[Special to the ADVERTISER.] OTTAWA, Ont., June 14.—Things are indeed reaching a crisis in the history of parliamentary government in Canada when a prominent and trusted leader of parliamentary government in Canada when a prominent and trusted leader of one of the great parties in the State declares from his seat in the House that if legislation like the gerrymander is to continue to be forced on the minority, resort might be had to something stronger than denunciation. A part of the speech delivered by the Hon. David Mills was a hardly-veiled warning that the subversion of the spirit of the constitution might lead hardly-veiled warning that the subversion of the spirit of the constitution might lead to physical resistance if that was the only means by which a recognition of the rights of the people could be obtained and the public conscience awakened. These were not Mr. Mills' exact words, they will be found below, but it is a fair paraphrase of them. Mr. Mills distinctly raised the level of the debate. He considered this bill as an entension of the fraud of 1882, and as legislation calculated to hill as an entension of the fraud of 1882, and as legislation calculated to work mischief. The time had come to ask whither are we drifting? There were matters in regard to which they could as party men differ, but redistribution was a duty on Parliament, not the Executive. "I do not know," continued Mr. Mills, "if this measure is adopted, what may be the consequence of it; but I ask the honorable gentlemen opposite to seriously consider it. In my opinion it is absolutely impossible to maintain this union if this policy of one of the great parties in the State making war on the other great party is

of the great parties in the State making war on the other great party is to be sanctioned." With increasing indignation and in significant language, the henorable gentleman went on: "While you may begin a contest by an intellectual fight in Parliament, it is very likely to grow to something far more serious than what honorable gentlemen suppose in their attempt to establish by unfair means the permanent supremacy of one party in this country over the other." Mr. Mills proceeded to show that the union was established in accordance with the spirit and principle of British Parliamentary institutions, and if these were not mentary institutions, and if these were not

To use the power of the Executive to establish the ascendancy of party was un-British, and violated the spirit of the constitution. This bill tied hand and foot not only the minority in this House, but bound the electors by preventing a free expression of public opinion. This was an abuse of power so gross that it became the duty of the Opposition to avail themselves of all the means at their disposal to prevent it becoming law. In support of this doctrine he quoted Lord Salisbury. Alluding to the preservation of municipal boundaries he pressed upon the House the propriety of preserving what he termed the organic life of the community because the Dominion did not divide the country into districts but was itself made up of an aggregation of districts which existed long before Confederation. 

Bumble Bees.

Bumble bees are generally supposed to be of no particular use in the world. They are assive and industrious honey-gatherers, but there are never enough of them in one but there are never enough of them in one colony to make a store that is worth taking. When winter comes the queen be seeks a place for hiding during the cold months, beneath mess or in a heap of leaves. The warm sun of approaching summer awakens her and she crawls out. Immediately she looks about for a nest to breed in. She then begins collecting pollen for the nest, fetching load after load until she has formed a ball, perhaps as much as an inch in diameter. In the ball of pollen she lays her eggs, and after a few days they are hatched, bringing forth little worm-like larvas.

The larvæ feed upon the nutritious material, consuming the portions nearest at hand, until each one has cleared a little room. Then it proceeds to spin a cocoon around itself, and after a little while it comes out of this chrysalis a full-fledged worker-bee. Almost immediately these new fledged bees begin gathering pollen, which they add to the original lump, while the queen goes on laying eggs in it as long the queen goes on laying eggs in it as long as warm weather lasts.





SEAT IN THE BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

Hon. Edward Blake has been asked by the Irish Parliamentary party, by unanimous resolution, to accept an Irish seat in the House of Commons at the ensuing British elections. This tribute to the worth of the distin-

guished statesman is well deserved. Everybody knows that Mr. Blake, though a native Canadian, is the son of Irish parents, but it is not generally known that his great-grandfather was a well-known member for an Irish constituency in the Chamber to which Mr. Blake Is now urgently called. We refer to Wm. Hume, M. P. for the county of Wicklow. If Mr. Blake accepts nomination for a seat in the British House of Commons, which means his election beyond a doubt, it would not be surprising if the native Canadian statesman were re-turned for one of the divisions of the county so worthily represented by his great-grandfather. He would have no difficulty in securing election, for both ridings of the county favor Home Rule by a majority of three to one.

On the question of the right of Irishmen to manage their own local affairs, Mr. Blake has always held strong opinions. In 1886 he was the author of a resolution brought into Parliament strongly affirming that right, and in 1887, in an address re-ferring to the question, he said he hoped and trusted that Home Rule would soon be assured. These are the burning words which he uttered:

which he uttered:

"I hope and trust so in the interest of the empire at large, in the interest of the two islands, in the interest of Canada, which is so deeply concerned in the quenching of the fires of discord and alienation born out of wrong and injustice, fires which have burned so long and so fiercely and with such deplorable results on this as on the other side of the water, and which can be extinguished only by the establishment of a just and reasonable control by the Irish people over their local states." ment of a just and reasonable control by the Irish people over their local affairs."

