## St. Catharines Man Foully Murdered Last Night

### George Williams, a Cement Worker, Found Dead in Hamilton This Morning At the Factory Where Employed

Formerly Lived on George Street in This City; Relatives Are Being Looked For; No Details of the Crime Were Given Except That it Was a Very Brutal Crime, the Hamilton Police Report

A St. Catharines man has been the victim of a murder. This morning Chief of Police of Hamilton was notified by telephone that George Williams, a cement worker, had been brutally murdered there. The inspector who gave the particulars of the murder over the telephone did not stop to give details, but stated that it was a most brutal affair, Williams' body having been found early this morning. The dead man who was 62 years of age, lived at 28 George street in this city and had been employed as a cement worker by J. I. Weller. Some time ago he went to Hamilton and obtained a position as night watchman at some factory.

He was found at the factory early this morning. There is no apparent motive for the murder and the case is similar to the Sargent case in this city last spring when night watchman Sargent was wounded to death at the Canadian Machine Works plant where he was employed as night watchman. The motive for that killing was never discovered and in the present case there seems to be no explanation why any one would desire to murder an inoffensive old man doing his duty as night watchman. The theory that a maniac did both deeds comes to the fore once more. Williams had no relatives in this city so far as the local police can ascertain and where his relatives live if he had any, is unknown so far though enquiries are being made.

Church Advisory Com. Boys Work: R. J. Hawthorne. Girls Work: Miss Lilly M. Bell. Young Peoples: W. W. Richmond. Adult and Home Departments: Mrs. T. F. Wright. Teacher Training: Rev. Dr. Ratcliffe. Temperance—Mrs. Byron Smith. To these will be added representatives from each S. S. or Congregation and all church courts and organized societies such as the Y. M. C. A., etc. The first task of the Society when organization is completed will be to prepare for the Provincial Council which will be held in St. Catharines Nov. 2, 3, and 4, 1920. The Ladies Aid of the Church supplied luncheon and supper to all the delegates which kept the Convention together all day and was a source of great helpfulness.

### Engineers of the Peninsula Gathered at the Banquet at the Welland; Interesting Addresses

The banquet of the Niagara Branch of the Engineer's Institute of Canada held at the Welland House last night was a complete success. There were about 120 present including a large delegation from Niagara Falls of the Hydro Power Engineers. The lecturer of the evening, Mr. John Murphy of Ottawa, gave a very instructive and pleasing account of a trip through the Panama canal during construction and the Panama Pacific Expedition at San Francisco. He had a large number of fine lantern pictures, many of them hand colored, showing the canal work in operation and many scenic features and illumination effects at the expedition. Mr. Munro Grier, K.C., of Toronto was a guest of the evening, he being particularly interested in the lecture through a connection with the National Electric Light Association.

Following Mr. Murphy's lecture Mr. Grier gave a short address in his homogenous and inimitable way which was greatly enjoyed by the audience. After a vote of thanks was moved and seconded by A. C. D. Blanchard and Colonel Leonard and tendered to the speakers by W. E. Near, Chairman of the evening the gathering adjourned to the Grand Opera House where by the courtesy of Mr. Odium, Mr. Murphy was able to show a 900 foot reel of moving pictures showing clearly the actual formation of the canal and the ice. As this has been the cause for years of our power shortage in winter time in these climates the picture was greatly appreciated and Mr. Murphy's explanations and suggested remedies will no doubt be productive of improvements in the matter of handling and preventing ice difficulties in future power plans.

### Influenza Has Later Dangers

Particular Care Needed When Patient is Convalescent, Says Expert.

The influenza convalescent who has apparently recovered from the disease and is yet in a strangely weak and depressed condition should be the object of particular care, according to Dr. Louis I. Harris, director of the Bureau of Preventable Diseases of the New York Health Department. In the opinion of Dr. Harris the after care of the influenza patient is most important. The co-operation of the patient coupled with the willingness to see that the weakness and depression are a part of the illness, though coming after the disease itself has spent its force, is a big factor in affecting a complete return to full health. On the other hand, the determination to ignore this debilitated condition and to fight against it, will Dr. Harris says, frequently bring serious consequences upon the patient.

#### After Effects Bad.

"The subject of the after effects of influenza," said Dr. Harris, "is one of particular interest to the scientist at the present time.

