SEEKS SCHOOL REFORM

G. LANGLOIS IS C: IAMPION OF EDUCATION IN QUEBEC.

the Powers Down on Him Becaus the Powers Down on Him Because of His Vigorous Propaganda Against Antiquated Instruction is Engaged in a Titanic Struggle for His People.

Mr. Godfroy Langlois, journalist, author and champion of educationa reform in Quebec, is finding the path of the reformer beset with difficul-

and out of reason, written about, spoken for and in every possible way fought for the spread of common knowledge.

Mr. Langlois is a good French-Canadian, but does not allow his fondness for his own people to cover their faults and failings. He severely attacks the glorification of "Jean Baptists" carried on by so many French-Canadian papers and speakers. This class of speakers tell the French-Canadian papers and speakers. This class of speakers tell the French-Canadians that they are the greatest people in the world; that they are the most liberty-loving, the freest and most progressive, and have achieved wonderful things in the making of Canada. Speaking of this, Mr. Langlois says: "As a people, we are the most inagnificent theorists in the civilized world, but we are absolutely lacking in practical initiative efforts." Referring again to educational matters in Quebee, he says: "We have wasted untold energy and "spilled ocean." of ink' in fighting the school questions in such provinces as New Brunswick, Manitobs and the District of Keewatin, while we remain totally indifferent to our own lack of educational equipment."

This question of educational reform, Mr. Langlois contends, is at the very foundation of Quebee's lack of progress. The French-Canadian is naturally just as bright, has just as keen and alert's mind as his English-speaking compatriot. The reason he has not made a greater success is because of his lack of education. The facts in regard to education in Quebee are, to say the least, startling. There are, seconding to the census returns, over 160,000 children of school age, between five and sixteen, who have never see the inside of a school, and over a quarter of a million people are unable to read or write. The schools in the province, which are very poorly attended, are kept open but for a few months in each year. The female teachers are miserably paid, the average yearly salary being but \$133, as compared with \$453 for Ontario female teachers. Even at that, the pay of Quebee teachers has almost

use at all."
During the past few years the Gouin Government have done a great deal for technical education. They dear for technical education. They have built and equipped, at a cost of \$1,500,000, splendid technical schools in both Montreal and Quebec, as well as establishing in Montreal a school for the study of the higher branches of commercial life. They have also established many normal schools, agricultural colleges and other edu-

established many normal schools, agricultural colleges and other educational institutions. The great trouble is that they have begun at the top instead of at the bottom. The children of the peor people either do not go to school at all, or else are taught in the common schools by untrained and unqualified teachers.

A striking example of what children in Quebeo are taught is shown by the following remarkable text book. This book, described as "An elementary history of England, from the most ancient time to our day," is now in its fortieth edition, "revised and corrected and approved by the Council of Public Instruction, the 15th May, 1912." The book is printed at Levis, Quebeo. The following is an exact translation of chapter 6, which gives a description of the "present possessions of the English in America," viz.:

"The English possess all the north

"The English possess all the north of America under the name of New Britain. That immense country is divided into seven parts: Labrador, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia to the northeast; Canada in the centre; New Wales to the west of Hudson Bay, the region of the lakes to the west of New Wales and Canada, and, finally New Caledonia west of the region of the lakes. The coasts of New Caledonia have received the names of New Cornwall and of New Hanover. Labrador is a very cold country inhabited by Esquimaux, who live on fish. Nova Scotia is an important peninsula to the south of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Halifax, in the southeast, is its capital, and does a large trade in furs. New Brunswick, situated northwest of Nova Scotia, but St. John is its most important city. Canada, north of the United States, is divided into two parts—Upper Canada and Lower Canada. The principal cities of the first are York, on Lake Ontario, and Kingston on the River St. Lawrence. The second includes Montreal, on the Island formed by the same river, and Quebec, capital of all Canada, and the residence of the Governor-General of Canada. New Wales and New Caledonia are two regions of which little is yet known. They have no importance except for the furst that are taken there."

The Areadia was owned by Sylvanus Smith & Co., of Glonester. Her crew put up at the Sailor's Home and were sent to their homes today.





Montreal Drug Man, Who Died Re-

cently, Spent AH His Energies In His Later Years In the Work of Caring For Tubercular Girls-Lest His Whole Family In Same Mer-

ciful Task.

The recent death of Mr. Henry J. Dart, founder of the Grace Dart Home, removed a striking personality from business and philanthropic circles in this city. Mr. Dart had been ill since February, and was suffering from cancer.

