Quebec, 29th November 1820.

MY LORD,

IN obedience to His Majesty's pleasure, signified to me in your Lordship's despatch of the 14th of June last, I have the honour to transmit to you, herewith, a Return of all the Timber cut within the American Lines, that has passed the port of Saint John, on Lake Champlain, between the years 1800 and 1820; together with a Return of the Timber imported into Lower Canada from the United States of America, which was entered at the Custom House at Côteau-du-Lac, being the port of entry between Upper and Lower Canada, from the 16th June 1815, the period at which that port was established.

The Timber cut in Upper Canada, not being liable to entry, a Return of the same could not be procured.

I also transmit a Return of all the Timber exported from the port of Quebec within the first above-mentioned periods, which however does not state, whether the same was cut within the United States, Upper Canada, or Lower Canada; and it appears from the note on the Returns, that the documents in the Custom House do not furnish the means of making that distinction.