"First, and perhaps the most momentous condition to be considered is the striking depression, mental, nervous, and physical, complained of by most patients. Those attacked by the disease with moderate severity are almost always afflicted with this depression, which should be recognized and dealt with. Those who have had mild cases of the epidemic are likely to be affected by depression and their quick return to health and strength gives rise to the belief that influenza is trivial. On the contrary, influenza in its after effects is anything but trivial, and calls for the application of rules of common sense and sanitation which are the fruit of years of experience.

"Tonic treatment, well chosen diet and great care in not becoming overtired or allowing the body to be chilled are necessary. Eggs may be eaten, but not more than two a day, for the average adult. Of course, it must be remembered that in many cases this disease tends to direct its force against the kidneys, and therefore we instruct patients to avoid eating a great amount of meat, eggs, or beef extracts. Eggs, soft boiled, poached, or beaten, raw, are advisable in limited number. The raw eggs should always be well agitated before taking.

#### When Good Food is Bad.

"With milk and eggs as a foundation the patient should eat good nourishing food, including meat, fish and vegetables, simply prepared. Frying, for instance, is out of the question. Good food prepared in an unassimilable manner becomes bad food; especially is this to be noted in cases of convalescence from influenza for the disease often manifests itself in vomiting, and in intestinal and gastric disturbances, and it is important not to weaken the poorly prepared food, or even the best of food in ill advised quantities. The quantitative distribution of foodstuffs should be so adjusted as not to overtax the stomach but the patient should eat generously and frequently.

Howitt, rector of St. Thomas Church, after which the interment took place in the Patterson plot in Victoria Lawn Cemetery.

The late Mr. Patterson who was the only son of General R. F. Patterson of the U. S. A. was for eight years a student at the Ridley College where he was very popular among his fellow students, and his death was heard with deepest regret by many friends.

Joe Taylor of Fort Chipewyan drove in with dogs to Fort McMurray, and two days after died of the flu.

### Death of Well Known Merriton Resident

The angel of death again visited Merriton on Friday and summoned Mrs. Ann Finellon, widow of the late James Finellon, in the 84th year of her age. On Wednesday morning she was attacked with a stroke of paralysis.

Deceased who was a daughter of the late John and Mrs. Jackson was born in Kilkenny, Ireland, and at the age of 9 years came to Canada with her parents, settling in Ottawa, later moving to Merriton where she has resided ever since with the exception of a few years spent in Thorold. She was a devoted member of St. James Church, also the Ladies Aid, where up until poor health compelled her to resign her good work her willing hands were very busy.

She is survived by four daughters Mrs. George Riches, Mrs. Lewis Tenbrook, Mrs. Charles Richardson, Miss Mary Finellon, and one son, John Finellon, all of Merriton, two sisters, Mrs. Fannie Williams, of Perry N. Y., Mrs. Margaret Clark, of Buffalo, N.Y., three brothers, Samuel and John Jackson, of Kinistino, Sask. and Thomas Jackson, of Strathroy who are receiving the heartfelt sympathy of the community in their hour of trouble, suffering the loss of a devoted mother and sister. The funeral will be held on Sunday afternoon at 2:40 o'clock from the family residence, Lock street. Interment in Lakeview cemetery, Thorold.

## IT IS IN THE HANDS OF WOMEN TO MAKE THIS AN IDEAL WORLD, DECLARES MRS. ROSE HENDERSON

Calls Attention to the Good Results Which Would Come From Mothers' Pensions—Urges Use of School Buildings in the Evening For Recreation Purposes.

Making a strong plea for mothers' pensions, recreation of a wholesome character for the young folks and other things, Mrs. Rose Henderson, matron of the Children's Court in Montreal, who is a most attractive speaker, held the interest of a large number of the members of the Women's Canadian Club at their meeting at the Welland yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Butler the president occupied the chair. Mrs. Henderson told many human interest stories connected with her work depicting the wretchedness which comes before the Children's Court. A young woman in Montreal who had been deserted by her husband because he could not get work went insane worrying for fear the authorities would take her baby away from her. There were many cases of similar nature just at pathetic.

