Cork, March 20.—The delay of Parnell in responding to Healy's defiance, in which the latter announced that he was ready to take up the former's challenge that they should both resign their seats in Parliament and come forward as candidates for re-election as a test of the popular sympathy with the Parnellite and McCarthyite causes respectively, has caused the Parnellites of this city to telegraph to Parnell urging him to state his intentions immediately.

To the Editor of the Advertiser:

The proposed grant of \$2,400 to the city clerk, as a retiring allowance, is so outrageous that I cannot think it will pass the Council. It is true that Mr. Abbott has served the city faithfully (as civic servants go) for a long period, but it is equally true that he has throughout that period drawn a large salary with unfailing regularity, and is now in easy and independent circumstances. If such a precedent be established where will it end? Every servant of the corporation would have a right to expect to be treated on the same principle. It is well known that Mr. Abbott has through old age been for some time incompetent for the discharge of his duties, and it would have been a much more dignified course for him to have retired voluntarily years ago. If he is entitled to any bonus I think he has already received too much, in the form of salary which he was incompetent to earn. In any event the amount suggested is simply ridiculous. We occasionally hear of the shareholders of banks and other wealthy corporations giving a retiring servant three or six months' salary, but they give their own money, not that of other people. Who ever heard of such a bonus as three years' salary being paid to anybody? The superannuation allowance to civil servantz who have during the longest terms of service annually paid into the superannuation fund a portion of their salaries is insignificant compared with the sum proposed to be paid to Mr. Abbott, who has never paid a cent into any such fund. Any alderman who allows political or other influences to seduce him into supporting such a seandalous squandering of our money may expect to hear more about it than will be agreeable if he ever offers himself for re-election.

Foster, Minister of Finance, does not credit the report that British Guiana has rejected the Canadian Government's proposals for a reciprocity treaty in favor of a similar arrangement with the United States." The truth is this whole scheme of seeking trade with the West Indies and South America, to the exclusion of the United States, seems doomed to failure. The reason lies in the fact that the trade of the islands and Southern countries with the neighboring republic is already so large and the market in the United States so much greater than could be possibly obtained in Canada that no man of sense could expect the colonists to discriminate in our favor and against their larger trade with the United States.

We observe, also, that in his speech at
the opening of the Barbados Legislature
last month the Governor of the colony, Sir
Walter J. Sendall, strongly declared against the proposals recently made by Mr. Foster, the Canadian Minister of Finance, for reciprocal trade relations between Barbados and Canada to the exclusion of the United States. The Governor pointed out that the McKinley Bill contains a menace of possibilities which, should they ever be realized, would upset all calculations on Canada's proposals, and introduce confusion and embarrassment into both the commerce and the revenue of the island. In taking this stand the Governor gives official expression to the sentiments unanimously held and expressed by the merchants and the people of Barbados. All the news-papers of the colony have strongly opposed the proposition for a transference of any part of the island's trade from the United States to Canada, or any interference whatover with that trade. This is ominous.

The Canadian taxpayers may be compelled to pay \$100,000 or more a year in steamship subsidies with the object of trying to force a trade with the West Indies and British Guiana, but we have never disguised from ourselves the contingency that whatever trade is obtained will have to be secured in competition with the United States. And as we are asked to believe by our Conservative friends that nothing is more to be feared than competition with our neighbors, the outlook is not at all our neighbors, the outlook is not at all bright. Our progressive men would rather have near than far-off markets. Why should we not cultivate all the trade we can in the

St. Paul, Minn., March 20.—Reports from points along the line of construction of the Great Northern extension through northern Montana show that at Cut Bank, the present terminus of the line, heavy storms have totally suspended work, throwing 2,000 men out of employment. 

The study of medicine is becoming very popular with the native women of India. At the close of the academic session in 1889 there were 24 female students at the Calcutta Medical College, 14 at the Campbell Medical School and 5 at the Cuttack Medical School. At Agra, during the year, 7 young women received licenses to practice. At Lahore there were 19 and at Madras 39 female medical students. How to Use Onions.

