By mutual consent, Aid. Winnett then took the chair, and as Col. Leys and Mr. Beck, with their movers and seconders, took the platform, the cheering was loud and long. The chairman said that it had been agreed that the mover and seconder of each candidate would be allowed 45 minutes between them. Then Leys would speak for 30 minutes; Mr. Beck for 45, and then Col. Leys again for 15 minutes in reply.

MR. A. B. COX, as mover of Mr. Adam Back, said he esteemed it as a high honor to move the nomination of Mr. Beck. It was lieved it to be a high honor, he would of a contest in this city. The candidate always runs the risk of having all his dirty clothes cast up in a most unaccountable manner. (Laughter.) Some Disappointed Charter Mongers May Submit a New Offer

For a Railway to Klondike-Opposi tion in the Commons Said to Be Using it to Annoy the Government.

Ottawa, Feb. 22.—There is some talk today in political circles of another offer being made to the government from a United States-English syndicate for the construction of a railway to the Yukon. It is said that the offer is in the shape of a letter to the premier, and is in the first place for the build-ing of a road from Pyramid Harbor along Dalton Trail to Fort Selkirk. The street, they rallied again and closed terms are said to be more favorable than any yet published. The parties who are said to make the offer are Wilson Smith, New York; A. Brathever, Montreal; A.Onderdonk, Chicago, and others. Smith, who has been here for the past few weeks, is said to be looking after the matter. It is also said that Smith will make a proposition to build the Telegraph Creek and Teslin road on better terms than that proposed by the government to Messrs. Mackenzie & Mann. Smith is said to be working in conjunction with the opposition in the House of Commons, and his letters and offers are not taken seriously. He has already circulated all over the Dominion the story that he made an offer to the government to build a road to the Yukon, but no such offer has ever been received. Sir Chas. Tupper was able to inform the premier that Smith had written him a letter referred to the day after it reached Sir Wilfrid Laurier's hands. The main purposes of the offers are believed to be to annoy the government, and playing into the hands of a few chartermongers, who are annoyed that their schemes are cast to one side on account of the all-Canadian route. If Liberals were found lending themselves to assist foreigners in attacking the project, whose object is to keep under Canadian control the gold fields of the Yukon, the Conservative press would be filled with charges of treachery and treason.

THE WABASH DEAL.

Thomas Journal: "The deal whereby the Wabash will run its passenger and freight trains over the Air Line," said a Wabash employe to a Journal representative on Saturday, "will be a good thing for St. Thomas. It means not only that some fifteen more freight crews will be located here, but it also means that there will be lots of work for men in improving the track and strengthening the bridges. The Wabash starts on March I to run its freight over the road, and I understand that six or seven engines and enginemen will be sent over here from London. But while the Wabash freight trains will commence to run March 1, it will be a good while yet before their passenger trains are run through St. Thomas. The rails are too light, and the bridges will require strengthening before passenger trains can be run over the Air Line at the speed Wabash trains are scheduled. I would not be surprised if the Air Line was double-tracked before long. One thing is certain, that heavier rails, at least 86-pound rails, will have to replace the present rails and the bridges along the line be strengthened before Wabash passenger trains can be run at their present high rate of speed over the road. I do not believe you will see their pasenger trains running before next July. Three trains will be run each way.'



## A BRIGHT OUTLOOK.

Bradstreet's Summary of the Trade Situation in Ontario.

Toronto, Feb. 22.-The most conspicuous feature of the past week was the sharp advances in the prices of wheat and coarse grains. Wheat, 4c higher: white oats advanced 21/2c; flour, 10c to 15c; oatmeal, 25c per barrel; peas, 1c; rye, 2c; buckwheat, 1c, and corn 11/2c. The farmers still hold a great deal of grain, so that this advance will help to still further improve business in the country. Goods of all descriptions for the spring trade are selling freely, and cash sales are more numerous ever before. The delivery of goods is keeping the big distributing houses here very busy, and a remarkable fact is that the factories and mills are so busy on orders it is impossible to secure deliveries of woolens and heavy cotton goods in many cases, and some traders are buying American goods, notwithstanding the almost prohibitive duty, although they would prefer Canadian makes if they could get them at the moment. Values are, under these circumstances, all very firm. Country remittances are improving. There is a good demand for Canadian securities for investment, and while prices declined a little in sympathy with Wall strong. Money is abundant, and rates are easy, at 6 to 7 per cent for mercantile discounts, and 4 per cent for call loans.







Baron Justus von Liebig, field of work has since been filled.

Like most successful men he rode a hobby, and his hobby was the great subject of nutrition—the science of food and digestion.