"Mother's Pensions," said Mrs. Henderson, "would not cost more than half the amount it now takes to look after the neglected children. If the mothers were put in a position to properly look after their little ones, it would result in much greater good than under the present system of taking the children away from mothers who because they must work are not in a position to attend to them." Mrs. Henderson referred to the waste of school building use. The schools are not in use half the time yet vast sums of money are invested in them. She thought the schools should be used more. In the evenings they could be utilized as recreation places where young people could meet for healthy and clean recreation. There, young girls could meet boys instead of meeting them on the street

in the movie shows or in the dance halls. "For the little girl will have her beau," said Mrs. Henderson. "You can't get away from the fast, ladies and you might as well recognize it. Sometimes the home life is not such as will permit the girl bringing a boy there. There must be some place."

She said she did not object to clean wholesome moving pictures, but she did seriously object to children being allowed to sit and watch sordid life incidents thrown on the canvass, much of it exaggerated. Fancy, she said children being allowed to witness scenes where the most sacred things of life are made sport of. Married men and women are seen flirting and there are other things shown on the canvass which soil the childish mind. Older people may not be affected, but the susceptible child mind certainly is. She thought if good wholesome themes of an educational nature were shown in motion pictures by the government or city in the school houses at night, it would draw away the children from the hurtful movie (Continued on page 8)

# SIX MILLION JEWS NEAR STARVATION

Cold and Disease Add to Sufferings of Destitute Peasants of Poland.

Eastern Europe is the only part of the world to-day that really understands the meaning of conservation. In the grimest sense of the word, according to reports brought back to the American Jewish Relief Committee by relief workers recently returned from these stricken lands.

Not a particle is wasted of any of the relief supplies sent from America by the Joint Distribution Committee of American Funds for Jewish War Sufferers or by other organizations. Garbage cans and dump-heaps are naturally unknown quantities in a region where 6,000,000 Jews—men, women, and children—are at the point of starvation. Typical of the extreme chronicity with which these people utilize everything to-day was the use recently made of a shipment of flour, sent to eastern Europe by American Jewish relief agencies.

The flour itself was used to feed destitute Jews at the soup kitchens. White bread is a luxury in these lands to-day, the taste of it forgotten by the poor, and some of the flour sent from America is made into bread as yet. It goes farther stirred into the soup issued at the Jewish relief stations.

In order to make sure that not one atom of the flour was going to waste, the seams were ripped from the sacks, which were then shaken over the soup receptacles. These needles put to use was the cloth of the sacks themselves. There is practically no cotton or linen in eastern Europe to-day, and every scrap of cloth is put to use.

In this particular case, the sacks were needed both as shrouds for the dead, and as cloths in the operating rooms of the hospital. A part of them was devoted to each purpose. Both shrouds and bandages in eastern Europe to-day have to be made by sewing hundreds of tiny bits of used cloth together, so those flour sacks proved a godsend.

The thread which had stitched the bags together was carefully saved, also, and used to patch together the rags that form almost the only clothing of the destitute Jewish children in these lands, and to sew together the scraps of cloth that they wear around their feet, in lieu of shoes.

In order to help these suffering Canadian Jewish Relief Committee is making an appeal for funds.

# MOTHERS WATCH CHILDREN STARVE

Lack of Clothing Adds to Suffering Among Jewish Residents of Poland.

The patient resignation with which a mother in Poland accepts what the fate has in store for her children who frequently die of starvation before her eyes, is one of the things that leaves a lasting impression on relief workers there.

Jacob Benin, who has just returned from abroad, where he had charge of a relief unit for the Joint Distribution Committee, which disbursed funds raised by the American Jewish Relief Committee and other bodies, said that food is distributed to the children in Lodz on a ration basis, and that where the small folks were unable to appear in person because of lack of clothing or illness from the "starvation sickness," the allotment was given to the mother. On one occasion a little woman with great hunger-seeking eyes, asked for four rations. The following day she appeared again and asked for only two.

"Two?" repeated the distributing agent. "Why you received four yesterday."

"Yes, but to-day I need only two, because," and the worker may have only imagined that he caught a note of relief in the utter hopelessness of the curiously quiet answer, "two of my little ones died during the night."

For the purpose of relieving this terrible suffering an appeal for funds is being made by the Canadian Jewish War Relief Committee, of which full details will be given later.

# JEWS STARVING IN JERUSALEM

Terrible Destitution Caused by Lack of Employment and Shortage of Food.

