Trouble Brewing

Rome, Nov. 12. - Signor Alfani, director of the Florence observatory, says that the sun spots which he calculated are twelve times the size of the earth, and which will reach solar meridian about the middle of November, are likely to lead to violent magnetic disturbances, resulting in storms. floods, volcanic eruptions, and

They are the Huron Weather, the Ontario Farmers, Western Farmers, and they carry 3,730 policies, covering risvs totaling \$4,154,236. Last year their receipts amounted to \$9,160. For losses, \$1,628 15 was paid; for management, \$4,061; total

expenses aggregating \$7,249. Mutual Fire Companies.

The report also shows that in mutual fire insurance companies, which may be described as the public ownership of insurance, the enormous sum of \$230,829,723 is covered by the risks n 83 companies of various classes. The new business taken in 1906 alone amounted to \$85,834,494.

The three joint stock fire insurance mpanies had assets amounting to \$455,917 11, not including subscribed stock uncalled of \$519,237 50. They hold 33,729 premiums, with \$29,951, 250 56 at risk. Their income for the year aggregated \$439,828 95, and their expenditure amounted to \$396,945 36, ncluding \$157,621 08, in losses.



Already that state has 68 "dry" counties out of 75, so that state prohibition, when it comes, will make little change. In the other states the campaign has been waged by means of local option, which was carried throughout whole counties in Southern Illinois, while important gains by the temperance forces in other states have given a strong impetus to the prohibition movement, and caused the announcement that prohibitionists will begin at once the most vigorous national campaign in the history of that party. Among the states, in addition to the two named in which substantial gains were made by the anti-liquor people, are Kentucky, Ohio, Delaware, New Jersey and Alabama. The chairman of the Illinois prohibition state committee is so confident of the determination of a majority of the residents of the state to fight the liquer forces that he declared if the people of Illinois had the right, by direct vot?, they would put the saloons out of Chicago and the state. Practically all the rural districts throughout Illino's are now under local option, and in only five counties are county liquor licenses granted. It must not be supposed, however, that Illinois is as yet by any means "dry," seeing that the state still has upwards of 23,000 saloons.
