Wall Street is very quiet this morning. Stocks, it will be seen, fell oil a lettle. The banks so far have not had much demand for bills on England—not as much as was expected. They draw at 1091, but of course draw by necessity, and wish to sell as few bills as possible. A large amount of bills is required to be sent, but it is supposed that the remittances will be quite short. Importing house lave an abundance of paper, but in the prefert position of the money market, it is impossible to turn this paper into cash. The banks discount nothing for the insonters, nor will they until after the steamer subs, it they will then.


