SAYS IMMEDIATE PEACE IS GREATEST NEED OF WORLD

LONDON, Feb. 1—"We are all wearyo fwar," said Arthur Henderson, labor leader and former member of the war council in an address to representatives of engineers today. "Imediate peace is the greatest need of th world. But peace cannot be achieved by one section of labor acting by itself. Peace will come when the working class movement as a whole has discovered by conference the conditions of an honorable and democratic peace worthy of the unimaginable sacrifices the people have made.

Mr. Henderson's address was an appeal to the engineers to abandon their opposition to the manpower bill, providing for the raising of additional troops, which is now before parliament.

Mr. Henderson said that knowledge of the history of the controversy convinced him that labor was justified in its stand, he continued: "In the past labor has responded with real patriotism, fully and freely. 

The high cost of labor, material, etc., together with increased wear and tear, occasioned by travel in general particularly automobile travel, necessitates a greater expenditure of money than has been granted during the two years I have been in the council.

At the beginning of 1917, your committee after careful consideration by its chairman F. B. Newcombe and members, asked for an appropriation of \$2300.00 for street work, which disallowed and \$1200.00 granted, you will see by attached report that we have found it necessary to far exceed our allotment to do the work absolutely necessary to a' condition befitting a town of our size and importance.

As early in the spring as conditions warranted most of the outlying streets were gone over with the road machine widening, thoroughly rounding, smoothing and clearing gutters. From the top of Wickwire hill east to the Government farm the road was widened straightened and gravelled, making it one of the best in our town. Wickwire hill, a narrow crooked miserable road, has been changed to a broad, smooth permanent highway and will we believe demonstrate, to our citizens as time goes on that it pays to do well what is undertaken.

By continuous use of the watering cart during dry weather an unhealthy, unpleasant dust nuisance was avoided and as well our streets were kept smooth and hard, withstanding well the wear and tear of a busy summer. By careful attention at the right time we can keep our gravel streets in good condition during the dry weather, the time has come, however, when we believe it absolutely impossible to provide against spring and fall mud without permanent streets for our most important thoroughfares and we would recommend that action be taken along this line at the earliest possible date.

The matter of public protection at Junction of street

The matter of public protection at Junction of street and railway crossings on Aberdeen and Corwallis streets was before the council on several occassions, a com-mittee appointed to deal with the matter has not re-ported

To our superintendant, Mr Neville we owe much. We believe he has few equals, no superiors, and are fortunate in having his Services.

Expropriation proceedings in connection with land required for widening Leverett avenue were undertaken and are still in progress owing, however, to lack of funds for street purposes, matter has not been concluded.

Our lighting service is not all that might be desired, citizens living near the power house have been since August last called upon to indure smoke and soot from a stack half its original length, with no correspond shrinkage in the rate, and a light service at times most annoying. The attention of the company was called to this unfortunate condition unavailingly, finally it has been referred to the Public Utilities Board. We suggest municipal ownership of this utility.
