"We Are Not Going To Let Huns Hold Land Where Our Dear Ones Sleep."-Chaplain Almond.

Montreal, April 28 .- "We are not going to let the Hun hold the land where our dear ones sleep! We are not going to let the Hun trample that pathway our sons and brothers have trod. If the war lasts five or ten years we are going on."

This was the spirited declaration at the Ypres anniversary celebration yesterday by Rev. Canon Aimond, chaplain who has recently returned from France. Canon Almond declared that

Canadian had won honors at the
front but had come from a Christian home in Canada.

"You cannot leave God out of
your life there," he said.
Col. Almond concluded by reciting Lieut.-Col. John McCrae's famous poem on the grayes in Flanous poem on the graves in Flanders, and declartd: "We are not going to break faith with them, please God. We are going on to victory, through our Lord Jesus Christ."

# **BRITAIN WILL SPEND** 40 MILLION DOLLARS

Brantford, April 29.-Major Gordon Smith, superintendent of the Six J. Smith, superintendent of the Six Nations Indian Reserve, this morning announced that he had been instructed by the Indian department at Ottawa to engage the services of Mr. W. S. Brewster, K.C., "to punish those guilty of committing indignities on the body of the late Alfred Isaacs, a member of the Six Nations."

Alfred Isaacs died in the Brantford General Hospital April 1 from injuries alleged to have been inflicted by his half-brother. George Duncan of this city, during a fight in the latter's home on Sunday, March 31.

Duncan was arrested and charged with murder, the charge being later reduced to manslaughter. He is now out on \$1,000 bail. Shortly after the body of Isaacs was interred at Sour Springs Cemetery, it was reported that the remains had been disinterred and viewed. This was found to be correct, and a few days afterwards the acthorities admitted that the head had been severed from the body and retained by the authorities to be used as evidence in the trial of Duncan.



## THE WAR SITUATION

The Germans began today what seems to be a general assault on the British hill positions on the Kemmel front, niii positions on the Kemmel front, southwest of Ypres, opening a new phase of the great drive in Flanders. Apparently the crucial test of the Allied holding power in this area is at hand. The preliminary bombardment, started in the early morning, took in a tenmile front from Meteren, west of Bailleut to Voormezgele, two miles south of leul, to Voormezeele, two miles south of Types. Infantry attacks in this area developed shortly afterwards, and the battle appears to have been on in earnest when Field Marshal Haig's report was Issued in London at noon. Striking With Fury.

The enemy has been striking with great fury at Voormezeele for the past two or three days, evidently hoping to drive in behind Ypres and break up the orderly withdrawal of the British from the further portions of the Ypres salient, which they have been evacuating.

Further attacks in the Voormezeele sector may accompany the delivery of today's blow, but the greatest force of this thrust seems likely to-manifest itself in the vicinity of Locre, where Scharpenberg, Mont Rouge, Mont Note and other eminences are the enemy objectives. The French, who are holding the line at Locre, fortified themselves late last week by clinging to this village.

With the British Army in France, April 29-(By the Associated Press).-The 4th German army this morning heavily attacked the Allied front in Flanders. Prisoners captured have admitted that the German intention is to attempt to capture Ypres. Severe fighting is reported in both the French and British areas. The attack extends over a front of about fifteen miles. The Beigians on the Yser front also are reported to have been attacked.

HUN MORALE POOR-REVOLT NEAR? 





E WONDER how many who daily look upon "the meteor flag of England," floating on public buildings, an emblem of lom and unity, know much about how it me into being through the length of centuries. ais "Union Jack" of ours always comes into greatest evidence somehow, when

"Bastard freedom waves Her fustian flag in mockery over slaves,"

maidlish flag is stayed.'

The history of this wonderful flag contains within its folds the separate histories of the crosses of St. George, St. Andrew and St. Patrick. The cross of St. George has been the national emblem of England "since 1194, after the third great crusade, when the troops of Richard Coeur de Lion won a gallant victory near the grotto, where the great Christian hero, St. George, 'redeemed the king's daughter out of the jaws of a dreadful dragon.' 'Another story has t that "the wearied soldiers at the siege of Antioch, suddenly saw a company of heavenly soldiers descend from the mountains to succor them, St. George being one of the leaders." This emblem of St. George, a Greek cross of the national color red, has been that of England ever since.

The cross of St. Andrew, the national emblem of Scotland, is older yet. "According to tradition, the saint, deeming it far too great an honor to be crucified as was his Lord, gained from his persecutors the concession to this variation, namely, a saltire instead of a Latin cross. After his martyrdom his remains were preserved as relics, and a Greek monk, having been warned in a vision to carry these away in a ship, was wrecked on the shores of Caledonia-Scotland- that paltry pile? about A. D. 370. Here he was given land on which to build a church to enshrine the relies. It was to this church, the legend says, after a great victory, that Achaius, King of the Scots, went barefoot and vowed to accept the saint's cross as the national emblem, A. D. 987."

It is not quite clear how the saltire cross of red on the Irish emblem became associated with St. Patrick. There are legends, of course, dating back as far as 411. In all probability the cross was derived from the sacred monogram of Constantine the Great, where the X or chi is the initial letter of the Greek for Christ. Under this emperor the Christians were rescued from persecution in Britain and, in all probability became associated with St. Patrick owing to his labors in name. Ireland.

## GERMANY WONDERING.

**TILE THOUGH** the German people have proved themselves in this war, and impossible as it is to find excuses for their treatment of prisoners, wounded and unwounded, it may yet be said of them that they have been deceived as to the cause and purpose of the war Germany is waging, and that, possibly, great masses of them believe, as Wilhelm tells them, that they are struggling against national extermination.

A young German officer captured by the British at Villers-Bretonneux, when asked as to what he thought was the reason for the whole civilized world being opposed to his country, replied: "That is what we should like to know," and added that his people now were giving much thought to that very question and others of similar nature.

If Canada suddenly found herself at war with the United States, by declaration of her Government, and if she were told, authoritatively, that an attack had been made on the Dominion by American forces and that only the united effort of the nation could stave off defeat and annexation, her people would rise and fight to the death. If, again, by reason of the suppression or distortion of all news from across the line, they were prevented from discovering that their own Government was entirely to blame and that the United States had only fought to protect herself, they would keep up the struggle; but what a change would take place when the truth became known! Just as soon as the deception was laid bare, the nation's wrath would turn upon its own government and it would be wiped out of existence.

It is not too optimistic to hope that something of this kind may occur in Germany. The very bestiality and brutality shown by the people are a threat of the fearful danger the Prussian Government faces. 





We emerged unbeaten, but with sad losses, and a new and eternal proof of what the British soldier can and will do for his country. Never in the annals of our history have our men stood up to such country. Never in the annals of our history have our men stood up to such odds, and now we hope, thanks to them, that the worst is over. I do not mean but that we shall have to live through terrible days again—probably steadily for some months to come—but I do not think ever again the Germans can have such a chance to overwhelm us.

I should be writing a strictly business letter, but all our minds and hearts are too full to pass over in silence what we have just gone through.

I am very pleased indeed to say that the consignments of which you notified me on December 19 and January 6 respectively, bales 466 to 476 inclusive, and bales Nos. 477 to 484 inclusive, have come safely to hand.
