Disastrous Hurricane.

The Cattle Blockade.

London, Feb. 15 .- The opponents of the Canada cattle trade are trying to convince Hon, Mr. Gardner, president of the Board Hon. Mr. Gardner, president of the Board of Agriculture, that the Canadian Government is as little able as is the United States Government to insure the absolute freedom of the Canada herds from the pleuro cattle disease owing to the laxity of quarantine regulations against the United States cattle in the Northwest. He is not disposed to grumble over the veto, he says, as if home rule be once granted, England will be content to leave Ireland alone. He thinks the proposal of a second chamber simple and acceptable. "I am strongly of the opinion," Mr. McCarthy continued, "that until the land question shall be settled or relegated to an Irish Parliament, we ought to retain our full

continued, "that until the land question shall be settled or relegated to an Irish Parliament, we ought to retain our full representation at Westminster, and not be left to the chance of fighting on a vital question with diminished numbers. After that it matters little whether we are represented or not."

Mr. McCarthy suspends judgment of the financial prophecies, as he cannot understand where the surplus of £500,000 will come from, or where it is to come from hereafter. On the whole, he concludes, the bill offers the framework of a practical system of home rule.

The Standard says: "Mr. Balfour's speech indicates that the Tories will vote against the retention of Irish members at Westminster and as many Radicals will take the same course, the Irish members will probably be excluded."

The Home Rule Bill will be read first on Friday, and will be distributed among the members on Saturday. The number of clauses is about the same as in 1886, but the bill is much briefer.

Canadian Cattle May Be Exhibited at the World's Fair.

TORONTO, Feb. 16.—The Outario commissioner to the World's Fair recently notified the American Department of Agriculture in connection with the Columbian Exposition that there would be no cattle exhibit from Ontario unless the recent quarantine order issued by the United States Government was reasingled.

To-night the commissioner received a message from W. G. Buchanan, head of that department, stating that a message had just been received from Secretary Rusk as follows: "Regulation will be made by which Canadian cattle can be exhibited. It will only be necessary for intending exhibitors to notify the department and so obtain permission. They must give number and descriptions of cattle and show were they have been a year previous to shipment, with a certificate from the Canadian veterinary inspector that no contagious disease exists in the locality. On arrival they will be subject to inspection by the veterinary inspector of this department."

Fatal Trip of an Electric Car at Portland, Oregon.

Nine Passengers Hurt by a Smashup in

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 15.—Three persons were instantly killed and 25 were more or less seriously injured by the wrecking of an electric car in Upper Albina, a suburb of this city, at 2 eclock this afternoon. The car was loaded with school children who were returning to their homes and a number of laborers. While descending a steep hill the brakes broke, the motorman lost control of the car, a curve was struck and the car was thrown on its side and dashed to pieces. Two men and a child were crushed to death and 25 others sustained injuries. The killed are J. O. Dennis, carpenter, aged 70 years; Bertram Dennis, his son, aged 8, and an unknown laborer. Trouble at Topeka. Civil War Threatened at the Capital of Kansas.

Republicans Besieged by Popu lists in Assembly Hall.

Both Sides Marshaling a Strong Array of Armed Volunteers.

TOPEKA, Kan., Feb. 15.—Nothing but the wiser counsel of the calmer leaders of the opposing parties in the struggle for the control of the Lower House of the Legislature has prevented a serious conflict and the shedding of blood. The members of the Republican House, each one carrying a revolver in a convenient pocket, forced a way through a Populist guard stationed in the corridor and the stairway leading to the representatives hall, fought their way up the stairs in a hand-to-hand contest with the Populist, battered down the doors of the hall with sledge-hammers, took possession of the hall, barricaded themselves within and are now withstanding a siege by which the Populist Government, supported by the military force of the State, hopes to starve them into unconditional surrender.

CAUSE OF THE TROUBLE.

The trouble arose out of the bitterness of last fall's campaign for the political control of the State. The Republicans elected 63 members—a majority of one—of the Lower House of the Legislature. The Fopulist claimed that three of these 63 members had been given certificates by mistake, and that their Populist opponents had in fact been elected. This being the case they decided not to permit the Republicans to organize the House and so array an opposition branch of the Government against the Populist Senate and the Populist Governor, which would enable them to kill the proposed Populist legislation. the proposed Populist legislation.

TWO DISTINCT HOUSES.