There is probably no vegetable raised that possesses so many medicinal qualities as the onion, and none is so grossly maligned or so unjustly criticised. True the odor is strong, penetrating and not very pleasant; but oftentimes our best friends have very ungainly forms or homely faces, for which we do not for an instant blame them, but, more often, thinking of the kind heart which actuates their deeds, we cease to think of or notice their personal defects. So when we realize that the much traduced onion will relieve pain or save a doctor's bill, we should not think so meanly of it.

A few drops of the juice of a roasted onion will instantly relieve the ear-ache; and if the sufferer be a child it almost invariably will fall into a refreshing slumber, from which to awake free from pain.

The quickest way to prepare the onion is to wrap it in heavy, wet paper and cover it with coals. In a short time it will be tender and the juice can easily be squeezed into a spoon and dropped into the ear while still warm.

Onlons roasted in the same way, mashed and applied as a hot poulties to throat and lungs are a most excellent remedy for hoarseness or for a cold that has settled on the lungs, while the ordinary cold will often saccumb to a hearty meal of fried onions.

The most effective cough medicine we ever used is onion syrup. Take four or five good-sized onions, peel, slice and boil in one quart of good vinegar till tenden. Strain through a cloth to extract all the juice, add one cup of white sugar and boil down about one-half. Bottle and save for use. If kept in a cool place it will keep for several months. A dose is from one to two teaspoonfuls from one to two hours, according to age of patient and severity of cough.

Thick slices of raw onion applied to a bee sting and often renewed, will seen draw out the poison and prevent the swelling of the injured part.

As an article of diet the onion is one of the most heathful of vegetables and a small one added to all meat or vegetable soups makes a decided improvement, and persons who cannot eat onions when cooked alone relish them in soups, provided just enough is added to give a pleasant flavor, but not enough to make them taste onlony.—[The Housewife.

A Chapter on Churns

Winter dairying, with butter-making as its special feature, is bound to come to the front in Canada. Among other important matters the dairy farmer will require to give careful attention to the selection of nsils for cream raising and churning. When the former is properly accomplished there may be considerable loss of butter fat and injury to the quality of the butter the latter process is not correctly at-nded to. The first point is to secure the tended to. The first point is to secure the right sort of churn, and just here a word of advice may be of service to our readers. Avoid complicated novelties. Give oilytongued agents a wide berth, who claim that their patent fixture will get more butter out of cream than any other churn in creation and do it in "less than no time." By being run at a furious rate of speed some of them may beat the butter out of a couple of quarts of cream in as many minutes, but give them a reasonable amount of work and they will probably not do so well as a simpler instrument. Prof. W. A. "The best churn to buy is the simplest;
this is a simple box or barrel that turns
over and over. In buying a churn of this
class see that it is strongly bound together,
so that the falling cream will not pound it
to pieces. Next, look to the opening
which should be ample—the larger the
better—in order to remove the butter easily
and to facilitate washing and airing. See
that the cover is easily managed and fits
closely. Some of the late improvements in
the covers of barrel and box churns are
very satisfactory. Barrel and box churns the covers of barrel and box churas are very satisfactory. Barrel and box churas are the simplest in construction and conse-quently the lowest in price of any on the market, so that the best is not only the cheapest but the lowest priced. Avoid all churas with inside fixtures such as dashes, chures with inside fixtures such as dashes, paddles and scrapers. A churn with those paddles in turns out no more butter and makes it no easier than a revolving churn. They are difficult to wash and keep tean. All churns with paddles retire bearings; these grind up the cream to grease and blacken it, often making the butter unsightly. Many of the patents on churns are for devices to acrate the cream. Most of these are simply ridiculous. If we wish to get air through the cream we can do it most effectually by having it tumble about in a revolving barrel or box."