The street cleaners of Jerusalem form a picturesque but pathetic testimony to the terrible destitution of the Jews of that ancient city, according to the latest reports received by the Canadian Jewish War Relief Committee from relief workers abroad.

The problem of employment is so great in Jerusalem that it is almost impossible to find work in the natural way. For this reason, the Joint Distribution Committee of Funds for Jewish Sufferers from the War hired fifty of the most poverty-stricken Jews who applied to them for aid, to clean the streets in the Jewish quarter. The youngest of these street cleaners is fourteen years old. Seven of the street cleaners are between seventy and eighty years old, and eighteen more are between sixty and seventy years old. None of them have adequate clothing or food.

**ORPEN REFUSES OFFER**  
Distinguished Artist Asks to Paint 300 Americans.  
LONDON, Feb. 25.—Sir William Orpen, the distinguished artist, has refused an offer of \$5,000,000 for painting 300 portraits, which is said to have been made him by an American.  
"It is quite true the offer of \$5,000,000 to paint portraits came to me from America," Sir William said yesterday in confirming the report, according to the Daily Mirror. "To complete such a contract, however, would take far more than the ordinary life time—it might take as long as 300 years. Sir William will go to America this fall on business."

CASES IN ONTARIO

## SIX MILLION JEWS ARE FACING DEATH

Starvation and Disease Cause Indescribable Suffering in Eastern Europe.

The hardships of this winter will mean death to thousands of Jews in Poland, unless outside aid intervenes at once, according to Lieutenant Shelton Wright of the American Red Cross Commission to Poland, recently returned to the United States after months of relief work in eastern Europe.

He painted a vivid picture of this half-starved people, clad in rags, who are now creeping back toward their devastated homes after months of refugee wandering, and dying of starvation and typhus along the roads, as they go.

Outside starvation, numerous diseases, attributed to malnutrition and children like flies," he said. "I remember a family trying to live under an over-turned wagon by the roadside. The mother was dead under a tree a few yards away—she had been dead for days. The father was stretched upon the ground dying of typhus. He died that day. Under the wagon were two little children, both under five, sick with typhus. An older child sat stupidly beside them—a girl driven out of her mind."

Many of the people are driven to making "bread" out of leaves and bark, and "soup" out of grass and water, Lieutenant Wright reported. There was unspeakable joy among them when the American ships, loaded with relief supplies purchased with the funds raised by the American Jewish Relief Committee and other American Jewish agencies, and American and Canadian Red Cross supplies were unloaded at Danzig and other ports. In spite of the fact that the American Jewish Relief agencies are spending almost \$2,000,000 a month now on their relief work in Poland, and that the Red Cross is doing its work on so vast a scale, hundreds of thousands of Jews and Poles will die during the winter unless more aid comes.

"Every box-car full of refugees returning to their homes has in it those who die along the way, and those who have contracted typhus," Lieutenant Wright said. "The people try to avoid disease by keeping clean, but it is impossible to do so, under existing conditions. Even our nurses and doctors fall ill of typhus, a disease caused by filth and lice."

The Red Cross and the American Jewish Relief agencies are doing their utmost to keep both the Jews and the Gentiles in these stricken lands alive. Six million Jews in eastern Europe face death unless immediate shipments of food, clothing, and bedding from Canada and the United States reach them before the cold weather sets in.

An appeal for funds is to be made in Ontario and a generous response from this district is confidently expected.

## MOBS OF CHILDREN CRAVING FOR BREAD

Gaze Into Bakeshop Windows for Hours at a Time, Hoping for Something to Eat.

"The saddest thing in all Eastern Europe at the present moment—worse than all the other instances of starvation and even of death and disease on every hand—are the child-mobs one sees outside of the few bakeries that are able to keep going in Warsaw, Shlomo Asch, the famous Yiddish playwright and poet reported to the American Jewish Relief Committee upon his return from Eastern Europe, where he went as a commissioner of the Joint Distribution Committee of American Funds for Jewish Sufferers from the War.

"In the bakery windows are a few loaves of bread, and sometimes cakes, that are sold at a simply prohibitive price," he explained, "and even if these were as cheap as in Canada and the United States, their taste would still be unknown to the hungry Jewish children, who live on the cup of soup a day they get from American Jewish relief agencies. But the youngsters tantalize themselves with the sight of food, when they cannot get the taste of it.

