

Sir Wilfrid Laurier made that statement as Prime Mords in the House of Commons on March 7, 1911 before leaving for the Imperial Conference. "I have advocated a policy of that kind so far as Canada is concerned," he told the House of Commons, "in Parliament and on the public platform, and I see no reason to take "back anything I have ever said." The first bill, introduced in 1908, provided for a series of four 20-minute changes to be made in the spring, to be recompensed by four similar counter changes in the autumn of each year. The Select Committee of the House of Commons, however, recommended that the time should be altered to the extent of one hour only, instead of eighty minutes; and that the complete hour should be accounted for in one day, instead of dividing it into sections. Thus, at 2 o'clock on the third Sunday in April, standard time should advance 60 minutes, and at 2 o'clock on the third Sunday in September, the time should be retarded 60 minutes. A Sunday in April would only have 23 hours and a Sunday in September would count 25 hours. The

results of this seemingly simple matter are shown to be very far-reaching.

Expenditures on artificial light would be reduced for five months of the year, and on this saving alone it has been computed that in 25 years, one year's supply of fuel would be economized; not only this, but the lesser amount of coal being consumed would mean a purer atmosphere. 
