March 23, 1851. Sabbath Cheervance Meetings

A Public Meeting was held, on Monday evening last, in the Wesleyan Church, Great St. James Street, pursuant to an adversement in the newspapers, for the purpose of taking steps for the formation of a Sabbath Observance Association. Colonel WILGRESS was called to the Chair.

The proceedings were commenced with the single of a hymn and prayer; after which the Chairman briefly stated the object of the Meeting.

The Rev. Mr. McGrll seconded the Resolu-

"That every argument and sanction for the observance of the Sabbath, as a day of rest from all worldly labor not of absolute necessity, is as binding on public bodies as on individuals, and in binding on public bodies as on individuals, and in every country in which the right of civil and religious liberty is recognised; it is the duty of the Legislature and the Executive Government to enact laws, and administer them in such a manner as not to subject any man to any penalty or less on account of his religious opinions."

The Rev. Dr. Wilkes seconded the motion.

He regretted that the Rev. Mr. McLeed, nor the Hon. Mr. Ferrier, were on the platform, as it was they who should have taken charge of that Resoution. The Rev. Gentleman went on to make some remarks on the necessity there was for one day of rest in seven, considered in a physical point of view. He contended that this was manifestly the design of God, as at the creation, he set one day aside for this purpose. He severely condemned the doctrines of those Infidel Philanthropists who held that work should be done on the seventh day. He contrasted the state of Frence and the Continent with Seventhaland Continent on Sundays. The new is a well a manufacture of the continent o n which this day was kept, he felt thankful to God that he had not been born there, on account of the difference there was in the keeping of the Sabbath day. Referring to Paris, he attributed the instability of French political institutions to this cause. Had France had the training of Scotland, none could say that any form of government might not flourish there. He concluded by making some remarks on the right the servants of the of them should be obliged to work in

Post-Office, or carry Mails, on Sundays. The Resolution was put and carried. The Rev. F. H. MARLING moved the

desolution, which he read :-"That the desecration of the Sabbath by public bodies, besides exhibiting to the community a pernicious example of disregard to the Divine Commands, involves also a disregard for God's Divine Law, by individuals who are made to set had examples, each in his own private aphere, and in the circle to which his influence extends."

The first Resolution appeared to contemplate the Government. This had more particular re-ference to public bodies, as Railway Companies and Stage Proprietors. But he might observe, with regard to the Post-Office, that, as it was about to be transferred to the Provincial authori ties, they wished to excite such a feeling among the people as would compel the Government to cause all postal communications to cease on Sundays; and in the face of which, Railway Companies and Stage Proprietors should not dare to employ their servants, and keep these modes of travel open. They (the public) had the matter in their own bands, and they could compel submission, for these Companies were but the servants of the public, as was the Government.

JOHN REDPATH, Eeq., seconded the Resolution without making any remarks. Rev. Mr. CAUGHEY made a few observation in support of the Resolution. He said he had seen the Sabbath day called by some writers the "Queen of Days." We learn that this line of road, which connects with the Burlington and Rutland Railroad at Highgate, Vermont, and with the Missisquoi Valley, Stan-atead, and Passumpsic Railroad, at St. Armands, will place Montreal in a direct Railway communication with the New England States and Hudson Valley thereby bringing to this city the influ ence, assistance, and traffic of over 1500 miles of Railway, that have cost American enterprize \$45,000,000. Parliament granted a charter in 1849, and an accurate survey was made in 1850. The line from Montreal to Highgate is 41 miles long, and from St. Johns 241 miles, and the cost will only be about £4,000 per mile. The line crosses the River Richelieu at the foot of Navigation, between St. Johns and St. Athanase, and thus obviates the necessity for bridging the navigable waters of Lake Champlain. This is a most important point in favor of this line, because the commerce of the Lake is one of very great consequence, both to Canada and the State of New York; and though now only in its infancy, so far as Canad is concerned, is rapidly increasing. A comparative statement of distances given, by which it is proved that 20 per cent. in distance, and 50 per cent. time, are saved by the Montreal and ermont line, between the former place

One of the great advantages of this line are, that it opens up a rich and densely populated country; and that the inhabitants of this part of the Province are fully sensible of the advantages to be derived from its construction, is evidenced by the fact, that the merchants and farmers in the County of Missisquoi, St. Athanase, and St. Johns, have stepped forward and spiritedly offered to raise a sum equal to that which shall be raised in Montreal, towards this line.
