

R. or any other trans-portation company would 'bridge' Ja-maica and St. John with a fast line of steamers, there is little doubt that ev-erything would be thoroughly done and, I will further add without the slightest hesitancy, that the undertak-ing would be a financial success." The speaker was G. Eustace Burke, who is in the city for the purpose of promoting closer trade relations bet-ween Jamaica and Canada. Mr. Burke is a member of the firm of G. Eustace Burke & Bros., mayor of Kingston, Jamaica, and commercial agent for Canada in Jamaica. Owing to his prominent position in the business life of that colony, he knows whereof he speaks. Mr. Burke simply takes the facts of the case and from them argues as to the success of the venture. On the one hand we have Jamaica buying every year large quantities of white pine and decal lumber. Now, it is estimated that ninety per cent. of this originated in Canada, but it has been diverted to American ports by reason of their greater transportation facilities. Again, there is an even chance for New Brunswick merchants to supply Jamaica with dried and pic-uled fish. In return St. John would be able to capture the bulk of the Canadian fruit

kied fish. In return St. John would be able to capture the bulk of the Canadian fruit trade. As we form the Atlantic ter-minus of the C. P. R. there would be every facility for supplying our own and the upper Canadian markets. Besides developing a large freight raffic, a fast line of steamships, with good passenger accommodations, would greatly increase the tourist traffic bet-ween St. John and Kingston.






