its many fascinations, seeks to attract the young. In addition thereto, let it be remembered that human depravity includes juvenile depravity—the young are predisposed to go astray. Let the Church claim them, in fervent prayer, in mighty faith, in enlarged and ever enlarging effort, and "The beauty of the Lord our God shall rest upon us: He will establish our handywork;" and, in increased numbers and in perpetuity, "instead of the fathers shall be the children." "God's ways shall be known upon the earth, his saving health unto all generations."

#### REPORT OF THE BOOK COMMITTE FOR THE CONFERENCE OF 1858.

The general Book Committee beg leave to Report the results of the year's operations of the Book Concern and Guardian Office.

This Report embraces the results of the year, and the quadrennial investigation which the Conference requires.

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The results of the year they do not deem it necessary to Report lengthily upon, as the other Report includes them. The distressing depression of the year has affected the Book Room, as it has all other mercantile concerns in the country, yet it is gratifying to state, that a Balance of clear profits for the year, amounting to the sum of \$1,337 32. The payments for the Guardian are less by \$3000 this year than last, which, with the monetary pressure equally severe on the other branches of the business has caused serious embarrassment.

The Stock on hand is evidently too large for the times, and the increased liabilities thus arising, causes serious difficulties to be apprehended in carrying on the business, inthepresent depressed state of commerce and tightness of money. Still vigorous attention and the prompt payment of a portion of ministers' accounts would relieve of these embarrassments. The quadrennial Report has been prepared from perhaps the most thorough investigation ever made of the Concern.

At the Meeting in April, the Revs. R. Jones, J. Borland S. Rose, and H. Wilkinson, were appointed to the responsible office of Auditors and examiners of the whole Concern. In the discharge of their duties they obtained the services of persons acquainted with the various departments. Builders valued the buildings; gentlemen acquainted with printing, the printing department; thorough accountants examined and audited the books and accounts; they with such aid as they could command themselves attended to the valuation of the books and assets. The value of Stock has been reduced \$1,457.13; the debts due the Book-Room, reduced by \$1,177.05; the discontinued subscribers to the Christian Guardian, by \$1,802 29; depreciation on printing-presses and material in the four years, \$4,726.64; making a total reduction on the assets of \$9,163.11.

The Books are reported as entirely reliable, being well written up and correct, except three or four items explained by the Book-Steward to the satisfaction of the Committee.

The increase in the value of Real Estate, is \$10,000, arising mostly from the completion of buildings commenced in 1853,

Studen year, b to accommodate the Printing Department, and for Stock-Room and Bindery. The liabilities of the Book-Room have greatly increased, being \$53,663 26, against \$17,455 in 1854. The reasons of this are as follows:—

Over \$8000 have been added to the building expenses; subscriptions less collected to the Guardian this year, \$3000; increase of debts due from Preachers, \$3000; debts due from others, \$9000; and increase of Stock, \$12,000. The total amount of indebtedness of Preachers to the Book-Room, has risen to over \$13,000; and there is now due from present Subscribers to the Christian Guardian, over \$6000. If these sums amounting to nearly \$20,000 continue to be locked up as they now are, there cannot but be great hazard in carrying on the business of the Concern.

The Committee report some resolutions to which the Conference are requested to give their very serious attention.

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# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF VICTORIA COLLEGE.

In presenting this Annual Report of Victoria College, it is satisfactory to be able to state, that the operations of the past year have been marked by great harmony and good feeling, and have been attended with cheering success.

Owing to the severe monetary pressure, the attendance of Students has been somewhat less than during the preceding year, but the number of Undergraduates is the largest yet recorded. The whole number of Students in all departments

is 309; the number of Undergraduates in the Faculty of Arts, is 40; in the Faculty of Medicine, 63; the remainder consists of occasional Students, and Students preparing for Matriculation. The present Freshman class in Arts numbers 21, being about twice as many as the usual attendance in that class.

Many of the Students are consistent members of the Church, and by their example and zeal, do much for the spread of religion, both in the College and the Town of Cobourg. The leaven of this religious influence is found to be of incalculable service in the discipline and culture of the youth entrusted to our care.

Judging from present indications, the College is destined to furnish very valuable accessions to the Christian Ministry, and the attention of the Conference and the Church is earnestly invited to this important result, as a reason for more ardent and united exertions in behalf of the Institution. It is confidently believed, that in no other way is the Church more likely to be supplied with efficient and devoted labourers; and that by the more general Academic training of the youth ofour community, we might greatly diminish the number of those painful cases occurring from year to year,—cases of pious young men presenting themselves for the work of the Ministry, and rejected for want of proper education, or perhaps, sent to College, to acquire that education, when the time for acquiring it has gone by.