The result of this decision on the part of The result of this decision on the part of the Populists was the organization of two distinct Houses, one by the Republicans and one by the Populists. All agreed that the question of which was the legal House should be left to the courts, but the Populists steadily refused until yesterday afternon to do anything upon which the Republicans could base an action in law and refused to take any legal steps to test the Republican position. Republicans to effect Rich's arrest, the

publicans not to be excluded are fresh events in the matter. The Republican members, anticipating opposition to their entrance, gathered in a body early this morning and marched to the capitol. There they found the corridor and the stairway leading to the hall in the possession of a Populist guard of twenty men. In a hand to hand fight, in which WINCHESTERS AND REVOLVERS made their appearance, but were not put to use, they fought their way to the doors of the hall, which they found had been locked and barred. Two sledge hammers had been provided for that emergency, and the Republicans asoon gained entrance, barricaded the doors from within and prepared for an assault. They had not prepared for an assault. They had not prepared for a siege, however, and they are now suffering the pangs of hunger and the nips of frost, as they can get nothing to eat and the janitor has shut off the steam. The Republican members have telefiraphed for Republican volunteers to come to Topeka at once and lend their aid to the Republican House. Responses have been received from all over the State stating that volunteers have offered their services by the hundreds and will arrive in Topeka by the first train. These volunteers will be asked to support the Republicans in the occupancy of the Representative Hall until the courts decide which is the legally-constituted House, but in complying with this request

would seem to necessitate a battle, but the Republicans predict that the militia, being composed mostly of Republicans, will not attack the volunteers should the latter proceed to such extreme measures.

On the other hand Governor Lewelling has made a call for provisional troops. These latter are enthusiastic enough in their support of the Populist House to gladly obey an order to resist an attack from the Republicans even so far as use of cannon or rifles. Should these forces meet in conflict the fight would not be a blood-less one.

The Address of the First Populist

Governor. vernor Lewelling of Ransas in His Inaugural Message Makes a Ring-

Fellow Citizens,—The profound responsibilities of this moment are too great for the individual. For the present we are citizens more than partisans, and each must lend his strength to bear this burden. Adopting the language of an eminent statesman: "It is not that we love party less, but country more," that now upon the threshold of the new year and surrounded with new conditions we plead the cause of a higher and purer patriotism, and demand that political parties shall exist by reason of progressive principles rather than subsist upon the spoils of office.

The "survival of the fittest" is the government of brutes and reptiles, and such philosophy must give place to a government which recognizes human brotherhood. It is the province of government to protect the weak, but the government to-day is resolved into a struggle of masses with classes for supremacy and bread until business, home and personal integrity are trembling in the face of possible want in the family. Feed a tiger regularly and you tame and make him harmless, but hunger makes tigers of men. When this beast is wounded by a hunter in India and is making preparations for a revengenful assault, the musicians seated on an elephant play vigorously to charm him with their melody. And thus the people are appeased by a jingle of the sonorous words of party platforms.

All that makes existence valuable or government desirable depends on the enforcements of restraints upon the actions of others, and therefore the restraining power of government is evoked to-day. Our hearts have ached because of evictions under the Irish tenant laws, but hundreds of our own families are made homeless by the fore-closure laws of Kansas, and thus the power which freed the African is forcing into the same crucible the sons and daughters of our own ablood. ing Appeal for Justice.

Though Novel Experience in

an Uninhabited Country.

The appended is an extranct from an interesting letter written by Mr. Maurice A. Bucke to his mother, Mrs. (Dr.) R. M. Bucke, from Kaslo, Kootenay district, British Columbia. Mr. Bucke is a mining engineer and assayer and has been out engineer and assayer and has been out filter about a year. The letter describes his trip from Kaslo north up the Duncan River about 70 miles, where he went to preempt land for a town site in anticipation of the boom which is expected in those parts next summer. The country through which he traveled is, of course, entirely uninhabited:

I am going to try and describe our trip up the Duncan River and down again. The party consisted of Targett, Birch, Heap, Fawcett, Forbes and myself. We took with us an eighteen foot Peterboro canoe and a flat-bottomed boat, some 2,000 pounds of provisions and other supplies, as three of the party were to winter on the town site and build there a store and stopping house. Luckily enough, a friend happened along in Kaslo, just as we were about to start, with a small steam tug and took us up to the head of the lake, some twenty miles, so that we got into the Duncan River about 2 p.m. of the first day out. We manned the boats, three to each, Forbes captaining the flat-bottom and I the cance. As the latter was much the most capable we took in her about 1,200 pounds of the freight. The lower part of the Duncan from Kootenay Lake fifteen miles, is nothing but a succession of rapids—mostly quite shallow. We had 100 yards of rope which we used for lining—i.e., to is one end to the boat, the other to be pulled from the shore. Two men pull and the other keeps the boat from the land, or in exceptionally rapid places we would double up, taking one boat at a time. Three of the party had long rubber boots for wading.