The late Mr. Dart was president of the wholesale drug firm of Chapman Dart & Co., 155 Oraig street west, and the founder of the Grace Dart Home. It is dombiful if any man in Montreal took a more active part in charitable work of practically every kind, than he did. He was bound up heart and soul in the Grace Dart Home, the work of which has been carried on mainly through his efforts and has grown from an institution which was at first only capable of caring for two or three patients until it is now regarded as one of the leading institutions of its kind in the city.

The Home was dedicated to the memory of Grace Dart, his second daughter, by his first wife, It was while this daughter was still a young woman that Mr. Dart decided to enter into this branch of work, and opened a portion of his own home for the treatment of tuberculosis patients.

Rural Dean Dart, at present located at St. Lambert, and a sister who resides with her brother at St. Lambert, these being the only three members of the family.

On his arrival in Montreal it was his intention to study for the ministry, but after working a short time in the employ of Messrs. A MINISTER'S SALARY.

Lfoyd George Tells What Becomes of Mr. Lloyd George gave some inter-esting particulars regarding his finan-cial standing in giving evidence be-fore the Marconi committee a few

esting particulars regarding his financial standing in giving evidence before the Marconi committee a few days ago.

"When a man becomes a Minister," he said, "he is given a substantial salary, and it was very substantial to me, having regard to the life I led at that time as a solicitor. It was very substantial, and I won't deny it. The only thing I wish to say about it is that it, was not larger than that received by my predecessor, as there is a suggestion that I am the first Chancellor to receive £5,000 a year.

"Every Minister knows his position is precarious, and his glories transitory and he has to take that into account and must think of the time when others, more worthy than himself, will fill the same position. As we know by history, pastices come and parties go. Ministers have to change, and he must look to the fact that any day he may drop. With regard to that, I, therefore, had to consider what every Minister has to consider in my position—not to live quite up to your income, but to set something aside, and I have done it. I have invested.

"My total investments bring me."

sside, and I have done it. I have invested.

"My total investments bring me about £400 a year. That is my great fortune. With regard to mansions, I have only one house which I can call my own. I have one house in Wales. Cannot a man fifty years of age have one house to call his own? It is rather hard. I built a house three or four years ago. I was so busy with the budget I could not even spend my salary. The contract, I think, was something over £2,000. That is my mansion. That is all I have got in the world."

Mr. Lloyd George might have summed up his plea that a Cabinet Minister should not be traduced because, out of his salary! he seeks to make out of his salary, he seeks to make provision by investment for the future, in the words of Burke: "If a Minister sees that the state takes no detriment, the state must see that his affairs should take as little." In those words the whole position of the Minister without large private means is summed up by one of the purest of politicians, and the sentence was quoted with great earnestness by Peel before the Committee of the House which, in 1850, was considering whether official apprices should be reduced. In point of fact, many of our most prominent politicians have been poor men.

oor men. Of Chancellors of the Exchequer Of Chancellors of the Exchequer there are Pitt, Canning, Lord John Russell, "Winsittart, Spring Rice, North, and Lord Randolph Churchill. Chatham's private income when he entered politics was £160 a year. Vansittart was glad to accept a special pension of £3,000 a year when he was "kicked upstairs." Burke was always a poor man. North had to accept £20,000 from the King to pay his most crushing debts. Ferceval eked out his salary as Chancellor with that of a second office. For had a good deal less than nothing. Spring Rice was provided for by a sinecure.

Among the Congregationalists, says The West minster Gazette, Lady Spicer holds a unique position. She appears to be the only woman member of the existing Council of the Congregational Union, being one of the thirty representatives of the London Union. At the opening, some weeks ago, of a new Congregational church in Northwest London, Lady Spicer made a plea for more use to be made of members of her sex in the government of the churches.

Took Years to Develop:

The control of London traffic by the police has been a matter of slow evolution, says The London Chronicle. A century ago when George IV. dined with the Lord Mayor soon after his accession, it took his escort five hours to force a way through the crowd, which filled the streets from his palace to the Guildhall. And it was not until about thirty years ago that the existing system of regulating traffic at crossings was instituted. At the beginning it required four policemen at every important junction to do with difficulty what two constables and sometimes one now effect by a motion of the hand. But the men in blue stuck to their task asd hung on to horses' heads and summoned rebellious drivers till the reign of law and order was established. Took Years to Develop.

Perhaps one of the best stories told of Lord Claud Hamilton, chairman of the Great Eastern Railway and M.P. for South Kensington, who has announced his settlement from Parliament at the next election, is that concerning a remark he once made when speaking to the electors whose suffrages he was seeking. "Gentlemen," he said, "I have been spoker of as a bloated aristocrat." Then, passing his hand down his thin chest "Gentlemen, is that quite fair? Am I bloated?" He was never afterward; called a bloated aristocratic in that constituency.
