# FREDERICTON, MONDAY, 7TH FEBRUARY, 1831.

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HIS Honor the President having been pleased to dissolve the late General Assembly, and writs having been issued from the Chancery for electing Members to form a House of Assembly, to meet in General Assembly on the fifteenth day of November last, and the same having been by Proclamation prorogued to this day, the Clerk of the Crown delivered to the Clerk of Assembly, a Roll containing the names of the several Members returned by the several Sheriffs, as duly elected; which are as follow, to-wit:—

# Esquires, who took their Seats.

Xenophon Jouett, Esquire, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, delivered a Message from II is Honor the President, requiring the attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

The House attended accordingly, when the Honorable John Saunders, Chief Justice, by command of His Honor the President, acquainted the House, that His Honor did not deem it expedient to declare the causes of summoning this General Assembly, until there should be a Speaker of the House of Assembly; and that it was His Honor's pleasure, that the Gentlemen of the Assembly repair to the place where the Assembly usually sit, and there choose a fit person as Speaker, and present the person so chosen to His Honor for his approbation.

The House being returned,

Mr. Allen, a Member from the County of York, addressing the Clerk, proposed Charles Simonds, Esquire, a Member for the County of Saint John, to fill the Office of Speaker; which was seconded by Mr. Dow.

Mr. Wyer, a Member from the County of Charlotte, then proposed Edward F. Chandler, Esquire, a Member from the County of Westmorland; which was seconded by Mr. Gunard.

The Gentlemen then proposed withdrew from their seats.

The question being then put, whether C. Simonds, Esquire, be elected to the Office, the House divided. Yeas, 12-Nays, 12.

Whereupon, the question was pegatived.

The question was then put, as to the election of Edward B. Chandler, Esquire. Whereupon the House again divided equally; and the question likewise negatived.

The House then adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

# TUESDAY, Sth FEBRUARY, 1831.

In pursuance of the direction from His Honor the President, the House proceeded to the election of a Speaker.

Whereupon, Mr. Hayward, a Member from the County of Sunbury, proposed Charles Simonde, Esquire, to the Office; which was seconded by Mr. Gilbert.

Mr. Cunard, a Member from Northumberland, then proposed Edward B. Chandler, Esquire; which was seconded by Mr. Miles.

The question was then put upon the election of Mr. Simonds, and the House dividéd.

Yeas 12. Navs 12. Whereupon the question was negatived.

The question was then taken as to the election of Mr. Chandler.

When the House again divided equally, and the question as to Mr. Chandler nega-

Mr. Weldon, the Member from Kept, then proposed William Crane, Esquire, a Member from Westmorland, to the office; which motion was seconded by Mr.

Mr. Slason, a Member from York, then proposed Rufus Smith, Esquire, a Member from Westmorland, to the office; which was seconded by Mr. Simonds.

The question then being put upon the election of Mr. Grane, the House divided. Yeas, 13. Nays, 12.

It was thereupon decided in favor of William Crane, Esquire.

Mr. Crane was then taken from his Seat and conducted to the Chair, and when on the steps, he expressed his grateful acknowledgements for the confidence reposed in him, and observed as he was conscious of his mability to discharge the duties of the high station to which he had been elected, in a proper manner, he trusted upon consideration, that the House would choose a Member of greater experience and ability.

The House persisting in their choice; Mr. Crane then said:

"I submit to the wishes of the House, and trust my conduct will receive that aid and support which I shall endeavour to deserve."

Mr. Crane then took the Chair.

A Message from His Honor the President, requiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

Whereupon, Mr. Speaker elect with the House, attended His Honor the President.

Being returned, Mr. Humbert moved for leave to bring in a Bill to repeal the Laws now in force, for regulating the qualification and election of Representatives to serve in General Assembly, to provide for the future regulation and qualification of Representatives, and to limit the duration of Assemblies in this Province.

Leave granted.

Mr. Speaker then informed the House, that he had addressed His Honor the President to the effect following:—

" May it please your Honor,

"The House of Assembly in obedience to your Honor's commands, and in the exercise of their undoubted right, have proceeded to the chocie of a Speaker, and now humbly attend your Honor to present me as the person chosen; conscious, however, of my inability to discharge the duties of this high Office, I trust that your Honor will be pleased to disapprove of their choice and command them to elect a more fit person."

The Honorable Mr. Chief Justice Saunders then spoke as follows

" William Crane, Esquire,

"I am commanded by His Honor the President, to acquaint you that he hath so good an opinion of your integrity, diligence and sufficiency, for executing the important Office into which you are elected, that His Honor is perfectly satisfied with the choice which the House of Assembly have made, and doth allow and confirm you to be their Speaker."

THE STREET WITH THE STREET

That he, the Speaker, then said: -

"Since your Honor has been pleased to approve of the choice the House have made of me as their Speaker, I have, in their name and in their behalf, to claim all their ancient privileges, particularly that they may enjoy liberty of Speech, and have free access to your Honor's person, whenever occasion may require.

To which the Chief Justice replied :-

"Mr. Speaker, :-

"His Honor the President hath the greatest confidence in the duty and affection of this House of Assembly to His Majesty's Person and Government, and in the wisdom, temper and prudence which will accompany all their proceedings; and His Honor doth readily and willingly grant and allow them all their privileges, in as full and ample a manner as they have at any time been granted and allowed."

And that His Honor the President was then pleased to make a Speech to both Houses, of which Mr. Speaker said, he had, to prevent mistakes, procured a copy, which he read to the House, and is as follows:

- "Mr. President and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council, " The President and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council,
  - " Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Assembly,
- "I WAS induced, after due consideration, to defer meeting you in General Assem-

bly till now, in order to prevent, as much as possible, the business of the Supreme Court from interfering with your important deliberations in the ensuing Session.

"I shall direct to be laid before you copies of the Official Despatches, which communicated the mournful tidings of the demise of our late Most Gracious and lamented Sovereign, and the auspicious accession of His present Most Excellent Majesty, King WILLIAM THE FOURTH, to the Throne of His Ancestors.

"With sincere satisfaction and a deep sense of gratitude to the Author and Giver of all good, am I enabled to congratulate you on the prosperous and improving condition of the Province. By the Divine Blessing, the late fine season has proved remarkably favorable to agricultural pursuits, and the greatly increased enterprise and exertions of the people have, in general, been rewarded with the most bountiful returns; which will have the happy effect considerably to diminish the importation of foreign supplies for the consumption of the inhabitants. The gradual but steady improvement in the Commerce and Staple Trade of the Province, as indicated by the present state of Revenue, is also a most pleasing circumstance.

## " Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Assembly,

"I shall order to be laid before you, without delay, the Treasurer's Accounts and other documents therewith connected, which, I am happy to acquaint you, will be found highly gratifying; the Revenue of last year being more productive than had been anticipated, and largely exceeding that of the former. It will not, however, be prudent to calculate on the permanency of this prosperous degree of the Provincial income; for, without apprehending the adoption of any other measures affecting the Trade of the Northern Colonies, the commercial arrangement, recently concluded with the Government of the United States, must have an immediate tendency greatly to lessen the amount of Revenue to be collected in this Province, under the Acts of Parliament.

"I rely with confidence on your making the usual provision for the Ordinary Services, and for such other objects of general utility as may be recommended to your favorable consideration.

