"Article 4.—Every vacancy occurring among the officers of this Society during the interval between two Annual Meetings may be filled up for the remainder of the year by the Committee, who shall have power to add to the number of the Directors; and at any Meeting of the Committee 5 shall be sufficient to form a quorum.
"Article 5.—This Constitution shall not be generally except at an Annual Meeting of this Society, or at any Meeting of the Members, of which and of the object of which, due notice shall be given."

He referred to the Upper Canada Act of 1845, which prohibited all kinds of Sunday work, except the carrying of Mail, Travelling, and the selling of Drugs; and prohibited all kinds of public amusement. He then referred to the Law of Lower Canada, contending that the sale of the property of minors at the Church door was not beneficial to them. There were, however, great difficulties in the country parts of the French Parishes of advertising sales of property, and selling it, as there never were any large congregations of people, except on Sundays, at Church. But he trusted that this necessity might soon be done away with, and contended that it might be advantageous, in many respects, to hold Fairs at stated periods, at which these advertisements and sales might take place.

The Rev. Mr. McGLL seconded the Resolution. He made some remarks on the sanctity of the Sabbath day, and the strict observance with which Christians were bound to keep it. He hoped the Roman Catholics would unite with them in endeavoring to do away with sales at Church doors on Sundays, and the stopping of other kinds of Sunday work.
The motion was put and carried.
The Rev. Dr. DAVID moved the next Resolution:—
"That the following gentlemen be requested to accept office in the Society now formed, for the ensuing year, viz:—
President—Hon. W. Morris;
Vice-Presidents—Hon. J. Ferris, Lieut.-Col. Wilgus, Dr. Holmes;
Treasurer—D. Davidson;
Directors—E. L. Montanari, John Redpath, Jacob De Witt, James Court, John Smith, Joseph Wrenham, J. H. Maitland, W. C. Evans, John Dougan, M. J. Whitney, T. M. Taylor, with power to add to their number."

He made a few remarks upon the fitness of this Committee for carrying out the objects of the Association.
The motion was carried.
JOHN DOUGLAS, Esq., moved the next Resolution. He had long had at heart the holding of some kind of Governmental changes, was to convince the people of their necessity; if they could do that, they would have them; and that was one of the blessings of Responsible Government. The gentleman went on to remark upon the Post-Office. He said, that if the question were put individually to the different members of different classes—if they wanted Sunday Mail—the answer would be in the negative. If there were no Sunday Mail, there would only be one day lost, and not two, as some people supposed. With regard to the want that existed for Sunday Mail, he spoke from a large acquaintance with public men. He read the Resolution as follows:—
"That whilst the Committee are directed to give their attention to every form of Sabbath desecration, with a view of counteracting it, they are especially requested to devote their early attention to the re-organizing of the Mail and the opening of the Post-Office on the Sabbath, as that Department is about to pass from the Imperial to the Provincial Government."

JOSEPH WENHAM, Esq., seconded the motion. He remarked that he, in his business, had never wanted Sunday Mail.
Motion carried unanimously.
The Rev. Mr. RIVINGTON moved the following Resolution:—
"That as the Society now formed can expect to be successful in combating erroneous practices regarding the Sabbath, only through the truth of God's word respecting that institution, this Meeting does now recognize the need of the Spirit of all Truth to bless the labors of the Committee."

The Rev. A. F. SPALDING seconded it. It was put and carried unanimously.
A collection was taken up.
Colonel WILGUS asked the Congregation for their prayers for its success, as without these their efforts would be unavailing.
The Rev. Mr. CAUVENY said a benediction, and the Meeting adjourned.