In accordance with the direction of the Conference, efforts have been made during the year, to collect the money due on Scholarships, and to raise additional funds by subscription. The Agents have partially canvassed the Western section of the Province, and aided by the Officers of the College and other brethren, have held public meetings in most of the cities and towns. The success of the Agents has, perhaps, been all that could reasonably be expected in times of such extraordinary financial depression; and the feelings in the public meetings has been such, as highly to encourage us, and to warrant the continuance of similar efforts.

There seems to be no plan better adapted to engage our people in the noble work of Christian Education, and it is

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well worthy of enquiry, whether this momentous interest of the Church; ought not to be as urgently and systematically laid before all our congregations as the subject of Sunday Schools or Christian Missions. Our College has no endowment; it cannot be self-sustaining; it can only live, therefore, by voluntary contributions; to secure such contributions it must be kept constantly before the public mind.

On this whole matter our people need to be aroused, and indoctrinated with proper views. It is necessary to show them that our College is a connexional necessity, that it is an essential-part of our machinery as a Church; that without it we shall either loose our youth, or retain them in a state of mental and social inferiority; that without it, our ministers will suffer both in numbers and efficiency; that without it, in fine, we shall be unequal to the great work God has assigned us in Christianizing this extensive country. And to all this we have to add the melancholy statement, that our Colleges with its Halls full of Students, is in imminent danger of being closed for want of funds.

These facts must be promptly and unceasingly pressed home, both upon our ministers and laity; and pressed home through every suitable channel—through the press, from the platform, and from the pulpit.

There is no other way of rescuing Victoria College from financial ruin; certainly no other way of making it what Methodism and the times demand.

It is therefore strongly recommended, that Agents be again appointed to continue their canvass, and to co-operate with the Officers of the College in holding Educational meetings throughout the entire Province.

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## PASTORAL ADDRESS.

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE
TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CHURCHES
UNDER THEIR CARE.

### DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN:

The occasion which calls us together, at our yearly Conference, as well as the peculiarly intimate and holy relationship which subsists between us as ministers, and yourselves as members of the great Wesleyan family, remind us of our annual duty of greeting you, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

A faithful review of the year now passed away, while it cannot fail to humble us on account of our manifold sins and short-comings, farnishes many grounds for devout thankfulness, and for hopeful encouragement. And if each successive year wears its own specific character, surely the past year with its disastrous revulsions of commerce, its records of revolt and war, with their inseparably mournful consequences, and its history of glorious revivals of religion, not so much denominational as they have been national, in their widespread and blessed influences and character—surely such a year, with its teachings of Providence as well as of grace, will not soon be forgotten by the Lord's people. "The lines have fallen unto us in pleasant places; and we have a goodly heritage."

We are not unmindful, dear Brethren, of your continued devotion to those interests peculiar to our own Church, as well as to the more general claims of our common Christianity. Your unabated attachment to the Wesleyan form of Christian

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doctrine, your steady attendance on all the means of grace, your cheerful submission to our discipline, and your generous and ever augmenting liberality to all our Connexional funds, are worthy of commendation. We are happy to observe, as among the evidences of your solicitude in the spread of the gospel, in this young and growing country, the multiplication of Church Edifices, where a rapidly increasing population may unite with you in the solemn and delightful services of the sanctuary. And that which even augments our joy, in connection with the erection of houses of worship, is the evident good atten lance on their services. Your prayers, conjoined with the labours of your pastors, have been largely followed by the Divine blessing and approval; and the cheering augmentation to the membership of our church, during the past year, of 7,096 persons, enables you to join us in saying, "We have not laboured in vain, neither spent our strength for nought."

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Never, perhaps, did our beloved Methodism present a more promising aspect; the past, full of ground for thankfulness; and the future, of anticipation for yet richer tokens of the divine favour. Both you and we are, we devoutly trust, praying for and labouring to secure a larger outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon our Churches, and upon our country; that Wesleyan Methodism may not only retain its position, but extend its influence throughout the entire community. Allow us to counsel you to use, with increasing fidelity, every appliance that our well-adapted organization places at your While you are "not slothful in business, be fervent disposal. in spirit." In addition to your habitual attendance on the public and social means of grace, retain among you the services of the household Altar, as we I as the exercises of the Let the hour of the morning and evening sacrifice witness to the coming together of you and yours; that while you honour God as families, you may claim the protection and blessing of Him who specially saves the habitations of the righteous.