## "Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Council,

# "Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Assembly,

"Upon the perusal of the documents to be submitted for your consideration, concerning the Grants of last Session for additional Light-Houses, you will perceive that, by accurate Surveys and Estimates, it has been ascertained that the sums yet appropriated by Lower-Canada and this Province, for the erection of the contemplated Light-House on Saint Paul's Island, are quite inadequate for that service. It has therefore been considered advisable, in concurrence with the opinion of the late Governor General, His Excellency Sir James Kempt, to defer the further prosecution of that important undertaking, (much although delay in such a case is to be regretted) until the deficiency can be provided for; it being likewise most desirable that the respective proportions of the expense for the future maintenance of the Establishment, according to the comparative advantages therefrom to be derived by the Canadas and New-Brunswick, should be agreed on.

"Considering the vast importance of good Roads of Communication with all parts of the Province, I feel persuaded, that subject with all other objects and institutions which, for the welfare of the Country, have been under the fostering care of the Legislature, will continue to receive the wisdom of your unremitting attention and li-

beral support.

"The great want of a Public Penitentiary in this Province, so rapidly increasing in population, having on a former occasion been generally admitted, I need only now beg permission to recall to your wise consideration that important object.

"To all your measures for promoting the true interests and prosperity of the Country, it will afford me great satisfaction to contribute my hearty concurrence."

On motion of Mr. Simonds,

Resolved, That a Committee of Privileges be appointed, to whom may be referred

all matters, which may hereafter arise, that may in any way be supposed to affect the privileges of this House.

Ordered, That Mr. Simonds, Mr. Weldon, Mr. Chandler, Mr. Allen, and Mr.

End, be a Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Resolved. That an humble Address be presented to His Honor the President, in answer to his Speech.

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Canard, and Mr. Chandler be a Committee to

prepare the Address.

On motion of Mr. J. Humbert,

Ordered, That one hundred and fifty copies of His Honor the President's Speech be printed for the use of the Legislature.

Mr. Speaker acquainted the House, that the Clerk had nominated Thomas Saunders Wetmore, Esquire, to the office of Clerk Assistant; which was approved by the

Mr. Wetmore, after taking the requisite Oaths, took the seat assigned him at the

Clerk's Table.

On motion of Mr. Weldon,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to revise the Rules and Regulations of the House of Assembly of this Province, and to make further Rules and Regulations for the government thereof.

Ordered. That Mr. Weldon, Mr. Simonds, Mr. J. Humbert, Mr. Allen, and Mr.

Pertelow, be a Committee therefor.

On motion of Mr. S. Humbert

Resolved. That the Reverend Dr. Somerville be the Chaplain of this House.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Resolved. That a standing Committee be appointed to extendite, liquidate, and report upon Public and Private Accounts.

Ordered. That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Cunard, Mr. Ward, Mr. End, and Mr. Smith,

be a Committee therefor.

On motion of Mr. Vail,

Ordered, That the Journals of this House be daily (or as soon as a copy thereof can be prepared by the Clerk) printed, and that the Printer do furnish one hundred and fifty copies thereof, for the use of the Legislature.

On motion of Mr. Simonds,

Resolved, That a Committee of Trade be appointed to consider and report upon all the matters relating to the Commerce of this Province.

Ordered, That Mr. Simonds, Mr. Wyer, Mr. Partelow, Mr. Cunard, Mr. Bar-

low, Mr. Ward, and Mr. Taylor, be a Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Chandler, Resolved, That no Petition be received, or Bill brought in, after the sixth day of March next, except by special leave of the House.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Ordered, That the House do go into Committee of the whole, in consideration of His Honor the President's Speech, to-morrow.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 40 o'clock.

# WEDNESDAY, 9th February, 1831.

Prayers.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from William H. Street, Esquire, of Saint John, Wine and Spirit Merchant, praying the House will take under consideration the propriety of an alteration in the duties now imposed upon Wines imported into the Province; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Pctition be received and referred to the Committee of

Trade.

Mr. Weldon, from the Committee appointed to revise the Rules and Regulations of the House of Assembly of this Province, and to make further Rules for the Government of this House, reported, that they had attended thereto, and prepared a number of Rules; which he read.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted.

On motion of Mr. Weldon,

The House went into Committee of the whole, in consideration of the said Report.

Mr. Taylor in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. Taylor, from the Committee, reported that they had gone into consideration of the Report of the Select Committee, and had agreed to the Rules therein reported, with amendments, and they being severally read at the Clerk's Table, were agreed to by the House, and are as follow:—

#### Rilles

#### FOR GOVERNMENT OF HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

- 1. No Member to come into the House, or move from one place to another with his hat on.
- II. While the House is sitting, and any Member is speaking, no Member is allowed to speak or whisper so as to interrupt him, unless it be to speak to order.
- III. When any Member intends to speak, he is to stand in his place and address himself to the Speaker, and if more than one stand to speak, the Speaker is to determine who was up first, and the person named by him is to speak, unless he gives way to the other.
  - IV. No Member is allowed to be standing in his place while another is speaking.
- V. When any business is in debate, if any Member rise to speak to a new business, any other Member may, but Mr. Speaker ought to, interrupt him.
- VI. When any Member of Mr. Speaker speaks to order, the question of order must be decided previous to the business then before the House being proceeded in.
- VII. When any question is put and a division is demanded, those that are for the question are to rise, and those against it are to remain sitting.
- VIII. When a motion has been made and seconded, that matter must receive a determination by the question, unless the previous question is put and carried, or an adjournment be moved, or the motion is withdrawn by the Member that made it.
- IX. When a motion is made and seconded, the Member's name who made the motion is to be inserted on the Journal.
- X. After a question is propounded, no Member may speak more than once to the matter, except the Member who made the motion, and he may reply, and if any new matter arise, then speak to that matter only.
- XI. When a question is decided by vote, the inimber of both the affirmatives and negatives shall be inserted in the Journal, and also the Members' names, if insisted on by three or more Members.

  XII.

- XII. That the Journal of the day be read the next morning, prior to any other business.
- XIII. That the Sergeant at Arms do not permit any person to come within the House, while it is sitting, except the Members and Officers attending.
- XIV. That all persons who will question any return of Members to serve in General Assembly, do question the same within 14 days after the meeting of the House, and so within 14 days after any new return shall be brought in.
- XV. That the House will not enter into a scrutiny of votes polled at any election of Members to serve in the General Assembly, unless a scrutiny was duly demanded of the Sheriff.
- XVI. That any Member bringing in a Petition, shall in his place acquaint the House of the general purport of such Petition, and ask leave for it to be read, which must be seconded before it is read.
- XVII. That the Speaker cannot take the Chair for the purpose of proceeding on any deliberations, or during any business whatever, except it be to receive the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, or a Message from the Council, or to enforce the attendance of absent Members, unless at least fourteen Members, including Mr. Speaker, he present; but for the purpose before-mentioned, any number exceeding four, including Mr. Speaker, shall be deemed sufficient after the hour has arrived to which the House may be adjourned.
- XVIII. That if any Member obtain leave of this House to act as an Attorney or Counsel in any matter, at the bar of the House, he shall not speak or vote as a Member upon such a matter.
- XIX. That no Member be present in the House when a Bill or any business concerning himself is debating, but while the Bill is but reading or opening he may.
- XX. That every Me, there be heard in his place, touching any charge brought against him, or other matter respecting his election, return or privilege, or wherever his private interest is materially affected, but is to withdraw before the House proceed to debate thereon.
- XXI. That in case any offensive matter occurring in debate, the same shall be immediately noted down in writing; and if it be neglected to be so noted on the day of its occurrence, the same shall not be afterwards considered by the House.
- Mr. Simonds moved for leave to bring in a Bill to revise and include in one Act, the provisions of all the Laws now in force, for the public Registering of all Deeds, Conveyances, Wills, Judgments, Recognizances and other Incumbrances, which shall be made of, or that may affect Lands, Tenements, or Hereditaments within the Province.

