London, Nov. 8 .- A. J. Balfour has resigned the leadership of

Throughout the day there had been rumors in the lobby of the House of Commons that Mr. Balfour fiad decided to retire from his position as chief of the Unionist party, in consequence of the divergency of views regarding the efficacy of his leadership.

This afternoon his purpose was definitely and officially

The news of Mr. Balfour's resignation caused the utmost surprise, and in some quarters consternation.

The Unionists do not attempt to disguise the seriousness of the loss of one who is admittedly the greatest asset of the party. It is understood that Mr. Balfour's decision is unalterable. He

advances the state of his health as the ostensible reason for his withdrawal from leadership, but there is no doubt that the bickerings in the party ranks was the primary cause. He will remain in Parliament, representing the city of London.

The choice of a successor to Mr. Balfour seems to be between Austen Chamberlain and Walter Hume Long. The former is the Liberal-Unionist member for East Worcestershire, and for some time has been mentioned by the opponents of Balfour as his possible successor. Long represents the Strand, and is a strong opponent of home rule, voicing north of Ireland sentiment.



London, Nov. 7.—Premier Asquith announced this afternoon that the Government intended to introduce a manhood suffrage bill at the next session of Parliament.

Manhood suffrage means one vote for every adult male, with the exception of aliens, the insane, and such persons as are usually disqualified by law. Under the present system, men maintaining several residences have

the right to vote in each place.

The Prime Minister, said that the Government was pledged to manhood suffrage, and would introduce a bill to that effect, but it would not include suffrage, and would include women. The bill, however, he said, would be in such a form that the House could extend it to include women if the House sop leased.

The Conservatives will oppose the measure on the ground that it ought to be accompanied by a "redistribution of seats bill," and its passage will be further complicated by the question of women suffrage. The present intention of the women's party is to oppose it actively.





London, Nov. 7. — The home rule campaign is now fairly begun. Adoption by the Government of the guillotine closure for the debate in the House of Commons on Chancellor of the Exchequer Lloyd George's insurance bill for compulsory insurance of employees was the first shut in the great parliamentary battle.

The Unionists had planned to obstruct the insurance bill so as to compel the session to be continued over Christmas and imperil the home rule bill by forcing curtailment of the new year's session. Their scheme is now frustrated and the Unionists are proportionately furious.

Opposition Dying Down.

Every one admits that the Unionists have failed to self up any serious opposition in Great Britain to the principle of home rule. Their hope now is that when the bill is produced Englishmen will be alaramed, especially at its financial provisions. They are now endeavoring to give life to that bogy.

Many forecasts of the home rule measure are being published, but all are guesses. The one certain thing is that the Asquith Government has realized the folly of attempting to start home rule as an insolvent concern, and it is expected that the Irish exchequer will get at least fifteen millions with which to begin operators.





Directions---How to Use Cooking Bags

1. Select one that "fits" the food intended to be cooked. 2. Grease slightly the inside of the bag, except in the ease of vegetables, or when water is to be added.

3. When the food has been prepared for the bag, place the same on the table, and lift the uppermost edge of the bag

while you insert the contents. 4. Fold the mouth of the bag two or three times and fasten with a clip, or pins, or in any other way that will

secure as nearly as possible a hermetical closing. Should it ever happen that a bag leaks, simply transfer

it with contents undisturbed to another bag.

5. The oven, any kind of which will do, should be kept; clean, and if properly heated, as with the old style of cooking, results should satisfactorily follow. Average oven heat, should be about 200 degrees, Fahr., and when the bag is put into the oven this heat should be reduced by about 30 degrees. In the case of ovens with solid shelves, a wire grid should be placed on the shelf with a space between and the bag with contents on the grid. Experience will soon teach the cook when the oven is hot enough without the use of a

6. The oven door will not require to be opened every now and then "to see how the roast is doing." The whole force of the heat is playing upon the bag and from within it cannot escape.

7. Exercise care in taking the bag out of the oven, and if gas is used the bag should be kept out of danger of contact with the flame.