Cultivate personal piety. Retain your "peace with God," and you will "walk in the light as he is in the light." "Avoid the appearance of evil." Be exemplary in conversation and

conduct, so that men "may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven." The ecclesiastical organization under which you are united, will not, of itself, however complete, lead the Church to spiritual conquests. With the machinery, there must be the hidden life; the interior power. "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly;" so that, animated by "power from on high," as you are a living church, you may be also a working church, and therefore, a successful church.

And in harmony with our exhortation to you to press every appliance of the church into the sanctified service of your Lord and Master, allow us to again remind you of the justly deserving claim which our Book and Printing Establishment in Toronto has upon your continuous patronage. It is in your power to make it all that its friends desire, by giving currency to a greater extent than hitherto, to its varied treasures of sound reigious literature. Our periodicals, too, the "Christian Guardian' and the "Sunday School Advocate" have an equally strong claim on your attention and support. And much good as they may have been the means of doing, we fondly hope that the sphere of their influence may be yet more wide-spread and lasting.

Permit us, dear Brethren, to ask your serious attention to the interests of the youth of our denomination. While we rejoice in the multiplication and success of our Subbath Schools-and they admittedly form essential departments of our organization, and ought, therefore, to be fostered as auxiliares to our continued growth-we put forth a plea in behalf of the claims of the young among us and around us. We believe it to be the duty of the Church to care for the secular, next to, and perhaps in connection with, the religious education of her youth of both sexes. Here she may develor e her sympathy; and here she may identify herself with the every day wants of those who are to sustain her future operations, and occupy her posts of responsibility. We are not prepared to state the extent of the loss to Methodism, by her comparative indifference to the requirements of her young for secular education. Very many of the children of our own people have strayed away from the fold of their fathers, becaus
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cause they have not been educated in the schools of our denomination. With the advantages of first-class educational institutions in our own country, most of which are under sound religious influence, we cannot understand either the expediency or the wisdom of seeking in other lands, and at some risk, that which is so accessible to us. Our duty is twofold—that which we owe to ourselves as a religious communion, and that which we owe to those endeared to us by kindred, yet not united with us in the bonds of Christian fellowship.

And we need here only, we trust, remind you of the claims of your own Educational Institution, Victoria College. Your liberality called it into being; and your continued patronage has, so far, successfully sustained it. We have no wish to hide from you the fact that the past success of our College operations has been the chief source of its present financial embarrassment. That an effort, corresponding with the magnitude of the interests involved, in the continued prosperity, of the College, not only ought to be made, but must be made we firmly believe. To place it beyond the fluctuations of a precarious and uncertain revenue, an Endowment worthy the community, whose it is, and adequate to its efficient and vigourous operation, must be raised. Its claims will, by the appointed authorities, be again presented before you; and we trust that a united and liberal effort will timely rescue the only chartered University in British America, under the immediate auspices of our Conference.

Successive years have been marked by large augmentations to our mission funds; under the encouragement and authority of which, the number of Missions, Indian and domestic, has steadily increased, whilst the blessing of God has been manifested in the addition of many to the membership of the Church; we are apprehensive, from the returns already made, this source of our strength may possibly be affected by the monetary crisis through which we are passing. It is some alleviation to our fears that we call to mind the spirit of self-denial and sacrifice which characterizes the true followers of Christ; and that we also cherish a lively expectation that this enterprise of our church, itself essentially missionary, will

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command your sympathies and share in the free-will offerings you present, for the truth's sake, upon the Lord's Altar.

And now, dear brethren, "we commend you to God, and to the word of His grace." "Be sober, be vigilant." Amid the busy competitions of life, we exhort you to "watch and pray that ye enter not into temptation." Live near to God. "Ye are in our hearts to die and live with you." The ties which bind us together are sacred. We mutually benefit each other. "Brethren, pray for us," that our going in and out among you may be productive of mutual good, and promotive of the glory of God. May we grow up together into Christ, our living Head; that when He, who is our life, shall appear, we may also appear with Him in glory!

And "now, unto Him that is able to keep you from falling and to present you faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy; to the only wise God our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever. Amen."

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#### THE ANSWER

OF THE

#### BRITISH CONFERENCE

TO THE

ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA.

