this line would not only help but greatly

tations on the furnishing of water from
the town system, for use as a labor canal,
Lawrence Dock, make a fair one as
possible in order to do what little is in
our power to forward this work.

SUSSEX CHEESE AND BUTTER FACTORY

—The Sussex cheese and butter factory
was started on the 1st of June last and
was operated by the company for five
months, and during that time manufac-
tured of butter and cheese, what
was equal to 25 tons of cheese, and
the whole output was readily sold. The
manager informed us that he could have
sold five times as much. The prospects
are that a much larger quantity of both
butter and cheese will be made the
coming season. The factory is worked
in manufacturing butter during the
winter and early spring months by J.
W. Hart, who has charge of it in the
interest of the Dominion government.
This will continue until April, when the
company will again resume work. The
reason why the government assumed
control was that they wished to aid the
manufacture of butter for the English
market and could more readily place
the product upon the market than a
private company.—Record.

DAIRYMEN'S ASSOCIATION.—The an-
nual meeting of the Sackville Dairy-
men's Association held in Union hall
on the 10th inst was one of interest and
profit. At the meeting three new mem-
bers were added to the association and
the present outlook is that the members
of the Sackville Dairyman's Association
No. 4 mean business and intend that
the association shall take a foremost
rank among its sister associations in the
Province. The next meeting is to be
held in Union hall on Monday evening
the 23rd, when the following questions
will be discussed, viz: "Should the
farmers of Sackville go more largely in-
to dairying, than in the past, and if so
what method should be adopted?" The
question to be opened by G. A. Fawcett
followed by the president J. J. Ander-
son and other members. The question
is an important one to the farmers and
it is expected the meeting will be a
large one as a number have expressed
their intention to join at the next meet-
ing.

L. Slipp, of Truro, for \$150. Two
Harry Wilkes colts, under a year old,
were sold for \$80 and \$65 respect-
ively.

Provision has been made by the
Cumberland county council for the
maintenance of the industrial school
at Halifax of the boy Arthur Phinney,
who is now awaiting his trial before
Judge Morse on the charge of setting
fire to Fren C. Wood's barn at True
manville on Xmas day, should the
judge decide to send him to that
school. The boy is a nine years of
age and without parents.

At the special general meeting of
the shareholders of the Record Foundry
& Machine Co., held at their office
last Friday, Mr. A. E. Peters pres-
ident in the chair, a bye law was un-
animously passed for the purpose of
the stock of the company from
\$35,000 to \$60,000. The aim of
the company is to further expand the busi-
ness. The necessary application has
been through the Provincial Secretary's
department for power to carry out the