The appearance of Mr. Blake, a native Canadian, in the British Parliament, would mark a distinct epoch in the history of the Empire. We have had men like Earl Grey, Lord Mountstephen, Hon. Mr. Lowe, Sir Gavin Duffy, and, if we mistake not, Mr. Goschen, emigrating to the polonies and making a name for themselves, returning to Great Britain to take a front rank in Parliamentary councils, but if Mr. Blake consents to enter the Imperal House of Commous, he will be the first native every principle."

Writing after having listened to the speeches of leading members on both sides of the British House of Commons, we have tate not to affirm that this Canadian states man is fitted to take a position alongside of any of the first half-dozen statesmen on the front benches on either side of the House. From the first he could be relied upon to secure a hearing second only to that accorded to the British Grand Old Man himself. It was a happy thought of the Irish Parliamentary party, in the Irish Parliamentary party, in the present crisis, to request the Canadian tribune to enter Parliament as an exponent of their views. But once in Parliament, we would expect Mr. Blake to take a powerful stand in favor of many other reforms that press for settlement in Britain. His voice would be raised against class legislation of every kind, and in favor of the amplioration of those who sit on these benches are the vertical continuous of the common people. And it need hardly be added, Mr. Blake would not forget his native land while holding a cent le an imperial assembly. HON. DAVID MILLS AND COL. O'BRIEN ON A PARLIAMEN-TARY OUTRAGE.

Hon. David Mills, in his speech prior to the second reading of the Gerrymander Bill, strongly arraigned the measure as designed to rob one-half of the people of their proper share of parliamentary representation, while at the same time enacting that the constituencies should be prevented from giving a free expression of opinion on the

The member for Bothwell warned Sir John Thompson that he might go too far in using his executive authority to establish the permanent ascendancy of one party over the other. Such an un-British privilege might well be condemned in the strongest language that any statesman could command. It is just such attacks on the liberties of the people, as Mr. Mills ably pointed out, that lead to forcible reasistance by an exasperated populace. If there is no redress in the statutes for these cold-blooded and cowardly attacks on the rights of the people, we cannot expect them to retain their self-respect if they do not discover some means of effective protest. In view of the contentions of Mr. Mills, the speech by Col. O'Brien in opposition to Sir John Thompson's policy gains new interest. Col. O'Brien is one of the strongest Conservatives in the House, and it is difficult to get him to believe that anything Liberal is worthy of support; but he has sense enough to see the unfairness of the system of cutting and carving the constituencies to secure party advantages and prevent the voice of the people from being heard. He sees the danger of so flagrant an attack on popular rights. He ecognizes the thoroughly un-British nature of the gerrymander, and he fears, as well he may, that it will prove a curse to the country. Having been taunted with deserting his party because he supported Mr. McCarthy's motion, favoring the naintenance of county and city boundaries,

Col. O'Brien said:

"I was not a member of the House in 1882 when the Redistribution Bill of that year was passed, I am therefore in no sense responsible for that measure. But I go further. I say that when I had an opportunity on one occasion in this building of expressing an opinion to those engaged in drawing up that act, I told them that I utterly disapproved of it and of the principle on which it was based; and I have never hesitated on any occasion to say that I was entirely opposed to the Redistribution Bill of 1882. I am therefore perfectly consistent in my opposition to the present bill, which is simply an extension of the previous measure."

Col. O'Brien said:

And again: "Now, sir, I for one do not come here to make myself responsible for legislation for which the best that can be said is that it is which the best that can be said is that it is not as bad as it might have been; and I will take this opportunity of saying, even though the remark may not be pleasant to some honorable gentiemen on this side of the House, that the insolent threats which have been made, insolent I deliberately call them, by persons and papers undertaking to speak on behalf of the Conservative party, that if honorable gentlemen opposite were not prepared to take this measure they had better look out that they do not get a very much worse one. That was an insolent threat, unworthy of the great party such as I would like to see and believe the Conservative party to be.

Col. O'Brien strongly supported the British practice of maintaining the county oundaries. No one had suggested better ractice. Mr. Haggart, the Minister of Railways, had simply said, "that in 1882, y virtue of a majority we (the Conservaives) had in this House, arranged the constituencies according to a plan that suited ourselves, and that being established we are determined to adhere to it. Well, that is a very bastard sort of conservatism. Because ten years ago we established something that was radically wrong in itself now we are to adhere to it."

