

Concerning Chiffons.
We are all chiffon loving creatures nowadays. Everything is more or less worn with chiffon adjuncts-scarfs, sleeve ruffles, etc. All play their part in one's wardrobe; but, like most pretty airy triffes, chiffon soils quickly, and many girls don't know how easily they can wash and get up at home what they usually throw away.

To wash chiffon successfully you will require a perfectly clean pan, in which make a warm lather of good yellow Boil this, using just enough water to cover the soap, and when the soap is dissolved add to it warm water, put in the chiffon and carefully squeeze it sponge fashion until it is fresh and clean. Rinse in warm water and then in cold until all the soap is removed, adding to the rinsing water one tablespoonful of vinegar and just a little salt, both useful in preserving

and reviving color. The washing over, pull the material into shape and iron while very damp Chiffon dries so quickly that if you are ironing a large piece don't expose it to the air more than is avoidable. If you wish the chiffon to be a trifle stiff make a little rice starch and immerse it for a

few seconds before ironing. Rice starch is made by taking two tablespoonfuls of rice and a pint and a half of cold water. The rice must be washed quite clean and boiled in the

water three or four minutes.

Toronto, June 7.—The actuarial evidence of Frank Sanderson of the Canada Life, given before the Insurance Commission, was not concluded yesterday. No new points were adduced, Mr. Shepley spent the morning on the change in reserve basis, and the afternoon on the "profit and loss" statement and the statement of investments by the company. by the company.

The Imperial Life will be the next company, as Mr. Shepley purposes finishing with the Canada Life to-day.

Basis of Reserve.

Frank Sanderson, the actuary of the Canada Life, told of his connection with the company. He explained the basis of reserve used by the Canada Life since the commencement of the company. For the first ten years the reserve was based on the Carlyle 6 per cent. table, then on a 5 per cent. table, and later (1877) on the new 41-2 table. In 1889 President Ramsay placed \$225,000 in the reserve fund, and changed to the soft hat. The brim is wide and flexible, with a smartly turned up

In 1894 the company made a further change to the American 4 per cent. table, which held until the Dominion legislation of 1899. Half a million that had been laid aside was turned into reserve. It was then that \$500,000 was taken out of the 1894 quinquennial profits, \$1,070,000 out of 1899 profits, and \$995,000 in 1901. This totaled \$2,565,000 the sum necessary to turn from the company's standard to the compulsory standard required by the Government. the Government.

Mr. Sanderson defended the action of the Canada Life in making the change quickly instead of taking Mr. Hellmuth's way—1-15 of 1, per cent. per annum. Mr. Sheptey explained that the increased revenue earned larger amounts in profits, but took more of the gross premium. This decreased the net premiums. It took some time for the increased profits earned on the reserve to offset the decreased loadings. "The policyholders of the Canada Life are all well satisfied," said the witness, abruptly. He displayed a book containing testimonials from policyholders. Mr. Sanderson defended the action

For nearly an hour Mr. Shepley analyzed the profit and loss statement. From 1900 to 1905, the Canada Life premiums were computed on a 31-2 per cent. basis, although the reserve was at 3 per cent. The result was a depleted loading, although the lower premium ratio had favorable results in competition with other companies.





! HE HOUSEHOLD INVENTORY an Accurate Record Should Be Made

How many households have at hand a carefully compiled inventory of household goods? Not one in a hun-dred. Yet such an inventory protects the householder in settlements with insurance companies and helps the ad-

juster to make a fair settlement. A residence inventory may be worth hundreds or thousands of dollars to the insured.

The compiling of an inventory is by just right the duty of the man of the house, yet if accurate records are to be kept it will be advisable for the women to attend to the matter. In large towns and cities it is customary for furniture dealers to supply their cus-tomers with printed inventory blanks bound in booklet form. These little

books usually contain valuable sugges-tions and instructions regarding fire and burglary insurance, lists of articles commonly used in a house or apart-ment and a resume for totals. There are pages in the book for a complete record of articles in reception hall, front and back parlors, library, dining room and butler's closet, kitchen and pantry, guest room, three bedrooms, servant's room, bathroom, laundry, garret and basement, barn and car-

riage house.

Special pages are provided for an inventory of books, bric-a-brac, glassware, china, jewelry, silverware, pictures, linen and clothing and a full

THE MAKING OF MAYONNAISE

A great many housekeepers, especially the young wife just entering upon her domestic duties, fight shy of salad, that most wholesome and delicious of foods, simply because they are afraid of making mayonnaise, supposing it to be so difficult. Most recipes for mayonnaise insist upon the oil being put in drop by drop, adding the other ingre-dients later. Others maintain that the right way is to put a few drops of vinegar first on the egg and then to add the oil. Yet even with this pre-caution the dressing frequently cur-

Where there is a refrigerator in the house or where the dressing can be kept on ice it is wise to make the mayonnaise the day before it is required. To insure success the egg and the oil must be as fresh and as as possible. Break the yolk of egg into a bowl, add half a teaspoonful of salt, a dash of cayenne pepper, half a teaspoonful of sugar, a pinch of white pepper and a little mustard. Mix these together with a silver fork until smooth. Then boldly add eight tea-spoonfuls of olive oil and two teaspoonfuls of vinegar. Beat this thor-oughly with an egg beater, and in a few minutes the dressing will be thick and creamy. The above quantity is sufficient for four people. Half a pint of cream whipped and mixed with the mayonnaise just before using is a great improvement and also adds to the quantity. If liked, the mayonnaise may be tinted by adding a few drops of vegetable colorings, sold by grocers, or if these are not at hand a delicate green shade can be obtained by using freshly chopped parsley, and for sev-eral shades of pink to deep rose a few drops of beet root juice will be suffi-cient. Use a light colored yolk of egg for straw color, and when a white mayonnaise is desired lemon juice is better than vinegar. Mayonnaise can be transformed into tartare sauce by adding chopped pickles, onlons, capers and olives and will be found delicious with fish and cold meats. This way of making mayonnaise has been found to work really well and to banish all fear of failure.