"They press up to the window, and at first merely stare respectfully at the bread, an uncanny little crew of gaunt small folks with old faces and suffering unchildlike eyes. Perhaps it is raining, or the wind is blowing coldly through the tatters that they wear, that little barefoot army, but they huddle together for warmth, and do not stir. The sight of the bread has fascinated them, it is so rarely seen.

"A customer comes out, leaving the door ajar for a moment, and the warm fragrance of the bake-shop drifts out to the little ragamuffins, maddening them. They press closer to the window, their thin little faces against the glass. Those in front put out their tongues and lick the glass, as if, by so doing, they could taste the bread behind it. No poet could ever write into words the wistfulness of their faces as they do it.

"One of the men from the bakery comes out and drives them away every few minutes, else they would break the glass. They are afraid of him, and for a few minutes they stand at a distance, their eyes still upon the bread. Then hunger overcomes their fear, and they press up to the bakery window again. Soon they are eagerly licking the glass once more. And this goes on all day every day in front of the bakery window."

More money is needed to help feed those children, and an appeal soon is to be made in Canada for that purpose.

## DESTITUTION IN EUROPE TERRIBLE

Long Processions of Starving, Ill-Clad Children Seen Daily on the Streets.

Long processions of little Jewish children in Eastern Europe, bearing their tin cups in their hands, daily walk from their villages to the nearest town in which there is a Jewish relief station, according to relief workers in these stricken lands, sometimes journeying five or six miles in order to get the cup of soup with a piece of hardtack, or the mug of milk which is often their sole food of the day.

Those tin-cup processions emphasize, as nothing else could do, the relief workers say, the terrible destitution of the Jews in Eastern Europe at present. The children in them are barefoot, almost without exception.

Reports received by the Canadian Jewish War Relief Committee say that both boys and girls are wrapped in burlap, or dressed in clothing made from the sacks in which the relief supplies have come, or in rags which they have worn during the five years of the war, their little bodies showing through the tatters. They do not walk as children usually do, without effort or restraint, but drag themselves along wearily, and hopelessly, like tired little ghosts condemned to move in hungry processions through eternity.

Arrived at the relief station, the children are so tired and so weak that they sit down upon the pavements to await their turn in line. Upon the faces of every one of these there is an expression of unchildlike anxiety. It has to do with the only really vital question in the world to them—whether or not the cup of milk will hold out, until their turn comes. Every day some of them have to be turned away without food, since their numbers are so great that the funds at present on hand are not always sufficient to care for them all.

## MILLION CHILDREN ARE CLAD IN RAGS

Their Wasted Bodies Show Thru Tatters, Result of Starvation and Misery.

The art of making two socks bloom where only one bloomed before isn't half so hard as that of making two garments exist where only one existed before; yet even this can be accomplished, according to reports recently received by the Canadian Jewish War Relief Committee from relief workers abroad.

Cloth of any kind, either cotton or wool, is particularly impossible to obtain in Eastern Europe, except at prohibitive prices. A round million little Jewish children in these unhappy lands are clad in rags that they have worn all through the war, their wasted little bodies showing through great tatters. Some of these children are still sleeping on the streets, since there are at present neither orphanages nor funds for all.

Miss Harriet E. Lowenstein, of New York, sent to Europe as a commissioner of the Joint Distribution Committee of American Funds for Jewish War Sufferers, was able to purchase more than a carload of pajamas from the salvage department of the American army in France. These were sent to Eastern Europe, and in the workrooms opened there were made over into clothing for children.

Each pair of pajamas made at least two Russian blouse suits for little boys it was reported. The larger pieces left over in the cutting were used for the cloths that the children of Eastern Europe kind around their feet in lieu of shoes.

## MILLION PAIRS OF SHOES ARE NEEDED

Destitute Jewish Children of Eastern Europe Use Rags to Protect Feet From the Cold.

A million pairs of shoes are needed by the destitute Jewish children of Eastern Europe to-day, according to reports received by the American Jewish Relief Committee from relief workers abroad.

At least that many of the helpless and hungry Jewish youngsters of Eastern Europe are absolutely without footwear of any kind, their relief agents say. Thousands of others have rags sewn around their feet in lieu of shoes.