REV. AND DEAR BRETHREN,

WE have welcomed your Address, and unite with you in rendering praise and thanksgiving to the God of all grace for the prosperity which you enjoy. Your worthy Representatives, the Rev. Dr. Stinson and Lachlin Taylor, have much interested us by their very important communications, which awaken our warmest sympathy, and encourage us to hope that, by your ministrations, the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ will rapidly win its way throughout the entire extent of Canada, to the inestimable advantage of that portion of the British Empire. With our Brethren who have so well represented you in this Assembly, were others from Australia, France, the United States of America, and Eastern British America; all of whom were also bearers of glad tid-Their united presence and various intelligence, with the reports from our Mission Stations, have given a character of ecumenical importance to our Assembly.

Accept, dear Brethren, our most cordial congratulation. Our hearts rejoice in the survey of the several departments of your advancing work. To have admitted to ordination seventeen faithful probationers, and to have received so many as forty-four candidates for the holy ministry, is indeed an evidence that He who alone can send forth labourers into the harvest is answering your prayers, giving you pledges of

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success, and also laying upon you a rapidly-increasing weight of responsibility. To guide these young men in the study of theology, as well as in that of literature and science, and so far prepare them to be such Teachers of a future generation as the probable advances of wealth, intelligence, and population in your rising province will require, demands unceasing vigilance. Deterioration of doctrine in many parts of the Protestant world occasions ourselves constant solicitude, but, with devout gratitude to God, we can express an assurance that the body of Wesleyan Methodists in this country, has not, in any degree, been injuriously affected thereby.

It is a chief glory of your Church that it labours to carry the glad tidings of salvation into newly-peopled districts of your own country. Even in England there are multitudes equally needy; and during the last year a highly encouraging advance has been made in preparing a more effective system of Home Missions. We venture to hope that the Reports of your labours may serve to cheer and instruct us in the prosecution of our own. Your zeal in promoting the religious education of all classes of Canadian society continues to command our admiration. The Bible has its right place in your schools; and to read and expound the Bible, without reserve or compromise, will tend to hallow every domestic relation. By the blessing of God, which is never withheld from those who teach the Divine statutes to their children, and strive to bring their children to the Lord Jesus Christ, such teaching cannot but strengthen the foundations of society, and insure for Canada a moral distinction like that which has rested on Great Britain from a very early period of Christian history until now. For it must be remembered that the Bible was read by the people of Christian Britain, and thus became part of the law of Saxon England; and that, in fulfilment of His gracious promise to honour them who honour Him, God has continued to us, their children, a heritage of honour to the present day. Cherish the same gift; impart it to your children; watch over its transmission with unslumbering jealousy. And that will save your children both from the taint of Popery and the mockery of Secularism.

Your declaration, that at no period of your history you

have endeavoured more faithfully to preach Wesleyan doctrines and maintain Wesleyan discipline, gives us the highest satisfaction. The perfection of these doctrines is that they exhibit the Lord Jesus Christ as the only Saviour of sinners and unequivocally set forth the all-sufficiency of His atonement to redeem from the curse of sin, and the power of the Holy Spirit to sanctify the believer fully. And, as we profess fidelity to the cause of Christ, we would both admonish each other and intreat you to insist on this truth with un-

diminished perspicuity and earnestness.

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Ever continue to uphold the discipline which was bequeathed to us by our fathers; and ever seek, even as now you do, to experience those mighty influences which, des scending on the Lord's Vineyard as refreshing showers, make it to flourish and be fruitful. Without these influences all would be barrenness and desolation; the fence of discipline would give way before the pressure of worldiness: and mere numerical increase and external prosperity would only render an early decay more palpable, and hasten and aggravate an irreparable ruin. Doubtless you keep your eye fixed upon the spiritual destitution of those who are without hope and without God in the world, whether they be rich or poor, whether they crowd into our churches or are scattered in the surrounding wilds. It is your desire to pursue, until you overtake, all wanderers from Christ, that you may recover them from their wanderings, and bring them back to Him. As a rising community whose resources multiply, and whose institutions grow with a rapidity seldom known in older countries, you cannot but find it necessary to test closely the profession of every one who joins your Church, and to search with most careful scrutiny for the evidences of personal religion in those whom you employ to minister in your congre-Thus, a mere outward profession will not be mistaken for an inward, soul-saving faith in the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world. We rejoice to see, as clearly as ever, both in your letters and your messengers, the marks of apostolical piety and simple-hearted zeal: in all your efforts we see evidences of the purest motive, and are most thankful for the tokens of Divine approval which crown your labours. The lamp of God burns brightly in your

sanctuary, and we pray that it may be kept burning from generation to generation.