Leave granted.
The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from Berjamin L. Peters, Esquire, a candidate for the representation of the City of Saint John in General Assembly, at the late General Election, praying an investigation of the votes given for William B. Kinnear, Esquire, one of the Members returned for the said City, and the Petitioner; and that he may be heard by Counsel, touching the allegations stated in the said petition; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. S. Humbert moved for leave to bring in a Bill to alter and amend an Act, to repeal all the Acts now in force, relating to the Light-House upon Partridge Island, and to make provision for the future support thereof, and of other Light-Houses at the entrance of the Harbour of Saint John.

Leave granted.

On motion of Mr. Allen,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to examine what Laws have lately expired or are near expiring, and report thereon to the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Allen, Mr. Chandler, and Mr. Brown, be a Committee for

that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Partelow, The House, according to the Order of the Day, went into Committee of the whole, in consideration of His Honor the President's Speech, at the opening of the Session.

Mr. Hayward in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. Hayward, from the Committee, reported that they had gone into consideration of the matter referred to them, and passed two Resolutions, which he read; and they being handed in at the Clerk's Table, were there again severally read and agreed to by the House, and are as follow:-

1. "Resolved, That it is expedient that the paragraph in His Honor's Speech which relates to the Roads of Communication through the Province, be referred to a

Select Committee, to report thereon to the House."

2. "Resolved, That it is highly expedient that that part of His Honor's Speech, which calls the attention of the House to the subject of a Penitentiary, be referred to a Select Committee, who shall be instructed to make diligent inquiry, and report the result to the House.

Ordered, that Mr. End, Mr. Cunard, Mr. Weldon, Mr. Chandler, Mr. Vail, Mr. S. Humbert, Mr. Clinch, Mr. Harrison, Mr. Miles, and Mr. Allen, be the Committee to take under consideration the subject relative to Roads; communicated in His Honor's Speech.

Ordered, That Mr. Simonds, Mr. Dow, Mr. Hill, Mr. End, and Mr. Smith, be a Committee to consider and report upon the subject relative to Penitentiaries, as communicated in His Honor's Speech.

On motion of Mr. Hayward,

Resolved, That this House do on Monday, the 14th instant, go into Committee of the whole in consideration of Supplies to be granted for the Public Service.

Mr. Partelow moved the following Resolution, which was passed by the House.

"Whereas great apprehensions are entertained by this House, that the strenuous efforts which have been heretofore made by the Northern Powers of Europe, and which they were continuing to make at the date of the latest advices from England, to obtain a reduction or the abolition of the existing duties on Foreign Wood imported into the Mother Country, have engaged the attention of His Majesty's Ministers: and whereas such reduction or abolition, (if adopted,) would not only vitally affect the commercial interests of this Country, but would involve in ruin a considerable and influential portion of His Majesty's most faithful subjects residing in the North American Provinces, independently of the injury that the shipping interest of the whole Empire would sustain thereby:

"Therefore resolved, that an humble Address be prepared to be presented to His Majesty's Government on the subject, and that His Majesty's Council be requested

to join in such address."

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow be a Committee to communicate this Resolution to the Council.

Mr. Simonds moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to regulate Inns, Taverns, and Houses for selling strong Liquors, and to repeal all the Laws now in force, relating to the same.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Weldon, by leave, presented a Petition from the Justices of the Peace for the County of Kent, praying An Act may pass, authorising an assessment to be made upon the Inhabitants of the said County, towards defraying the debt due for building a Court House and Gaol in the said County; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Taylor moved for leave to bring in a Bill to amend an Act, intituled, "An Act to regulate the Exportation of Lumber, and to repeal all the Acts now in force relating to the same."

Leave granted.

Mr. S. Humbert moved for leave to bring in a Bill to facilitate the recovery of Seamen's Wagesin the Merchant Service and Coasting Trade in this Province. Leave granted.

Mr. Vail, by leave, presented a Petition from David Goddard, praying to be remunerated for a sum expended by him on the road from Grave's Mill to Antone Clane's; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Wyer moved for leave to bring in a Bill to alter and amend the Law for the regulation of the Herring Fisheries of the Island of Grand Manan, West Isles and Campo Bello, as far as relates to Grand Manan. Leave granted.

Mr. Brown, by leave, presented a Petition from Richard E. Foster, of the Island of Grand Manan, praying a Law may pass for the preservation of Moose on that Island, giving to the Petitioner the exclusive right thereto; which he read.

Upon the question that the Petition be received and lie on the Table, it was deci-

ded in the negative.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning, at 10 o'clock.

# THURSDAY, 10th February, 1831.

Prayers.

Mr. Weldon, by leave, presented a Petition from the Justices of the County of Kent, praying pecuniary aid to assist in the discharge of the debt due for building the Court House and Gaol in the said County; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of

Supply.

Mr. Gilbert, by leave, presented a Petition from James Mullen, praying remunoration for services performed on the Great Road from Fredericton to Westmorland. in the years 1813 and 1817, under a contract with the late Benjamin Wilson, Esquire, then Supervisor; which he read.

Upon the question, that the said Petition be received and referred to the Commit-

tee of Supply, it was decided in the negative.

Mr. Weldon moved for leave to bring in a Bill to authorize the Justices of the Peace for the County of Kent, to assess the Inhabitants for the purpose of paying off the debt due for building the Court House and Gaol.

Leave granted. The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. S. Humbert moved for leave to bring in a Bill to provide for the due performance of the Statute Labour throughout this Province. Mr. Leave granted.

"THE HUMBLE ADDRESS OF THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

" MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOR,

"WE, the Representatives of His Majesty's loyal subjects, the people of New-Brunswick, thank Your Honor for the Speech you have been pleased to make to us, at the opening of this Session of the General Assembly.

"We feel obliged by your Honor's intention of laying before us copies of the Official Despatches, which announced the lamented death of our late Most Gracious Sovereign, and the consequent auspicious accession of His present Majesty, to the

throne of his ancestors.

"The prosperous state of the Province, as communicated by Your Honor, affords us much gratification, and we are happy to learn that the labours of the husbandman

have been so bountifully rewarded the last year.

"The improvement in the commercial concerns of the country also gives much satisfaction, although we cannot but apprehend the most disastrous consequences in that important branch of our prosperity in future, by the operation of the late treaty, concluded between the Mother Country and the United States.

"We thank Your Honor for the assurance that the Treasurer's Accounts shall be speedily laid before us, and learn with great pleasure that an improvement has taken place in the Revenue; we, however, fully agree with Your Honor, that we cannot anticipate the permanency of the Provincial Income, affected as it must nenecessarily.

cessarily be, for the causes previously adverted to, by a reduction both in the Ordinary and Parliamentary Duties.

"For the Ordinary Services of the Province, and all other objects of general util-

ity, we will make the necessary provision.

"The contemplated Light House on Saint Paul's Island, as well as other matters of a similar nature, will receive the fullest consideration. Your Honor may rely upon such provision being made as will comport with the circumstance of the Province, for the Roads throughout the Country; a subject, of all others so intimately connected with its general prosperity, should and will have our unremitting attention.

"We feel deeply sensible of the necessity that exists for the establishment of a Provincial Penitentiary, and Your Honor may be assured that proper consideration

will be given to that important object.

"The same zeal which has distinguished Your Honor's Administration, in cooperating with us in such measures as will advance the true interests of the country, we are satisfied, remains unabated."