Several carloads of shoes that formerly belonged to Allied soldiers in France were purchased there by the Joint Distribution Committee of Funds for Jewish Sufferers from the War, for the Jewish women of Eastern Europe. But it was impossible to buy the shoes in sizes that would be worn by the children, and all others sold in Europe are at a prohibitive price. So a million youngsters are barefoot during the hard winter of Eastern Europe.

There is a great lack of every conceivable kind of clothing, as well as shoes. In Serbia, a common child's costume just now consists of two sacks, with holes cut through for the head and feet. In Poland, four sacks and sugar sacks sent with supplies to the destitute Jews by Jewish relief agencies are all being made over into clothing, and even small salt sacks are pieced together, and used for this purpose.

## PILFERING ON RAILWAYS

In view of the considerable losses incurred through pilfering and careless handling of goods in transit, losses which amount in a year to close on three million dollars, the Canadian Railway has recently been conducting an active campaign against such robberies, not only in their own interests but also to protect the merchants and shippers who naturally suffer great inconvenience even though the losses may be made good. The loss of portions of a shipment frequently renders the balance of a shipment useless or depreciates its value, and affects the business of the merchant. As a result of this campaign, the C.P.R. for instance, have recently brought into court and secured convictions against several offenders. Thus at Ottawa, Ambrose Milks, a teamster of a transport Co. was sentenced to twelve months' imprisonment for breaking into a freight car and stealing a case of gin, while at McAdam Junction three men were condemned to five years penitentiary, two years penitentiary and four years reformatory, respectively, for a series of thefts from freight cars involving many consignments of considerable value.

The subject of pilfering on railways has been taken up in England by the National Union of Railwaymen, which has recently circulated its branches, pointing out the moral obligation that devolves upon them to check the practice and help to remove the stigma which threatens their prestige. The branches have responded very favourably to this appeal, with beneficial results.

AMSTERDAM, Feb. 25.—About 80 per cent. of the Red army in Russia is not "Red" at all, but is neutral according to the staff correspondent of the Handelsblad, G. Nypels, who has just returned from an extended tour through Soviet Russia. He says about 60 per cent. of the officers, who are largely drawn from the trained military men of the old upper class, are "Czarist" in inclination. This leaves only about 20 per cent. of the officers, thoroughly attached to the Soviet regime, the rest being neutral or Czarist.

## ZARA RULED BY VENICE

Winged Lion of Saint Mark Caps Gate in the Town Wall.

Zara, where Gabriele d'Annunzio is reported to have landed, and its location relative to Fiume, already occupied by the soldier-poet, is described in a U. S. Geographic Society bulletin, based on a communication from Kenneth McKenzie, follows:— "Stargazing from Fiume, one sails down the channel called Quarnero, leaving Istria and the Gulf of Guarnero to the right. The island of Arbe, about half way to Zara, has an old cathedral with a twelfth-century tower. Coming from Trieste one skirts the western shore of Istria, stopping perhaps at Rovigno and at Pola. The stay of an hour enables one to get a hurried glimpse of the grand amphitheatre and other Roman remains of Pola, under Austrian rule an important naval station and strongly fortified. The language here is chiefly Italian, architecture, and repair the time devoted to a trip of several days; but we pass on, stopping at one or two of the islands, to Zara, the most northerly town of importance in Dalmatia.

"Zara is noted all over the world for its maraschino. Aside from this, however, the town has many attractions to offer. On landing from the steamer in the land-locked harbor, we find ourselves in front of a gate in the town wall. Over the gate is the winged lion of Saint Mark, often seen with here and elsewhere in Dalmatia, and a symbol of the former dominion of the Republic of Venice. Passing through the gate, we enter the narrow paved streets of a typical Italian city, such as we may imagine it to have been two or three centuries ago, except that the hotels are more comfortable. There are many medieval churches in the town, an interesting architectural and containing works of art. The cathedral is particularly a majestic Romanesque church, richly adorned outside with many arcades of little columns and interspersed with marbles and paintings. It is in the best Italian style of the middle ages. Its campanile is a landmark.

"Wandering among the narrow streets, we come upon several open squares and market-places, where in the morning scores of peasants may be seen in the brilliant-colored costumes, there are Roman remains too—columns and statues. Leaving Zara, the steamer comes out of the harbor, encircles the point of land on which the city stands, and skirts a low-lying shore, passing among innumerable islands. All are on a narrow opening appears; we go through it, and find ourselves in the spacious harbor of Sebenico, with the town rising from the water to a fort crowning the hill."

