In addition to that, it is possible that the use of the greater part of the available money could be stopped by an injunction.

When the project was first broached it was thought that the council had \$333,000 available for building purposes. According to figures given to The Advertiser by Lieut.-Col. W. G. Coles considerably less than \$200,000 is on hand. The sale of the former hall netted \$100,000; the city council voted \$75,000 more, and in 1913 the citizens voted \$250,000 for a Federal Square proposition, a total of \$425,000. The Spencer block, now used as city offices, cost \$45,000: repairs cost \$18,000, and the property across the street cost \$202,250. #### Marks Of Identification On German Guns Obscured

Rogers, in the course of his annual report, states that for the year the provincial police secured 418 convictions for violation of the Ontario temperance act, and 219 for cases of intoxication. Under this heading the fines imposed were \$116,203 for the O. T. A., and under drunk and disorderly, \$3.232. Under the inland revenue act for manufacturing liquor 37 convictions were secured, and fines imposed amounting to \$6,610. My money was posted three days after the Carpentier coin was put in the bank, and I have my receipt in my New York office. I know also that the Frenchman left his coin in this country."





"Councils, boards and parliaments are but committees of citizens. A clear appreciation of this fact by all citizens would work a revolution in all departments of government. "Most failures in civil engineering are due to faulty data, insufficient data, or wrong analysis and interpretation of data. Community engineering is also handicapped by the number of people who know facts which are not true, by the absence of facts or the misinterpretation of those facts which are available. No one would think of erecting a skyscraper or building a railroad without thorough investigation on the ground, yet new public ventures are entered upon and new governmental organizations are set up every year without adequate research. The armchair is no place in which to do community planning. Surveys are as necessary here as in any other department of human activity.

The Creed of the Institute.

"Perhaps the most succinct statement of the fundamental faith of the institute is to be found in the following quotations from the pamphlet 'Canada Perez'.

"Accurate and timely information is the chief weapon of the public-spirited citizen; public-spirited citizens are the only guarantee of efficient government: efficient government is the only assurance of adequate service, economy of operation and high municipal, provincial and national credit."
"Experience has shown that for every dollar lost through dishonesty ten or a hundred are lost through lack of information, misinformation and lack of planning. Education in citizenship is the only permanent cure for inefficiency and waste in public affairs."

Dr. Brittain then gave an interesting account of the origin of the institute n Toronto, and stated that it had three

main activities: General research and publicity; special research and publi-city; co-operation with public bodies and officials in effecting reorganiza-

and officials in effecting reorganizations.

"Mytual confidence," concluded the speaker, "is the foundation-stone of organized society. Without it governments can no longer exist and peoples can no longer maintain themselves. Suspicion is negative, destructive; confidence is positive, constructive. Every Canadian should have confidence in his country, its people and its future, and be able to give a reason for the faith that is in him. But no government should take a dollar from us that will be misspent. It is an immoral thing for a government to waste money or to spend money for things that are not needed."

One of the most notable gatherings in the history of the city of London was that which assembled in the Tecumseh House last night to listen to an address on sane methods of government given by Dr. Horace L. Brittain, Targette director of the Citizens' Residuely. Toronto, director of the Citizens' Re-search Institute of Canada. The meet-

Toronto, director of the Citizens' Research Institute of Canada. The meeting was made up of large representations from the combined clubs of the city, including the Chamber of Commerce, the Canadian Club, the Rotary Club, the Kiwanis Club and the Advertising Club. It was a business meeting for businessmen, and the principal theme of the speaker of the evening may be summed up in the words—"Community engineering."

Lieut.-Col. W. J. Brown presided and introduced Dr. Brittain, who said that the function of the organizations represented that evening in inoculating all public bodies with the gospel of efficient service would do much to solve the problems of the day. The topic upon which he was to speak was "The Government and the Citizens." There was a limit to the things a government could do, and much depended on the intelligence of the citizens and their interest in what was being done.


Growth of Governmental Functions.

"Early forms of government," said the speaker "were very simple, the collection to be carried on by private enterprise, when roadways were owned by private individuals and maintained by tolls, when education was largely a matter of private enterprise, and when public health work was unknown. Everything points to the steady increase in the number and complexity of government services and in the amount subtracted annually from private incomes to defray public expenditures on services benefitting individuals. "It is becoming more and more necessary, therefore, that all public expenditures be carefully scrutinized by the individual taxpayers and by organizations of citizens, that the quality and quantity of services rendered