Being returned, Mr. Speaker reported that His Honor had been pleased to make the following reply thereto:-

"Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Assembly,

"I Beg your acceptance of my best thanks for this gratifying Address of the loyal Representatives of the people of New-Brunswick, as conveying at once your ready assurance to make provision for the ordinary services and all other beneficial objects, and to bestow your diligent attention on the other matters recommended to your favorable consideration.

Whereupon, George F. Street, Esquire, one of the Petitioners, appeared on behalf of himself and the other Petitioners, and John S. Saunders, Esquire, as Counsel

for the sitting Member.

The Order of the Day was then read.

# WEDNESDAY, 23d February, 1831.

#### Prayers.

Mr. Vail, a Member from King's County, applied for leave of absence, for the purpose of collecting evidence required in the matter of the scrutiny to be had between him and Samuel Freeze, Esquire, who petitions against his election; which was granted him.

The Joint Address of the Council and Assembly to His Majesty, upon the subject of a reduction or abolition of the existing duties on Foreign Wood, was read as engressed, and is as follows:—

"To

# "To the King's Most Ercellent Majesty.

"The Humble Petition of Your Majesty's Council and House of Assembly, of the Province of New-Brunswick in General Assembly, convened.

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

YOUR Majesty's most faithful Subjects the Council and Assembly of New-Brunswick, being greatly alarmed at a report which has reached this Country of an intention entertained by your Majesty's Ministers, so to alter the duties upon Wood imported into the United Kingdom, as to destroy the protection afforded to Colonial over Foreign Wood, by the existing system of duties; a measure (if carried into operation) fraught with consequences so ruinous to all Your Majesty's North American Colonies, and to New-Brunswick more extensively than to any other, beg leave to lay at the foot of the Throne, this our humble representation.

"Under this protecting system, originally adopted for the purpose of rendering the Mother Country independent of Foreign Nations for a supply of Wood, a trade of vast magnitude has grown up, in which British Capital alone is engaged, and British

Interests alone are promoted.

"We have not at command the documents from which we can accurately ascertain the actual extent of this trade, but from the information which we possess, we are induced to believe, that the number of Vessels employed in the whole trade with the Canadas and the lower Provinces, does not fall short of two thousand annually, and that the number of Sailors required for navigating them amounts to twenty five thousand.

"This is the Staple Trade of New-Brunswick. In its two Branches of ton timber and deals, nearly the whole commercial industry of the country is enterested, while the commercial establishments and outlay of capital are altogether arranged with a view to its prosecution.

"We have as yet no article of export which would find a market in the United Kingdom but the produce of the Forests, and if our means of paying for British manu-

factures cease, the importation of these manufactures must cease also.

"With a sinking commerce, our credit with the British merchant must wear away. the Revenues of the Country must dwindle, internal improvement be stopped, and

the settlement of the Wilderness Lands in a great measure suspended.

"That the commercial intercourse between the United Kingdom and the Northern Colonies, especially this Province of New Brunswick, would be very greatly reduced. if not altogether annihilated, by withdrawing the protecting duties on our Wood, and the consequent increase of supply of this article to the Mother Country, from the Northern powers of Europe, we fear, is too evident to need any proof, and we therefore contemplate the disastrous consequences of such a measure, with no small degree of discouragement and dismay.

"But the commercial evils which would ensue to these Colonies, are not the only ones which we apprehend, we very much fear that the ruin of the Wood Trade with the United Kingdom, following so soon after the opening of the West India Colonies to the United States, would be viewed by all the North American Colonists, as such an abandonment of their interests in Your Majesty's Councils, as could not fail to excite discontent, and have a strong tendency to shake the loyal affection, which they have hitherto cherished with such honest zeal towards the Parent State; and there is no political evil which the Inhabitants of this Province would more seriously deprecate, than, a weakening of their ties to that country, which they, and their fathers before them have so steadfastly adhered to, throughout every change of fortune, prosperous

"We forbear to enlarge upon the effects which a change of the existing policy with regard to the Colonial Wood Trade would have upon the general Interests of the Empire in its bearing upon the shipping interests, and as a nursery for British Seamen; these are topics upon which Your Majesty's Ministers must have far more extended means of information, than are within our reach. But there is one most important consideration connected with this trade, which we cannot refrain from distinctly bringing

to notice, and that is, the facility which it affords for the emigration to these Colonies of the surplus population of the United Kingdom, and the means of employment which it lays open to the Emigrant after his arrival in the Colony; circumstances which we do not hesitate to declare, are both of them absolutely essential to the continuance of that tide of emigration, which now so fortunately both for the Mother Country and the Colonies, is directing its course to these British American shores. If the Colonial Wood Trade cease, there will be neither ships to bring out the Emigrants, nor business in the Colonies to give them wages for their labour, until they can clear and cultivate their lands, nor a market for the produce of the soil, after their cultivation of it has rendered it productive.

"The Council and Assembly, therefore, most humbly implore Your Majesty to take the foregoing circumstances into Your Most Gracious consideration, and earnestly pray, that Your Majesty's Government may not be induced to alter the present system of protection to the Colonial Wood Trade, which is so vitally important to the interests of these North American Provinces, as constituent parts of the Bri-

tish Empire.

"And as in duty bound will ever pray, &c."

The Address was then handed to the Committee of the House, to join the Committee of Council, to wait upon His Honor the President, therewith.

Mr. J. Humbert, by leave, presented a Petition from William Corry, praying the Provincial allowance may be granted him for teaching a School in the Parish of Hampton, in King's County, for the year 1829; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of

Supply.

On motion of Mr. Chandler,

The House went into Committee of the whole, in further consideration of a Bill for the encouragement of Parish Schools in this Province.

Mr. Ward in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that having gone into consideration of the Bill referred to them, they had agreed to the same with amendments.

Ordered, That the report be accepted, and the Bill engrossed as amended.

Mr. Cunard, by leave, presented a Petition from John Smith, a teacher of the Madras School at Chatham, in the County of Northumberland, praying a sum may be granted him to make up the full amount of the Provincial allowance for teaching a School for the term of five years; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of

Supply.

Mr. Cunard, by leave, presented a Petition from John Hinchey, praying to be remunerated for teaching a School for the term of seven months, at Newcastle, in the County of Northumberland; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of

Supply.

Mr. Cunard, by leave, presented a Petition from the Justices of the Peace for the County of Northumberland, praying an Act may pass authorizing an assessment to be made, to enable them to pay off and discharge the County debts; which he read. Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Cunard, by leave, presented a Petition from Gilmour, Rankin, and Company, of Miramichi, Merchants, praying drawback on Rum exported in the year 1829; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred Committee of

Supply.

On motion of Mr. S. Humbert,

The House went into Committee of the whole, on a Bill to repeal the Laws now in force, for regulating the qualification and election of Representatives to serve in General Assembly, to provide for the future regulation and qualification of Representatives, and to limit the duration of Assemblies in this Province.

Mr. J. Humbert in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that they had made progress in the Bill referred to them, and that he was directed to ask leave to sit again.

Ordered, That the report be accepted, and leave granted.

Mr. Weldon, pursuant to notice given of his intention to bring under consideration of the House, the subject with regard to the expediency of continuing the services of

the Province Agents in Great Britain, submitted the following resolution.

"Resolved, That under present circumstances it is inexpedient to continue the appointment of the Province Agents in Great Britain, and that the Speaker do communicate the same to those Gentlemen, accompanied by the thanks of this House for the attention they have shewn in the discharge of their duties; and that a Committee be appointed to acquaint His Majesty's Council with the resolution."

And upon the question being put thereon, the House divided:

Yeas, 5.—Nays, 17.

