Ten Thousand People Honor Him at Leamington

Leamington, Sept. 12.—The demonstration at Sea Cliff Park, Leamington, held in honor of Hon. Wilfrid Laurier, was perhaps the most successful of the series of meetings now being held. The threatening weather and the downpour of rain which took place up to 9 o'clock in the morning no doubt prevented thousands from being present who would have been there. Notwithstanding this there must have been between 8,000 and 10,000 present.

Mr. Laurier arrived by special train at 11 a.m., and was received by an immense crowd. An address of welcome was presented to him by the Leamington Young Liberal Club, by whom the demonstration was prepared. The distinguished parties then took carriages, and, headed by the Leamington band and mounted yeomanry, the party proceeded, passing between lines of liberale with motter and hanners to a

THE WARWICK TRACEDY.

Albert Edward Wilson on Trial for Murder.

A Plea of Insanity-His Sister in the London Asylum,

SARNIA, Sept. 12.—The trial of Albert Edward Wilson, who was brought here some few weeks ago from Saginaw, charged with the murder, in 1889, of Miss Mary Marshall, of Warwick, this county, was commenced here this morning at the assizen, presided over by Justice Falconbridge. Almost every person, espe-

Almost every person, especially in this vicinity, is familiar with the story of the memorable Sunday evening when Wilson shot the young lady coming from church. Mr. Loutt, Q.C., is conducting the business for the crown, and Mr. B. B. Osler, Toronto, and J. F. Lister, Sarnia, are defending the prisoner.

The plea for acquittal on the grounds of insanity was entered. The facts of the case are not disputed by the defense. A number of witnesses were examined, including medical experts, who gave testimony as to the different features, etc., of such cases. It appears, however, from evidence given, that Wilson's family are predisposed in this respect, and some of the members, especially a sister who is now in London Asylum, have been under treatment. The evidence will be all in to-morrow, when the addresses will be delivered and the jury charged. There was a very large crowd at court. Wilson seems very much depressed and feels his position keenly.

SHORTHAND IN THE COURTS. Many people have trusted that there i no limit to the stenographic art, and even ome shorthand writers have led the public to believe that no one could talk fast enough to get beyond their powers. That pinion is not entertained by the Chartered Stenographic Reporters' Association of Ontario, which embraces in its membership he swiftest shorthand writers in the Province. At the recent meeting of the association the following important motion was unanimously carried:

was unanimously carried?

"That as it is absolutely impossible to take down verbatim documents read in court, and as it is recognized by the highest authorities and most efficient stenographers in Great Britain, the United States and other parts of the world, that this is beyond the capacity, not only of stenographers, but of shorthand systems, this association is unanimously of the opinion that representations should be made to the judges as to the importance of their making an order that henceforth in all judicial proceedings counsels shall be required to file with the stenographer a copy of every extract used and intended to form part of the reporter's record, and that the council of this association furnisha copy of this resolution to each of the judges and make such other representation as may be deemed necessary."

The chartered stenographers have pointed out a difficulty and an easy mean for its solution. No one who is soized of the importance of obtaining an absolutely accurate record of the evidence will object to the change insisted upon by the stenographers, and we doubt not that the judges will so alter the court rules as to provide for the change.

Few people are conversant with the sav ng in time and money which is effected by the use of shorthand in the administration of justice, There was a time when the judge took running record of the testimony, keeping counsel and witnesses in check while he pro ceeded. In those days, and it is not so very long ago, it was no uncommon thing for the business at an assize court to last from four to six weeks. Engineer Keefer Presents an Elaborate Report.

UTILIZATION OF GROUND WATER.

We estimate the cost of laying the 18-inch cast iron main from the reservoir and pumping station to the central portion of the city at \$78,000; if of a steel, \$68,000.

EXTENSION OF SUPPLY.

"I would recommend, as I have already stated in detail, the collection of all available ground water above the level of the pumping station that can be brought to it by gravity. My inquiry has been limited to the water available on and near the commissioners' property on the south side of the river, and I have every expectation of its yielding a considerable supply. Should, however, the growth of the city overtake the supply—you may develop—and there is the necessity of obtaining more water for the future, the springs on the north side of the river could furnish an additional supply of a considerable amount.

"At present there is an ample supply o
water collected and available, and the only water collected and available, and the only reason for shortage is the want of sufficient pumping power. This I would strongly recommend to be increased by the addition of one set of steam pumps of a capacity of 3,000,000 gallons in 24 hours. The steam plant is at present a necessity, and for safety, as well as for present and future requirements, it should be duplicated, and, as it is required at the time of greatest consumption, should have a capacity at least equal to that of consumption. The present steam pumping engine is good and reliable, and, as experience has proved, economical. It has, however, been working at a higher rate of speed and consequently pumping more water than its rated capacity, and, as its best performance is not equal to the demands made upon it, to keep up the supply when the hydraulic pumps are shut down, the necessity for additional steam pumping power is evidently building the following pumping engines that this cupine should be the best of this class and represent the most economical development in fael economy for this capacity, viz., 3,000,000.

**The water power, being, of course, the most conomical of all powers, should be, for the future requirements, developed to its fullest extent, with a view of limiting the steam power as much as possible, relying on an improved water power for the future. The present hydraulic power pumps are, however, not of a sufficient capacity to pump the maximum supply during the low water and heavy consumption seasons of the year, and the time is now reached when they require to be supplemented by additional pumps. I would strongly recommend this to be done by the addition to the pumping plant of one set of hydraulic power pumps of a capacity of 3,000,000 gallons in 24 hours, with turbines as well as pumps of the best and most economical design as regards consumption of power and pumpage of water. This addition to the pumping plant would, of course, involve an extension of both the steam and hydraulic pumping stations. The head an extension of both the steam and hydraulic pumping stations. The head race or fiume will also require to be of a more permanent form of construction, with stop logs, head gates, and with masonry stop log checks. I estimate that the cost of the addition to the steam and hydraulic pumping plant, which I have recommended to be, for steam pumps and boilers and hydraulic pumps and turbines, \$30,000. With regard to the cost of extensions to the oumping stations and deepening of the lower collecting pond, and improvement to head race, your engineer will advise you when he has determined the best and most economical arrangement to suit the conditions.

"If have already given my reasons for recommending and estimating the cost of an additional supply or pumping main, viz., increased mileage of pipes and services beyond the capacity of the present main and consequent reduction of fire pressure. The necessity for duplicate pumping mains is imperative."


