

Thousands of Men Annually Drop
Out of Sight--why?

More than 5,000 persons annually disappear in the United States and are never heard from again. At first blush the assertion seems incredible, but police statistics furnish confirmation. The actual figures, based on a conservative calculation, are even more alarming that those given. In fact, the reports of the police departments of the larger cities show that in the twelve months just past 16,008 of the persons who disappeared during the year were never reported as found; but the shrewd police officers, accustomed to the eccentricities of human nature, are of the opinion that the return of many thousands of these presents, through shame are indifference.