It was thereupon decided in the negative.

Mr. Allen, by leave, presented a Petition from James Whitehead, praying pecuniary aid in his distressed circumstances, upon the ground of his being an old Soldier, and disbanded in the year 1753; which he read.

Mr. Wyer, by leave, presented a Petition from James Allanshaw and Company, praying that an Act may not pass the Legislature, to empower the owners of the Saw Mill at the Rolling Dam, on the Digdeguash River, to erect a Boom in manner prayed for in the Petition of Samuel M Farlane and Lauchlan Cameron, presented to the House on the 10th instant; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

"Therefore resolved, that the subjects adverted to be brought under the consideration of His Majesty's Government, by Addresses from this House; and that a Cora-

mittee be appointed to prepare the same."

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Simonds, and Mr. Chandler, be a Committee to prepare the said Addresses.

Mr. Wyer moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to authorize the Justices of the Peace for the County of Charlotte, further to assess the inhabitants of said County, for the completion and finishing a Gaol, and to provide for the erection of Lock-up-Houses in the said County.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

A Bill, to enable the Justices of the Peace for the County of Kent, to raise money by assessment on the Inhabitants of the said County, to discharge the debt due

for erecting the Court House and Gaol.

A Message from His Majesty's Council.

Mr. Bliss, Master in Chancery, informed the House, that the Council had agreed to the amendment made by the Assembly, to the Bill for setting and keeping to hard labour, persons adjudged to that punishment.

Such encouragement or bounty to be paid by warrant of the President or Commander in Chief, upon the certificate of the Treasurer or any Deputy Treasurer, at the Port or Place where such vessel or vessels may be fitted out; that the vessel for which such bounty shall be claimed, is wholly owned by a resident or residents within this Province; was properly fitted for a sealing voyage, and manned with at least one man to every four tons of registered tonnage, and equipped with one boat to every four men; which certificate shall also be accompanied with an affidavit of the Master of such vessel, and at least one half of the crew, that such vessel was actually employed in prosecuting such sealing voyage; and that such vessel had actually taken

seals; and that the whole of the skins and oil of such seals, had been actually landed in the Province; and were wholly the property of one or more British sub-

ject or subjects resident within the same.

A Message from His Honor the President.

Mr. Shore, acting Secretary, by command of His Honor, laid before the House further reports and audits from the Provincial Auditor.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee on Public and Private Accounts, submitted a further report on accounts from several Supervisors of Great Roads; which he read, and is as follows:-

No. 1. Is an account of N. H. De Veber, Esquire, Supervisor of the Great Road from the Fork of the Great Marsh near Saint John to the head of Belisle, amounting, including his charge of Commission, to £498:9:3, for expenditures on that road in the year 1828. He credits the receipt of £500, from the Treasurer; shewing a balance due the Province on this account, of £1:10:9. This account is not supported by the proper affidavit, neither are the vouchers accompanying it at all satisfactory. The account No. 3, of William Lloyd, one of the vouchers, amounting to £175:16:0, appears to your Committee very extravagant; £150:15:0 being charged for clearing and turnpiking 650 rods of the road. The charges made in voucher No. 8, by the Supervisor himself, for advertising, postages, exploration, and expenses in going to St. John, amounting to £5: 6: 3, are, in the opinion of your Committee, wholly inadmissible.

It may be proper to observe, with reference to the accounts generally with this Supervisor, that he will be required to account to the Province the next Session for £95:10:4, the balance established to be due from him on receipts and expendi-

tures to the year 1828, and that he at the same time charge the Province for a balance established to be due him on a particular expenditure for 1829, of £40:8:1.

In addition to these items, the Supervisor has received £350, for the same road, and for the erection of a Bridge in 1830, no accounts relating to which, has as yet been received. A letter from the Supervisor explains the reason of his not having forwarded them, which appears to your Committee satisfactory; but your Committee are of opinion, that the Supervisor should render a general statement, and at the same time a sustainable one, embracing all the matters now reported upon, in order that his accounts with the Province may be brought to a close.

No. 2. is an account of George Hayward, Esquire, Supervisor of the Great Road leading from Fredericton to Saint John, via, Nerepis; shewing particulars of expenditures on that road for the year 1830, amounting to £752:4:8; credit is given for the receipt of £750, from the Province Treasurer, leaving a balance in favor of the

Supervisor, of £2:4:S.

An affidavit is attached to this account, and the requisite vouchers: and the whole

are satisfactory.

No. 3. Is an account of J. W. Weldon, Esquire, shewing particulars of expenditure on the road leading from Shediac to Richibucto, in the year 1829; including a balance paid William Hannington, Esquire, Supervisor, established to be due him by the Province to that year inclusive; the whole amounting to £128: S: 103.

He credits £137: 14: 10½, remaining in his hands on the 1st January, 1829, leav-

ing a balance in favor of the Province, of £9:6:0.

And the Chairman further reported, that he was directed to ask leave to sit again; which was granted.

The Resolutions as passed by the Committee, were then agreed to by the House, and ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee of Public and Private Accounts, to whom was referred the Accounts and Documents transmitted to this House, by His Honor the President, relating to King's College; reported, that they had attentively examined the same, and he was directed to present the following; which he read.

No. 1. Is a copy of an account commencing in 1817, and ending 1822, between the Hon. J. M. Bliss, the then Treasurer, with the College; shewing gross amounts of receipts and expenditures for the period above named, amounting to 25681. 3s. 9d. shewing a balance in favor of the College of 60l. paid over by him to G. F. Street, Esquire, when he became Treasurer.

No. 2. Contains copies of general accounts current, of G. F. Street, Esquire, Treasurer, with the College, of income and expenditure; commencing September, 1822, and ending 19th February, 1831, made up from year to year, and shewing a balance in the hands of the Treasurer at the last mentioned date of 407l. 14s.  $9\frac{1}{2}d$ .

No. 3. Is a statement of the Lands possessed by the College, and the income derived therefrom; also, an account of monies at interest, secured by bond and mortgage on real estate.

No. 4. Is a general statement of debts due the College, and particularizing how those debts are secured.

No. 5, Is a statement of monies received from 1823 to 1830, inclusive, for timber cut on College Lands.

These accounts are not at all satisfactory, made up as they are in the most confused manner, and consequently rendering it impossible for your Committee to make such a report as would have shewn to the House, at one glance, particulars of the income and of the expenses chargeable against the same, to which the Institution is now subject; information absolutely necessary to govern them in their appropriations towards its support. They cannot, however, avoid adverting to the charge of Commission made by the present Treasurer, on monies which have gone through his hands, amounting in all to 6311. 12s. 4d; part of which has accrued to him, in the payments made to the Contractors for building the College; in one instance, 5 per cent. on 2,8001, for merely endorsing an order to the said Contractors on the Province Treasurer; a charge which your Committee cannot think is sustainable on any grounds, particularly as the large amount of 5,7891. 1s. 3d. which appears by account No. 2, to have gone through the hands of Mr. Secretary Odell, and appropriated towards the same object, has been received and paid without any remuneration: and besides, they view with astonishment the sum of 251, charged on the 1st July, 1830, by the Treasurer, stated to be an allowance made to him by the College Council, for extra services on the 7th July the preceding

They also notice, that 471.38.8, have been deducted from warrants on the Treasurer at sundry times, which appears to have arisen from their having been sold, for the want of money in the Treasury to meet them; a circumstance which your Committee conceive requires investigation.

Your Committee, on the whole, respectfully recommend, that in their opinion the House should disallow these accounts, and that an application should be made to His Honor the President, for such statement upon which a Committee could make a re-

port, of a more satisfactory description than the present one.

