As London is far to the south of the track of totality, only a part of the sun's surface will be ob But in the magic line of totality there is a great deal more to be seen. The line is like a large pencil mark, 167 miles wide, commencing at Lake Winnipeg, and moving with almost incredible speed through Canada to Labrador. It will enter the Atlantic a few miles north of Newfoundland, cross

For the people in this area an inky darkness will approach like a giant wall extending miles into the heavens, and when the line of shadow passes where they may stand, all will be dark as in the twilight. Then will come the corona, the magnificent wreath of sun flames standing out like a halo around the black disk of the moon.

Providing there is a clear sky at sunrise tomorrow. Londoners who are about will be enabled to get an idea of what a total eclipse of the sun means. At 5:39 tomorrow morning the moon's shadow will creep across the disc of the sun, until 77 per cent of the surface is hidden away. The eclipse will

over to Spain, which country is traversed diagonally, plunge Algiers and Tunis into some minutes of darkness, and crossing over Assouan on the Nile will end in Southeastern Arabia.

The reason for this long swath of darkness is simple. The moon is spherical, and when it comes between the sun and the earth there is a long conelike shadow projected towards the north. It is like the point of a giant pencil, and the end which touches the earth is 167 miles across. The speed with which it travels from west to east along the earth's surface is due to the speed with which the earth revolves in the opposite direction. When the shadow strikes obliquely as it does at sunrise it travels with terrific speed, as great as 5,000 miles an hour.

She abandons her claim for an inwarships which had taken refuge in neutral harbors, and for the limitation of Russia's naval establishment in eastern waters.

She even consents to divide with Russia the Island of Sakhalin, which was once her own, which was wrested from her by Russia, and which she reconquered in the present war.

The renunciation of all demand for refining should be kept in the Province, reimbursement can be explained only by the supposition that Japan is much nearer financial exhaustion than the world believed.

Her fleet is in absolute command of the seas, and she has a great and victorious army in the field, ready to renew operations and apparently able to drive the Russian armies out of Manchuria at one stroke. The one remaining Russian seaport on the Pacific, Vladivostock, is at her mercy also.

With everything in her favor from military point of view, she has chosen peace with no other recompense for the blood and treasure she has poured out than a small grant of territory of which she was robbed by her foe.

If Japan is under no financial neces sity of ending the war and has chosen peace for the sake of peace, her act of renunciation is one of the most shining facts in history. There is no sign of the yellow peril there,

Back to the Land.

A former premier of France, M. Meline, now a member of the French Sen ate, propounds the theory that manufacturing has been carried to an ex- We have been friends together, treme which has "compromised the economical equilibrium of the world, and that the balance will be restored, after a great crisis, by a movement back to the land. Thanks to manufacturing, he says, men have become better clothed and better lodged, and have become familiar with many pleasures unknown to their fathers. But consumption must have its bounds. So long as industrial production depended limited, but the substitution of machinery for hand labor, and the cheapening of transportation, changed the situation. The periodical glut of a nation's market with goods, throwing many out of employment until the congestion is relieved, is a symptom of the disproportion between mechanical and agricultural production. This phenomenon. M. Meline thinks, will become universal and so disastrous that a revolution will follow unless some means are found of diverting the surplus labor to the soil.

The argument that limits should be set to the progress of mechanical invention is crude and unscientific. A man cannot earn more than the product of his labor, and any invention which increases that product places him in a position to command more of the things that minister to his comfort and pleasure. But there is a grain of truth in M. Meline's deductions. Nearly every country, by means its borders, and has placed a premium upon manufacturing at the expense of agriculture. One result has been to divert capital from the land to industrial production by the prospect of higher profits. 