With ourselves, the last year has been one of unbroken The return of a net increase of 6,260, in the number of members, shows that we have not merely found respite from the troubles to which you refer, but that we are again favoured with spiritual prosperity. We have admitted a large number of young men as candidates for the ministry. Our people, no longer distracted by contention, are now free to devote their undivided energies to the work of God; these energies are now put forth with renewed zeal and cheerfulness; new places of worship and new schools arise in no inconsiderable number; and the incumbrance of debt on trust-estates was lightened during last year, by private effort conjoined with the help of the Chapel Fund, to the extent of nearly £42,000. But so large a reduction of debt has been effected throughout the country, that it would be unjust to those whose liberality can be scarcely known beyond the limits of their own Circuits to mention here the comparatively small amount which has been officially brought to our knowledge. Each year appears to bring us perceptibly nearer to the happy time when the revenue of these estates shall be set free for the extension of the Church.

Be assured that the happy union between the British and the Canadian Conferences, of which you so kindly speak, is an occasion of the highest satisfaction to ourselves. Let us trust that this union has been settled on the best and surest foundations; and let us encourage you, making use of all the advantages it affords, to press onward in works of faith and labours of love, until you have overtaken the object of pursuit, and seen your Church established throughout Canada, intent on the one glorious object for which alone Christian churches are designed. May the God of truth and love prosper you with His blessing; May the Father of lights pour out the energy of His Holy Spirit on your Preachers and Teachers, and make them all wise to win souls; When your aged men and ours finish their pilgrimage, or when your strong men and ours fall in the field, may it be in the sure and certain hope of an inheritance in light, where we shall put off our armour,

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Tha at you to exp and share the everlasting triumph of Him who hath washed us and redeemed us from our sins in His own blood!

After careful deliberation, we have appointed the Rev. Dr. Stinson President of your next Conference, and the Rev. John Ryerson Co-Delegate.

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#### ADDRESS

OF THE

CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA, IN CONNEXION WITH THE BRITISH CONFERENCE, TO THE CON-FERENCE IN ENGLAND.

REVEREND AND BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,-

Your parentally affectionate address, presented to us by our highly esteemed brother, the Rev. Joseph Stinson, D.D., has been received with deep emotions of gratitude. The eminently christian spirit by which it is dictated and pervaded, the appropriate practical suggestions with which it abounds, and the salutary counsels it administers, so evincive of godly wisdom and matured experience, have strengthened our conviction of the great advantages of the union between us so happily existing, and for the perpetual maintenance of which we are resolved to pray and labour.

That the communications of our accredited Representatives at your last session were interesting to you we were prepared to expect. The vast and extending field of our grangelistic

toil, the means employed for its cultivation, and the Divine sanction so manifestly resting upon the operating agencies, could not fail to awaken sympathy and pleasure in hearts so imbued with the genuine missionary spirit as yours are known to be. Your kind reception and fraternal treatment of those brethren beloved, we hope properly to reciprocate as opportunity may be afforded.

The appointment of the Rev. Dr. Stinson as our President, has afforded us sincere gratification. His unaffected piety, pulpit ability, administrative talent, and urbanity of manner, joined with his well-remembered zeal and usefulness during his former residence in this country, commend him to our confidence, as highly qualified to promote the interests of the great work entrusted to his oversight. We offer thanksgiving to God, who conducted both him and his family hither in safety, and unanimously request of you his appointment to the same responsible office for the ensuing year.

Unforeseen circumstances having occurred, by which the office of Co-Delegate is left vacant, we recommend to you our much esteemed brother, the Rev. John Douse, as a suitable person to be appointed to that important office. His age, ministerial ability and fidelity, acquaintance with our ecclesiastical economy, and experience in the general regulation and management of our connexional funds, are among the considerations which have prompted this recommendation.

Of the Rev. Enoch Wood, who, for seven consecutive years, has honourably and efficiently discharged the onerous duties of the combined offices of President and General Super intendent of Missions, we cannot speak in terms of commendation so strong as we feel his great merit to demand. During his judicious administration, God has given most irrefragable proofs of his favour. Two hundred and seven Ministers have been admitted into our ranks. The membership of the Church exhibits a nett increase of twenty-two thousand eight hundred and ten. Our Mission field has been greatly extended. Many Domestic Missions have been constituted regular Circuits. All our connexional funds have made corresponding progress. Our venerable brother, by

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indefatigable labour, and by uniformly kind and firm administration, has endeared himself inexpressibly to us all, and has secured a place in the memory of future generations in this Province, such as only "the just" can inherit. Although you have been pleased to comply with his earnest request, by relieving him of the responsibilities of the Presidency, we rejoice that we are still to retain his valuable services in the General Superintendency of our Missions.