It appears that since 1829, the Treasurer has received an annual allowance of £190, and no Commission has been charg'd since that period.

Adams and Young, in their report to the Gevernment of Canada, as the necessity for this establishment has long been evident. and it cannot but be deplored that so much delay has arisen to the risque of life and The Committee would recommend the directions of the House to the Commissioners to proceed to advertise for contracts, for building two Lights with a House for shipwrecked Mariners, all of Wood, as soon as the Government of Canada shall have voted £3500, towards the erection and fitting out of this establishment; and £350 per annum for its maintenance so long as the Light shall be duly kept. The Committee are induced to recommend this proposition, from finding that His Excellency Sir James Kempt was pleased to express his intention of recommending to the Legislature of Canada, to make a Grant in this way for the erection and maintenance of this establishment, and place the responsibility of erecting and maintaining it in this Province, as more convenient than the Ports of Canada, and to prevent any division as to the arrangement further preventing this work going into operation.

To Messrs. Joseph Cunard and Co. of Miramichi, the sum of 701 4 4d, for drawback on Rum experted to Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton, certificates to obtain which having in some instances been mislaid, or not returned in sufficient time to justify the Deputy Treasurer in allowing the same.

To John Mannix, the sum of 81 13s, being for duties twice paid on 173 Gallons of rum exported in the Schooner Lively from Richibacto for Bathurst, but by stress of of weather driven to Prince Edward Island, but afterwards returned to Richibacto.

To His Honor the President or Commander in Chief, the sum of 3261 15 9d. to reimburse the Justices of the Peace for the City and County of Saint John, for expenses incurred within the City for the year 1830, in assisting sick and distressed Emigrants, arriving at the port of Saint John infected with Small Pox and Fever, in the Barque Mary and Brig Feronia, and who were landed and supported on Partridge Island to prevent communication with the Inhabitants of the Province.

A Bill, to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue for the services therein mentioned. Resolved,

Resolved, That the Bill do pass.
Ordered, That Mr. J. Humbert take the Bill to the Council, and desire their concurrence thereto.

The Address of the House to His Majesty, upon the subject of the Custom House establishment in this Province, was read as engrossed, and is as follows:-

## "To the King's Most Breellent Majesty.

" The Humble Address of the House of Assembly of Your Majesty's Province of New-Brunswick.

" MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY.

"HE House of Assembly of New-Brunswick, with the deepest feelings of veneration for Your Majesty's Person, and attachment to Your Majesty's Government, beg leave most humbly to address Your Majesty, regarding the Custom House Establishment of this Province; a subject of great importance to the country, and which they have previously brought under the notice of Your Majesty's Royal Predecessor.

" It will be unnecessary to reiterate on the present occasion the dissatisfaction that so universally prevails in the minds of Your Majesty's most faithful subjects, residing in this Province, at the circumstance of such large sums being annually withheld by the Officers of the Customs, under the direction and by the authority of the Lords of Your Majesty's Treasury, without the consent of the Legislature of this Province; these facts having been brought under the consideration of His late Majesty, in the Address above alluded to, and to which the House of Assembly now most humbly beg reference. On the contrary, the Assembly feel that they would be discharging the high trust reposed in them by their Constituents in the best manner, by bringing under Your Majesty's most gracious notice, a Schedule of Salaries, which the Assembly most humbly conceive would be an ample remuneration for the services of the Officers connected with the Custom House Establishment.

"This scale has been made up with reference to Officers holding Provincial appointments, provided for by the Legislature with a degree of liberal'y, which the Assembly most humbly hope, will be viewed by Your Majesty in a most favorable manner; and although the rates fall far short of those which are now enjoyed by the Officers, and which, in the aggregate amount, His late Majesty's government, in the communication made to the House of Assembly through the Lieutenant Governor of the Province, were of opinion they were entitled to, the Assembly cannot imagine that it could have been the intention to place the Collector of the Port of Saint John, in point of income, upon a better focting than the Chief Justice of the Province, and far beyond that of the associate Judges; situations, above all others, the most dignified and responsible in the Province.

" Of all Officers in this Colony, the duties of the Provincial Treasurer are by far the most arduous, on a salary of six hundred pounds currency, for which the services are cheerfully and faithfully performed, with a heavy degree of responsibility, and under bonds by law for ten thousand pounds; and the House of Assembly most humbly trust, that the offer of provision now made for the Collector of Saint John, exceeding as it does that for the Treasurer, will be deemed by Your Majesty as amply sufficient, con-

sideration being had to the services rendered respectively by both.

"The Assembly are aware that the Legislature of Nova Scotia acceded to the scale submitted to them by His late Majesty's Government; and this contested subject, with reference to that Colony, has therefore been happily settled; and the Royal assent having been given to the Bill which passed that body, the Assembly most humbly beg leave to bring to Your Majesty's notice, that the right hitherto and still contended for by the Assembly of New-Brunswick, that no other power but themselves had the authority to appropriate any taxes raised within the Province, was fully established and

recognized.
"The House of Assembly would not have adverted to a subject so long settled and determined, were it not that a contrary practice has prevailed and does still prevail, with regard to the Salaries of the Officers of the Customs in this Province, and that it was necessary to bring under Your Majesty's consideration the relative condition of

the two Colonies.

" Nova Scotia is one of Your Majesty's oldest Colonies. Her revenues are large and increasing, and her capabilities to bear burthens are much beyond those of this colony. New Brunswick, on the other hand, is yet quite in her infancy. Her revenues are small in comparison with those of Nova Scotia, and a great portion of her territory is yet in a state of wilderness, with a thinly dispersed population. Under these circumstances, costly establishments are felt as extremely oppressive, and it was consequently a matter of impossibility for the Assembly of New-Brunswick to accept the terms offered by His late Majesty's Government, for a permanent provision to the Officers of the Customs, made up as it was, nearly on the scale of that offered to Nova Scotia, without reference to the capabilities, the resources, or the revenues of the respective Colonies. And besides, the advantages derived from the abolition of Custom House fees, so forcibly dwelt upon by the Lieutenant Governor of this Province, in his communication to the Assembly, previously noticed, bear no comparison in the two Colonies; for while the trade of Nova Scotia is almost exclusively carried on, both foreign and coasting, in her own ships; New-Brunswick owes her trade in a great measure to the shipping of the Mother Country; and consequently, the benefits of the abolition, with the exception of the coasting trade, (small with reference to Nova Scotia) and the few vessels engaged in foreign trade owned in New-Brunswick, have been enjoyed by the British ship owner residing in some part of the United Kingdom.

"Your Majesty will, the Assembly most humbly trust, see the inequality of the burthens contemplated by His late Majesty's Government to be borne by each Colony, and which the Assembly conceive never could have been taken into consideration by His late Majesty's Government, when the propositions were submitted to both Legis-

latures.

"The House of Assembly offer the Schedule to the consideration of Your Majesty, with great submission, as before expressed, with a comparative reference to other highly important offices within the Province, and not with a view to interfere with Your Majesty's Government, in their undoubted right to give such compensation to the Officers alluded to, as they in their wisdom may deem meet; and the House, therefore, would feel great pleasure, if such should be Your Majesty's Royal Will, to make a permanent Grant, equal to the amount of Schedule, to Your Majesty, to be apportioned for the payment of these Officers, as in Your Royal wisdom You might think necessary; at the same time the Assembly most humbly conceive that if Your Majesty should be of opinion, that the amount now offered is insufficient for the payment of the Officers, any difference should be made up by the Imperial Parliament, in consequence as before mentioned of the abolition of Custom House fees having been so highly beneficial to the British shipping, in their trade with New-Brunswick.