At the recent annual meeting of the Dominion Shorthorn Breeders' Association, Toronto, statistics and officers-elect of which we have already published, Secretary Wade called the attention of the association. Wade called the attention of the associa-tion to a resolution passed at the last meeting of the Board of the Agricultural and Arts Association, to the effect that the necessity should be impressed upon the Provincial Government of measures being at once taken to secure, through the co-operation of all industries, a worthy ex-hibit from the Province at the World's Pair at Chicago in 1803 and impressing Fair, at Chicago in 1893, and impressing the willingness of the Board to aid in disseminating such information as would induce the stock raisers to exhibit their herds. The resolution appended by the secretary was to the effect that it behooves the Shorthorn breeders to prepare their stock for the contest with the view of getting together an unsur-passed exhibit, as no doubt all the ex-traneous expense of feight and mainten-ance will be provided by the Dominion Government, whether Conservative or Re-form, and it has also been agreed in Con-gress that all articles which shall be imtheir stock for the contest with

gress that all articles which shall be imported from foreign countries for the sole purpose of exhibition, upon which there are duties, shall be admitted free and returned free of charge unless sold.

The committee brought in a further recommendation dealing with the desirability of impressing the Ontario Government with the importance of such an exhibit as the best opportunity of advertising the Province and its productions that could possible occur; and advising that a deputation be named to wait on the Government with the view of carrying out the ernment with the view of carrying out the bove suggestions.
The committee were instructed to wait

upon the Government, with power to add to their number, and it was also resolved to wait on the Dominion Government with the Save the Timber.

At a meeting held recently in New York to discuss the needs of preserving the forests Morris K. Jesup thus spoke of some of the results of the extravgant destruction of timber land in that State: "The importance to the commercial and business interests of the State of preserving the Adirondack watershed from further demudation of its forest areas cannot be overestimated. The destruction has already gone too far and dire consequences have already followed. The rivers and streams of the whole region have been seriously affected within the memory of living men; they have decreased in summer from 30 to 50 per cent. In the last five years the normal height of the North River in Warren county has decreased six feet during the freshets." Similar damage from forest destruction is reported from all over the country, and evidently it is indeed high time that something were done to prevent in future wholesale denuding of timber lands.

Labeling and Registering Trees.

Many orchardists and owners of fruit gardens set out fruit trees to some extent during the past year; the labels giving their names being exposed to wind and weather during the whole winter, have either become detached or defaced before another year. Sometimes the names are neglected for a few years, and when the new kinds begin to bear, then for the first time it is discovered that they are gone. There are two easy remedies for all this trouble-Register the names in a common account book, which you frequently turn to; and put on the zinc labels, which we have described on some former occasions, consisting merely of a narrow strip of sheet zinc, a few inches leng, with the narrow end passed once around the side branch. The name, written on the slightly rusted face with a common lead-pencil, will last a life-jame.—(Country Gentleman.

Ephraim Groff, of Waterloo county, offers the following suggestions regarding cattle for export:

"Not being a corn-producing country, Amada has not the natural facilities for stock-feeding that it otherwise would have, consequently it becomes more imperative for farmers to make a judicious use of the

coarse grains at their command. Farmer coarse grains at their command. Farmers must breed a better class of cattle and feed them from fall till spring with a view to producing well-finished export beeves instead of simply wintering them and sending them out in the spring into the stocker market like many of the present year. Frequently when the Canadian cattle were placed upon market in Great Britain this year, buyers and butchers asked what the Canadian farmers were feeding their cattle, "Nothing but sawdust and chaff?" remarking that they do not look like cattle for a beef market but simply stockers. Unless the farmers breed a better class of cattle, feed and finish them so as to make them firm and able to stand the trip of 3,000 miles which they will have to take, the trade will neither be remunerative to the farmer nor to the shippers. It will no longer pay to export half-fed and rough cattle to Britain, incurring the heavy costs of transportation and realizing only third-deep pairse. Canadian eattle must nust breed a better class of cattle and fee costs of transportation and realizing only third-class prices. Canadian cattle must compete in the British market with the home-bred and home-fed cattle of Great Britain and if not extra well finished no more than third-class prices can be ex-

Does Sub-soiling Pay?

pected"