The past year has been characterized by unprecedented revulsions in the trade and commerce of the Province. Loud and monitory have been the rebukes divinely administered to the wordliness and mammon-worship, too prevalent both within and beyond the pale of the Church. Many, we trust have been effectually taught that "Verily there is a God that judgeth in the earth." A midst the embarrassment which has pressed so painfully upon all classes of society, we rejoice to find that our connexional funds have suffered less than might have been anticipated. In that fact, we have strong grounds of confidence, that, with the returning prosperity, of which, by the Divine blessing, there are promising indications, the means at our disposal for the consolidation and extension of the work of God will steadily increase, and that we shall be enabled to furnish our rapidly augmenting population with the Word of Life, and bring to bear upon them, with yet mightier effect, the incomparable means of social and religious improvement, found in the wisely administered economy of Methodism.

In reviewing the ecclesiastical year just closed, we are thankful to find that our labour has not been 'in vain in the Lord." Our District returns exhibit a nett increase of eight thousand one hundred and fifty members, with three thousand two hundred and twenty-seven on trial. So far as human judgment can decide, our societies are distinguished by a more intelligent piety, and a higher state of religious enjoyment than at any former period. At the present Conference we have received into full connexion thirty brethren beloved, who have honorably passed their probation, and thirty-four have been admitted on trial as candidates

for the Ministry.

As auxiliaries, our College and Book-Room have been rendering valuable service. A widening field of usefulness opens up before these important departments, and we have initiated measures, the result of which will be to give greatly increased means of efficiency to them. We are more than ever impressed with the importance of a sound system of religious education, and a healthy literature. These, we are resolved, by the blessing of God, to bring within the reach

of all our people.

Our present session has been one of much harmony, and cordiality of feeling and affection. On some of the measures which have occupied our attention, diversity of opinion has existed; but we have successfully sought to maintain the unity of spirit, in the bond of peace. God has been eminently present in our public religious services. We separate, for our respective allotments of holy toil, resolved to devote ourselves with renewed energy, to the great work of saving souls Our fervent prayers go up to the Father of mercies, that upon you, beloved fathers and brethren, and upon all the affiliated Conferences, which, like our own, are growing up under your fostering care and counsel, his continued care may rest, until by the universal proclamation of his undistinguishing love to our fallen race, and of his free and unsophisticated offer of a full salvation, through the infinite merit of the accepted sacrifice of his beloved Son, the prophetic prayer of our evangelic Founder shall be gloriously answered.

"Arise, O God! maintain thy cause, The fullness of the Gentiles call; Lift up the standard of thy cross, And all shall own thou diedst for all."

OF THE PRIMITIVE METHODIST CONFERENCE OF CANADA, TO THE WESLEYAN CONFER-ENCE OF CANADA.

DEAR BRETHREN,-

We, the Representatives of the Primitive Methodist Church in Canada, in Conference assembled, consider, that as in these days Christain union is much talked of by various sections of the Church, that as many Christian denominations are uniting in solemn prayer, for a Revival of God's work through the land; and that, as with respect to the great essentials of religion, we have a common faith, there is no reason to prevent Religious communities, so near akin as the Methodist Bodies are, acknowledging each other fraternally.

While we each take our stand as sections of the C ristian Church in this country, and endeavour to do our part in the work of God, though in reference to ecclesiastical polity we agree to think differently, yet surely we may greet and encourage each other in our common field of labour.

Bigotry and proselytism are alike objectionable, because they are so near akin. They toud to tighten and contract brotherly sympathies, and hinder the promotion of our holy religion, which is intended to establish the reign of universal love, and bring into one bond of brotherhood, all the family of man. How well, then, to come as near to each other as we can, that we may know and understand each other more, and in the spirit of true Christian Catholicity, show ourselves labourers in the same vineyard, workers together with God.

We submit that this can be done, while at the same time we may, at all fitting opportunities, adhere to our principles, and carry out our conscientious convictions, with respect to the best mode of religious operations and Church government.

We wish to show this in every suitable way, therefore, while we strictly hold to our identity and principles as a Christian Church, we should say hail to those who preach the same doctrines, and who accomplish instrumentally the work of saving souls.

We wish to love as brethren in Christ, and as proof of this, we send you this friendly Epistle, and pray, that brother-

ly love may abound and increase.