"The House of Assembly, therefore, most humbly pray, that this their humble representation, will meet with a favorable reception; and that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased to signify the same to the Administrator of the Government, through the Colonial Minister; when the Assembly will make a permanent grant to Your Majesty of four thousand two hundred and fifty pounds sterling per annum, for the payment of the Officers, either in gross or in such other way as Your Majesty may direct, payable annually out of the duties secured by virtue of the Acts of the Imperial Parliament, in the event of all such duties being paid over to the Treasurer of this Pro-

vince. "And as in duty bound, will ever pray.

No provision is made in the above list for Controllers at Miramichi and St. Andrews, the offices at these ports being wholly unnecessary; although if His Majesty's Government should think proper to continue the Officer at Saint Andrews, the sum put down for contingencies will amply provide for that officer. In fact, it is considered in the Province that the Office in any Port within it, is of no use, the original intention of establishing it as a check upon other Officers, having long since been lost sight of in this Colony.

The Petition of the House to His Majesty, praying that the privilege of Solemnizing Marriage may be extended to Ministers of Dissenting Congregations, was read as engressed, and is as follows:—

## "To the Ming's Most Breeklent Majesty.

"THE PETITION OF THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

<sup>&</sup>quot; MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY.

<sup>&</sup>quot; E, Your Majesty's faithful Commons of the Province of New-Brunswick, most humbly beg leave to approach Your Royal Person, in behalf of a portion of Your Majesty's faithful and loyal subjects, the Clergy of Dissenting Protestant Congregations

of Christian Worshippers in this Province; who, by a Law enacted by the General Assembly, in the early settlement of the Province, (by those British American Loyalists, who at the close of the American Revolution preferred an asylum in this then unsettled and wilderness region, to remaining in their native country under a republican government,) are excluded from the privilege of celebrating and solemnizing Marriage

in their several and respective Congregations.

"Your Majesty's faithful Commons of New-Brunswick beg leave most humbly to state, that the reasons which might have existed when the Law herein alluded to was enacted, for limiting the privilege of celebrating and solemnizing marriage to Ministers of the Church of England, the Kirk of Scotland, the Roman Catholics, and the people called Quakers, have long ceased; and Your Majesty's faithful Commons of the Province have long been of the opinion, that the privilege of celebrating Marriage under the several and respective requisitions of the existing Laws of the Province, should be extended to the regularly ordained and settled Clergy of the Dissenting Congregations in this Province.

"Your Majesty's faithful Commons of this Province, from a deep sense of the duty which they owe to the rights and wishes of the Dissenting Clergy and their Congregations in this Province, (who form a large proportion of Your Majesty's faithful and loyal subjects within the same) have for several years in succession passed a Bill to extend the privilege of celebrating Marriage to such Clergy, subject to the requisitions of the Provincial Act for the registry of Marriages within this Province; but for reasons unknown to your Petitioners, such Bills have not been concurred in by the other

Branch of the Legislature.

" Your Majesty's faithful Commons being fully persuaded of the firm attachment and loyalty to Your Majesty's Person and Government, of that portion of Your Majesty's subjects for whom they now most humbly entreat Your Majesty's Royal favor, pray Your Majesty to take their case into favorable consideration, and that Your Majesty will be pleased graciously to give instructions to the Administrator of the Government, to recommend the Legislature to pass such Bill as he may deem proper, to obtain Your Majesty's Royal sanction, for the purpose of extending the privilege of celebrating and solemnizing Marriage to the regularly ordained and settled Clergy of Dissenting Congregations in Your Majesty's Province of New-Brunswick, or otherwise, as Your Majesty, in your Royal Wisdom may deem meet.

"And, as in duty bound, will ever pray."

The Petition was then handed to the Committee of the House to wait upon His Honor the President therewith, to request His Honor will transmit the same.

Mr. Weldon, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Honor the President, with the Address of this House of the 30th instant, praying that His Honor would be pleased to give the necessary directions to the Treasurer for the sale of the Revenue Cutter Defiance; reported, that they had attended thereto, and His Honor was pleased to say he would comply with the wishes of the House on the subject.

Mr. Taylor, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Honor the President. with the Address of the House of yesterday, on the subject of the Auditor of Public and Private Accounts; reported, that they had attended to that duty, and that His Honor was pleased to say he would attend thereto.

A Message from His Majesty's Council.

Mr. Bliss, Master in Chancery informed the House, that the Council had agreed to a Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue for the services therein mentioned; and,

A Bill, to provide for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges through-

out the Province.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee appointed to prepare Addresses to His Majesty, upon the several subjects contained in a Resolution of the House of the 16th instant; reported, that they had under consideration the matters referred to them, so far as regards the Casual Revenue and Civil List, and had prepared the draft of an Address to His Majesty thereon, which he read and presented to the House, and is as follows:—

"To the Ring's Plost Excellent Majesty.

## " THE HUMBLE ADDRESS OF THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

" MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

"HE House of Assembly of New-Brunswick, beg leave most humbly to approach. Your Majesty, with a reiteration of the sentiments of veneration and attachment to Your Majesty's Person and Government, professed in their Address of the 30th in-

stant, on the subject of the Custom House Establishment.

"Deeply sensible of the paternal affection entertained by Your Majesty for the welfare of all Your Majesty's subjects, however remote their situation from the Parent State, the Assembly most humbly venture to bring under Your Majesty's notice the grievances which Your Majesty's loyal subjects residing in this Colony endure from the office established here, called the office of Department of Crown Lands and Forests.

"By the operation of the system practised in this office, very large sums are taken from the people of this Province for Licenses to cut Timber on Crown Lands, and although the Assembly do not question the right Your Majesty undoubtedly has to the lands in question, they think that the tremendous powers with which the Commissioner is vested, with regard to impositions of Tomage Money and the enormous exactions for fees, to be incompatible with a free government and to require redress.

"It is generally understood, as well as universally believed, that the Commissioner in question is under no control in this Province, and to this may be ascribed the mode in which Licences to cut Timber are issued in very many cases, in quantities less than 100 tons, subject to a duty of 1s. 3d. per ton, and the excessive fee on each of 45s. By this mode, a large part of the receipts is paid in the shape of fees, at once injuring the subject without benefiting the Revenue; and the Assembly feel convinced, if the office were under Colonial management, that while the oppressions would be removed, the Revenues would be more productive. And besides, the Assembly cannot but view with just alarm that the day may possibly come, when, by a single mandate from the Office, exactions of such magnitude may be made, as literally to stop the export trade of the country; a power which no person should have even the shadow of authority to exercise.

"The Assembly, at an early day the present Session, by an Address to the Administrator of the Government, sought for documents regarding this office, to enable them officially to bring the subject more in detail under the consideration of Your Majesty, but this information, so highly desirable and necessary, has been withheld from them; and the Assembly, therefore, with great submission, lay before Your Majesty's ty herewith a copy of the said Address, with the reply thereto, for Your Majesty's

gracious consideration.

"It will by that he seen, the objects contemplated by the Assembly; no less than relieving Your Majesty's Government permanently from the burthen of the whole Civil list of the Province, a subject which the Assembly humbly conceive to be of great advantage to the Parent State, and only requiring that the Revenues, from whatever source or sources derived in, or collected within the Province, should be placed under the control of its Legislature.

"The Assembly have so often brought under the notice of Your Majesty's Royal predecessors, the privations endured by your loyal subjects, the first settlers of the country, and the unswerving attachment to the British Constitution, that induced them to abandon their homes and seek an asylum under British protection, in a wilderness country, that they deem it unnecessary to dwell upon that interesting topic

on the present occasion.

