



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

The Telegraph presented an unanswerable argument against the Reciprocity Pact when it recently attacked Dr. E. S. Kirkpatrick, late Dominion Trade Commissioner to Cuba, for opposing Reciprocity because it would prevent the formation of a company which he is trying to promote for the purpose of shipping Canaddian products to Canada. In the past, trade between Canada and Cuba has been largely done through New York. It will surely be to the benefit of Canada to transfer that business to St. John, Halifax and Montreal. This is the patriotic work upon which Dr. Kirkpatrick is engaged and which free trade between Canada and the United States would help to prevent.