Loyal to British Crown. There are a number of diminutive water-surrounded monarchies off the coast of Scotland. They each have their kings, but are subject to the British crown. One of them is the Isle of Bute, in the Firth of Clyde, which is owned by the Marquis of Bute.

The kingdom contains only fifty square miles; but has a population of 11,000 people. There are six lakes within the island, the largest being Loch Fadh, which is about a quarter of a mile wide and about nine times that in length. The famous old home of the marquis dates from the year 1668.

Arran is another of these kingdoms in the same firth. The Marquisess of Graham rules over its 5,000 inhabitants. It is nineteen miles long and ten miles broad. It was on this island that Robert the Bruce is said to have hidden in a cave for some time and there planned one of his expeditions to recover the crown. The ruins of a castle, once the home of one of Scotland's kings, is on the island.

Sir John Bullough rules over the island of Rhuth, which is one vast deep preserve. Nearly all this island is deep forest and moorland, and all of it is mountainous. Only 400 acres are tillable, and there are 160 inhabitants. The island provides deer and other game for the nobility.

The largest of these island groups is doubtless Lewis Island, one of the outer Hebrides group, off the west coast of Scotland. It covers an area of nearly 700 square miles and boasts a population of 37,000 people. It has splendid lochs, where splendid fishing is to be had, and red deer still roam over the moors and forest land.

This land has a stirring history, for the people have always been fighters and have many times defeated the royal troops.—Answers.