"But they humbly beg leave to represent to your Majesty, that although, as before expressed, they do not deny the unquestionable sovereignty of your Majesty to the wild lands in this Colony, they most humbly conceive that the revenues derived from them, when the trying circumstances under which this Province was originally settled, are duly considered, should be under the control of the Legislature, although

from the comparatively small value of the ungranted lands, with those granted, but little can be anticipated, after the grant fees are first paid; and it will, therefore, be to the timber duties almost alone, the Assembly may expect any addition of revenue

in part provision for the Civil List.

"The House of Assembly, therefore most humbly pray, that this their representation may meet from Your Majesty a gracious reception; and that Your Majesty will be pleased to give such directions to the Administrator of the Government, as will enable the Assembly to carry these important objects into effect."

Upon the question for receiving the Report, the House divided as follows:-NAYS.

Whereupon the House again divided, and it was decided in the negative.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

The House went into Committee of the whole, in consideration of the Address.

Mr. J. Humbert in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that having the matter referred to them under consideration, it was resolved, that he leave the Chair, and report words used by Mr. Cunard, a Member from Northumberland, when in debate upon the matter then under consideration, and which were as follow:-

"This Address, brought in at this late hour, by the gross and wanton neglect of

the Committee."

Mr. Allen moved the Standing Order of the House. Whereupon, the Lobbies and Gallery were cleared.

The words were then read from the Chair.

Mr. Hayward moved the following resolution:-

Resolved, That the Member for Northumberland be heard in his place, touching the words spoken by him, and then withdraw.

Which was seconded.

Mr. Scott then moved as an amendment, after the word "Resolved," insert-"That the Committee of Privileges be directed to search into Parliamentary procedure, and ascertain what is the practice of the Imperial Commons when offensive words are used in debate by any Member of a Committee of the whole House, and reported by the Chairman of that Committee, and when a debate occurs as to the general conduct of such Member. previous to his being heard in his place, upon the offensive words spoken."

And upon the question on the amendment, it was decided in the negative.

Mr. Ward, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Honor the President, with the Address of the House to His Majesty, with regard to the Custom House establishment; reported, that they had attended thereto, and His Honor was pleased to say he would transmit the same.

Resolved, That the "words spoken by Mr. Cunard be dismissed." Whereupon, the House divided.

> Yeas, 12. Nays, 11.

And it was carried in the affirmative.

On motion of Mr. Weldon,

Resolved, That the Clerk of this House furnish the Chairman of the Committee of Public and Private Accounts, with such accounts and vouchers from the Files of the liouse as he may require during the recess.

A Message from His Honor the President, by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

The House attended, and being returned, Mr. Speaker reported, that he had ad-

dressed His Honor to the following effect :-

" May it please Your Honor,

"THE House of Assembly have made provision for the Ordinary Sevices of the Province. The improving state of the Public Finances has enabled them also to make liberal provision for Roads, and other important objects connected with the welfare of the Province. They now beg leave to present to Your Honor the several Bills of Appropriation, to which they pray Your Honor's assent; and they rely with the utmost confidence, that the grants placed at Your Honor's disposal will be so properly and judiciously applied, as to be productive of the most beneficial results to the Province."

That His Honor was then pleased to give his assent to the several Bills of Appropriation, viz :--

A Bill, to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue to the payment of the Ordina-

ry Services of the Province.

A Bill, to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue for the services therein mentioned; and,

A Bill, to provide for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges throughout the Province.

And also to the following :-

A Bill, to regulate Inns, Taverns and Houses for selling strong or Spirituous Li-

quors, and to repeal all the Laws now in force relating to the same.

A Bill, to continue and amend an Act, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Salmon and Shad Fisheries, so far as the same may relate to the River Petticodiac, in the County of Westmorland."

A Pill, to regulate Assessments in this Province.

A Bill, to continue An Act to provide for the expenses of the Judges holding the Circuit Courts and Courts of Oyer and Terminer in this Province, and of the Clerk in those Courts.

A Bill, to authorize the Justices of the Peace, at any General or Special Sessions, to make regulations for the destruction or confinement of Dogs during the prevalence of canine madness or hydrophobia in any part of the Province.

A Bill, to alter and amend an Act, intituled, "An Act for preserving the Bank of the River Saint John, in front of the Parishes of Maugerville, Sheffield, and Water-

borough."

A Bill, to continue the Acts for the encouragement of Parish Schools in this Pro-

A Bill, to authorize the extension of the Gaol Limits in the County of Charlotte. A Bill, to enable the Justices of the Peace for the County of Kent, to raise money, by assessment on the inhabitants of the said County, to discharge the debt due for erecting the Court House and Gaol.

A Bill, to repeal all the Laws now in force for regulating, laying out, and repairing Highways and Roads, and for appointing Commissioners and Surveyors of Highways in the several Towns and Parishes in this Province, and to make more effectual provision for the same.

A Bill, to repeal an Act, intituled, "An Act to prevent illicit and clandestine Trade,

and

and for imposing a duty upon articles illegally imported or brought into this Province, to be levied and paid after the condemnation and sale thereof."

A Bill, to amend an Act, intituled, "An Act to repeal all the Laws now in force relative to the importation and spreading of infectious distempers in the City of Saint

John, and to make more effectual provisions for preventing the same."

A Bill, to authorize the Justices of the Peace for the County of Charlotte further to assess the Inhabitants of said County, for the completion and finishing a Gaol, and for the erection of Lock-up Houses in said County.

A Bill, to regulate the Assize of Bread in the Towns of Newcastle and Chatham,

in the County of Northumberland.

A Bill, to repeal the Act now in force against the Profanation of the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday, and for the suppression of immorality, and to make other provisions in lieu thereof.

A Bill, to incorporate sundry persons by the name of the "New-Brunswick Fire

Insurance Company."

A Bill, to make more effectual provision for preventing the importation and spreading of Infectious Distempers within the Towns and Settlements in the Counties of

Charlotte and Northumberland.

A Bill, to authorize the Rector, Church Wardens, and Vestry of Trinity Church, in the Parish of Kingston, to convey their right to the land whereon the Court House has been erected, to the Justices of the Peace of King's County, in exchange for other land, and to establish a Public Square in the said Parish.

A Bill, to regulate Sales by Public Auction.

A Bill, to amend the Laws in force relating to insolvent confined Debtors.

A Bill, further to amend the Acts relative to Streets and Highways in the City and County of Saint John.

A Bill, to repeal the Acts now in force regulating the exportation of Lumber, and

to make other provisions in lieu thereof.

A Bill, to provide for the services of the Speaker of the House of Assembly, and for defraying the expenses and travelling charges of the Members of the said House, attending in General Assembly.

A Bill, for the division of the County of York into two Counties, and to provide for

the Government and Representation of the new County.

And His Honor was then pleased to make the following Speech:-Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Council, Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Assembly,

"Having had the satisfaction of assenting to all the Bills you have passed, many of which, by their wise and salutary provisions, must prove of primary importance and benefit to the Province; it now becomes my agreeable duty, at closing the present Session, to express to you my best acknowledgements for your ready and diligent attention to the several objects recommended to your consideration, and to thank you in His Majesty's name for the liberal grants you have made for the services of the current year."

That His Honor the Chief Justice then said,

"Gentlemen of the Council,

" Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

"T is His Honor the President's will and pleasure, that this General Assembly be prorogued until the first Monday in June next, and this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued until the first Monday in June next, then here to be holden."


