

The first investiture of the members of the college of cardinals with the red hat, as the insignia of their disnity, took place 667 years ago today. The red hat as a symbol of the sacred college was adopted by Pope Innocent IV. at the Council of Lyons in 1245. With the passing of the centuries it has become the chief mark of cardinal rank, so that to "receive the hat" is in common parlance synonymous with being made a cardinal.

The color was adopted as a constant reminder to the wearer that he should always be ready to shed his blood in martyrdom for the Church, especially against the Emperor Frederick, who was deposed by the Council of Lyons. Varennes also declares that the rehat had from earliest times been the color of supreme dignity, and quot the prophet Naham, "The shield o his mighty men is made of red, the valiant men are in scarlet."

In the course of time the red hat has become a large and all but unwearable creation of silk and tassels.