The first night after a lot of hard togging and pulling we camped a mile and a half or two miles up the river. The last rapid that evening happened to be a pretty swift one, and the camee had to be kept a long way out in order to get sufficient draft of water. I was in the camee with an oar, handling it in such a way as to get a sheer on the water that would drive me out. The sheer was so great that Heap, who was one of the three men on the line, was pulled headlong into the water and the oar was wrenched out of my hands. Well, we went ashore, got a good fire going that dried Heap out, and after getting tea made ourselves comfortable for the night. The next day our progress was much the same, except that the only accident was that the other oar (the mate for the one I unfortunately lost) was broken. Of course wet feet and legs did not count, and so we traveled for three and a half days, covering in that time some fifteen miles of ground. At the end of this time, however, we reached the upper lake and crossed it.

We clambered up the bank and went through that infernal brush at the rate of certainly not more than 200 yards an hour. Soon the night came down on us and we could not cross the river nor find any decent wood on the side we were; anyway we were too weak to chop a solid tree.

About 5:30 or 6 we could not go any further, so we decided to camp under some green firs and lnokily enough we found some wood that would light; so we cooked some bannocks and bacon and dried ourselves as well as possible. We did not lied own until midnight as we were afraid we should not be able to sleep through the cold until morning, so we kept up the fire with rotten wood and brush—nota very big fire, mind you. Then we turned in and the first thing I knew after that was Forbes wishing me a merry Christmas under the blankets. It was after 7, but we lay there until 8, and then got up. But the idea of cooking our first meal on Christmas day under such circumstances was not pleasant, so we docided we wuild make the cabin first thing, for we lelt sure it was not over half a mile from as—nor was it. We shouldered our packs

but could find no ice that would bear our weight, so were forced to take to the woods end cross the river on the log jam.

By the time we reached the jam Forbes was completely tunkered out and I had to do all the snow breaking. It was slow and all the snow breaking. It was slow and all the snow breaking pitohed in every shape and position as they were—but we got across at last and reached the cabin at just 12:50—making nearly five hours ire a total distance of something less than mile. Here in the cabin we had our Christmas breakfast and dimer, both at once. We had barnnocks, bacon and a partridge, which we had killed that morning. It was not a very sumptuous repast, but that cabin, with a fireplace and a bed in it, was much more appreciated than a palace would be in ordinary times.

The next morning I felt myself again, but if orbes said he was too played out to teturn. TROUBLE IN KANAS.

a majority of one. But ex-Secretary of State Higgins, a strong Republican, was charged with having issued certificates wrongfully to Republican candidates. In the case of Rosenthal, a Populist, it wa claimed that the certificate was issued to Stubbs, a Republican, when he was not elected. An appeal in this case was made to the Supreme Court, which took the grounds that there was no power to compe the State board of canvassers to reassemble and correct the returns in accordance with the votes cast. This simply left to a Republican canvassing board the determination of who was elected regardless of popular will.

Against several of the Republican mem pers to whom certificates had been awarded by this board, contests were filed upon the ground of illegal votes, miscount of ballot, and bribery by candidates. In several other instances postmasters who had not esigned had been elected by Republicans, and in one or two instances by Populists, which is claimed to be unconstitutional In another case the Republicans had elected citizen of Oklahoma, which is in direct violation of the law of the State.

When it came to organizing the House, the Republicans claimed that the holding of certificates was prima facle evidence o election. This was denied by the Populists, who declared that contestants could no help organize the House and afterwards proceed to determine the legality of their wn claims of election. Here is the point at issue. The Populists proceeded according to established precedents in other States and in the National Congress, and organized a Populist House that was recognized by the Governor. The Republican House also organized, but has not been recognized by the Governor. This condition of affairs as continued for several weeks.

These are the facts as nearly as they can be obtained from an independent press. Our readers need not be told that the Associated Prozs reports will favor the Republicans. The telegraph combine is one of the most influential unions fof the day, because it controls the means of hasty communication, and in most cases compiler the messages forwarded. This we state in order that readers may not be unduly biased by telegraphic reports from the scene of discord. Facts are not always stated by those whose interests are so closely allied with the two great political parties in the United States.





President Harrison's Message Regarding Hawaii—The Royal Family to be Fensioned.

New York, Feb. 16.—A Washington special says the treaty sent to the Senate yesterday by the President proposes annexation in plain and unmistakable terms and provides that until more definite arrangements have been made the present Provincial Government shall continue in full force. The disposed Queen is to receive from the United States \$20,000 a year, and the royal family, and especially the heirs apparent to the throne, are to be fully cared for. The Chinese now on the islands are precluded from coming into the United States. It is proposed that the United States shall assume the debts of Hawaii, but shall receive in return the verious incomes of the islands, amounting to about \$10,000,000 per year. \$10,000,000 per year.