As to fish—London's fish bill annually—the weight is 136,251 tons; as to quantities here they are, 4,000,000 each of salmon and live cod, 60,000,000 soles, 12,000,000 whiting, 2,000,000 haddock, 16,000,000 mackerel, 22,000,000 plaice, and 800,000,000 meterel, 22,000,000 plaice, and 800,000,000 betrings, also 6,000,000 eysters, 1,000,000 lobaters, 500,000 crabs, 300,000,000 shrimps, etc. As to vegetables—pototoes, 400,000 tons, or half a pound per head per day; cabbages, 110,000 tons; turnips, 60.000 tons; green peas, 20,000 tons; cucumbers, 300 tons, etc. This will give you some idea of the consumption of food in this great city.

But post closes and I must wind up this gustatory letter. Let me just say in clos-ing that all political signs point to the tulfillment of my prediction two months ago that a dissolution of Parliament here will take place about the end of June. The Government is visibly tottering to a speedy downfall. So mote it be—into the tomb of all the Capulets.

Death of Rev. Dr. Evans.

A pioneer Methodist minister died last night in the person of Rev. Dr. Evans, of 114 Sydenham street. He was widely known throughout the Province. 

THE TERRIBLE CYCLONE.

Loss of Life and Great Destruction of Property.

Bancon, Me., June 15 .- A tornado struck Bancor, Me., June 15.—A tornado struck this city about 5:15 pm. yesterday. It lasted for half an hour, during which time rain fell in torrents, buildings were unroofed and blown down. The little steamer Annie, which carries excursion parties up and down the river, was caught by the squall and capsized when only a short distance below the Maine Central wharf. Madeline Adams, daughter of James Adams, was drowned. The other sixteen passengers were saved in an exhausted condition. Much damage was done to farm property, and several fatalities are reported.





SATURDAY'S DROWNING DISASTER.

Verdict in the Case of Young Kelland's Death.

Accidental Death—Workmen Who Failed to Respond to a Call for Help Censured —Suitable and Safe Bathing Accom-modation Should be Provided.

The inquest as to the death of William Matthew Kelland, who was drowned in the Thames last Saturday afternoon, was held in the futerin Sessions room in the court house last evening before Coroner Ferguson. The jury was composed of R. A. Jones (foreman), J. W. Fletcher, Reginald Christian, John Jeens, John Lord, William F. Ellis, Williamm Peters, W. R. Hammond, J. Crockett, J. Axtell, J. Lackey, sen., E. Hunter and County Constable Kennedy. Coroner Ferguson read the minutes of the inquest on the body held at John Stephenson's undertaking establishment and then proceeded to take the evidence.

The first witness called was R. W. Ward.

The first witness called was R. W. Ward, county constable. Witness identified the body as that recovered; he was one of the searching party. The body was found about 50 feet west of the Cove bridge, in about eighteen feet fect of water. He heard of the accident, and at once notified High Constable Schram, who sent him down to help in the search.

The next witness was Harry Phair, a boy 11 years of age, who resides in London West, and who was with Kelland at the time. He said he was walking along the river bank with deceased on Saturday afternoon, and Kelland wanted to go in for a swim. They crossed over the bridge and walked along the bank to a spot where it was shallow near the edge. Deceased went in first and walked out about six feet, when he lost his footing and went into a deep hole. Kelland rose three times, but made no cry for help. Witness called upon a party of railroad workmen employed on the bridge, but they did not respond to his appeal.

Harry Gibson was then called and said that he was in the river about an hour, and found the body in about eighteen feet of water.

Thomas Jeffries corroborated the previous (witness' evidence and described the finding of the body.

The room was then cleared and the case given to the jury, who after about fifteen minutes' deliberation returned the following verdict:

"We find that the said William Matthew "We find that the said William Matthew Kelland came to his death by accidental drowning. We are of the opinion that the city and county authorities should provide the necessary tackle and grappling apparatus for the recovery of the bodies of the dead. We consure the party of railroad workmen (unknown to us), who failed to respond to the cry for heip. We are also of the opinion that it is incumbent upon the proper authorities in the interest of the public health and safety to provide suitable and safe public bathing accommodation, thereby preventing the recurrence of these accidental deaths from drowning while bathing so frequent in the past history of the River Thames at and in the vicinity of the city of London."

The man, who was Joseph Hines, reached the river in time to see the mother and children about to sink. She was holding the little girl under the water and the blind boy was floundering about. Hines ran back to the street and gave the alarm. The coroner was notified and the bodies were recovered. The husband of the woman says he cannot account for the awful action of his wife. The neighbors say that whisky laid the foundation for the awful crime. Annie, the eldest girl, says her father and mother frequently quarreled. The little girl admitted that she herself had tried to commit suicidea year ago. Beaudry is a harness maker, and came from Montreal with his wife eighteen years go.