Prof. J. W. Sanborn says: "Several trials reported by me gave results adverse to sub-soiling, except in dry years, when subsoiled ground contained more moisture as it did in all years. On our compact subsubsolled ground contained more moisture as it did in all years. On our compact subsoil the water runs into the depression forced by the subsoiled section, and in wet years saturates the subsoiled ground. Will not drainage remedy this evil? Duplicate plats were drained both for subsoiled and non-subsoiled ground crop turnips. The conditions of the trial now being reported, I believed, have been thoroughly sound. The season was dry in early spring, very wet in late spring, and very dry in mid-summer—forming a good year for the trial. Lot 1, subsoiled, gave 22,020 pounds of turnips, while lot 2, unsubsoiled, gave 25,980 pounds, Lot 3, subsoiled, gave 25,980 pounds, and lot 4, unsubsoiled, gave 24,860 pounds. This is a clear draw, or the result is the same as heretofore averaged. I make but little question as the result of several years' trials, that the soils where subsoiling will average to pay soils where subsoiling will average to pay are very rare indeed, and that the practice as a whole is unprofitable. The work re-ferred to was done at the Missouri Agricul-tural Experiment Station. Hints for Bee-Keepers.

Hints for Bee-Keepers.

Snow around the hives is no detriment. It is porous, and enough air can penetrate it for ventilation in winter. When it forms ice at the entrance, then it must be cleaned away. An examination during and after a thaw is very necessary.

Do not be alarmed if you find a few doad bees at the entrance of your hives. A few of them will naturally die of old age, and to have the survivors carry them out when the temperature will permit, is an indication of vigor.

The wise boe-keeper will now lay his plans for next season's work; provide his hives, surplus boxes, frames, and, above all, inform himself as to the operations of successful bee-keeping. To do this, he should take at least one bee-paper, for in no other way can one so well inform himself as by the records of those who are making bee-culture a success. It will enable the bee-culture a success. It will enable the expert to keep up with the times, and the expert to keep up with the times, and the beginner to acquaint himself with not only the necessary but the best fixtures, in order to begin intelligently, and to continue in the right direction.—[Walter S. Pouder, in the Indiana Farmer.

Regulating importations.

Importers of animals for breeding who have been subjected to no little annoyance at several of our custom houses of late will be glad to know that the Secretary of Agriculture has induced the Secretary of the Treasury to instruct custom officers that the production of the certificates of registry, with the affidavit of identification, is considered sufficient to indicate the purity of bread of imported animals, and that department regulations are amended so that upon the entry of animals claimed to be specially imported for breeding purposes, under the provisions of the free list, the "certificate of purity of bread given by the breeder of the animals" will not be required.

I have known bee-keepers to move their bees to the locality of alfalfa fields when the alfalfa in their neighborhood had been plowed up. Alfalfa, when cultivated for profit to the producer, is not allowed to blossom to its full capacity, as it is out or pastured off before that age. I have seen bees going almost like a swarm to alfalfa in bloom, and again have seen nice blooming alfalfa and again have seen nice blooming affaifa bee when you could not find a single about it.—[S. W. Somerville stated to the Minnesota Society that he manured his bearing orchard every year at the rate of 40 loads to the acre, mulching thoroughly. He has trees that have stood 28 years, that are as healthy as they were 20 years ago. He sold four tons of apples this season from an orchard 7 by 9 rods in size. With this manuring his trees bear every year. Producing fruit tends to exhaust a tree, and hence the importance of feeding bearing trees, while cultivation only of young ones may be sufficient.

The news was brought to town that the child had been assaulted by a tramp and the house set on fire. The officers immediately drove to the place with a physician, who soon determined that there was no truth in the report of assaulte.

The only thing of general interest that occurred in the Seventh Day Conference at Battle Creek was the report of the financial condition of the general conference for the year ending June 30, 1890. This report shows that there are 227 ministers in the different districts, also 184 licentiates. There are 1,016 churches, with a membership of 29,711 people. There has been raised by tithes a total of \$225,433 98, and on June 30 a balance of \$5,197 50 was in the treasury, the difference having been used in the necessary expenses of the denomination. In attempting to start the machine the belt caught his dothing and he was drawn around the pulley. The boy was drawn round and round the shaft. His left arm had been torn off near the shoulder and hung by the skin. It was amputated. His left leg was frightfully crushed and amputation at the knee was performed. The right leg and left collar bone were both fractured. His recovery is very doubtful.