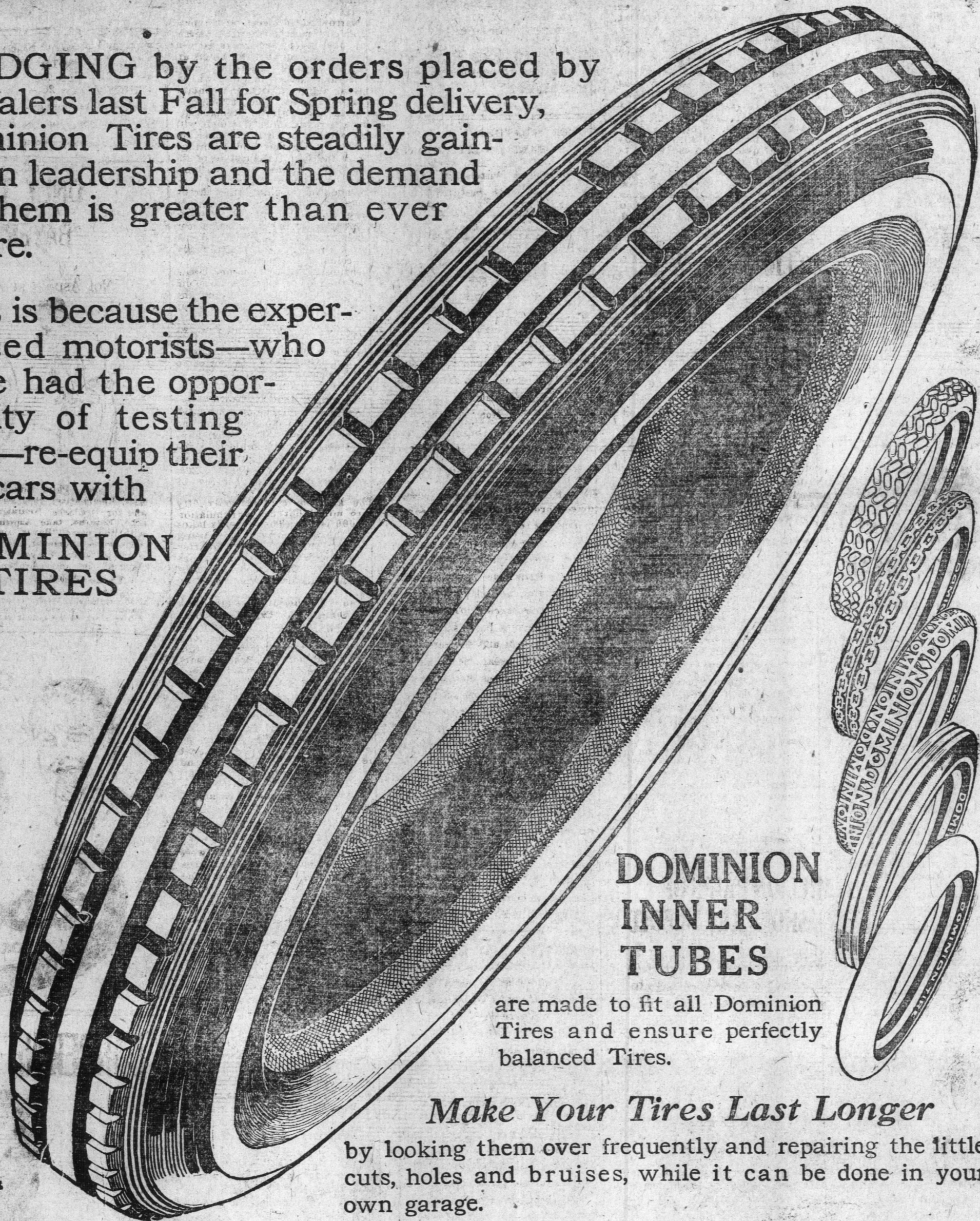

## NEVER HAVE SEEN A DOG OR A CAT

Children in War - Scared Europe Never Ever Hear the Birds Sing.

When you grinned at the six-year-old son of the house romping in the yard with his dog, or watched his small sister carefully dividing her attention between ribbon bows for the house "baby" and the robin on the lawn, did it ever occur to you that somewhere in the world there are little folks of the same age who have never seen a dog nor a cat nor heard a bird sing. Yet, there are some hundreds of thousands of youngsters in war-stricken Europe to-day who are ignorant of the existence of the furred and feathered creatures which help to make a Canadian kiddie's day worth while.

Jewish relief workers who have returned from the Eastern and Central European countries cite the absence of domestic animals and birds to illustrate the desolate barrenness of the countries that were swept again and again by the warring armies for nearly five years. Jacob Bushkin, who had charge of a unit for the Joint Distribution Committee, the sole agency disbursing relief funds raised by the Jewish Relief Council of Canada, the Central Committee for Relief and the Jewish People's Relief Committee, has described the conditions there.

"In that bare stretch of country where there are scarcely any trees, no habitations other than the miserable dug-outs in which returned refugees exist, and 'no man's land' of Poland—we did not see a single cat or dog, and in all the time we were there we never heard a bird sing. Armies have swept bare the country and trampled the ground to the consistency almost of rock, while shell fire has blasted the countryside. No animal, even domestic animal was left there. So there are children to-day, or six years of age who have never seen a dog nor a cat and have never heard the singing of a bird!"

## DESTITUTE JEWS HAVE NO HOUSES

Six Million Unfortunates Compelled to Use Packing Cases, Cans and Sacks.

Patterning on the block houses that children build, the destitute Jewish refugees of Eastern Europe, whose homes have been destroyed during the war, are trying to solve their housing problem with the packing boxes in which relief supplies have been sent to them, according to reports received by the Canadian Jewish War Relief Committee from relief workers abroad.

Not only is every particle of food and clothing used to the utmost advantage in these stricken lands where 6,000,000 Jews are at the point of starvation, but the cans and sacks and wrapping cases in which the food and clothing come are made to do duty as well. There is neither lumber or nails in most of the countries of eastern Europe at present, and the packing boxes are handled as if they were the finest mahogany, when the shipments arrive. Not a nail is allowed to go to waste, when the boxes are taken carefully apart.

All over eastern Europe at present men, women and children, many of them sick with typhus, are living in cellars, in devastated houses, in old right crabs, on roofless platforms, in the ruins of their fields, unprotected from the elements. The clothing of these destitute Jews, consisting for the most part of the rags that they have worn for the five years of the war, afford them little warmth.

For this reason, the packing boxes, which might not be considered particularly luxurious homes at another time, are welcomed as life-savers just now. Boards from them are used to re-build broken houses, and even to make lean-to shelters where no building stood before. Some of the smaller boxes are piled one above the other, like children's blocks, and nailed together, to serve as temporary houses.

## MOTHERS PRAY THAT BABIES MIGHT DIE

Suffering Among Jews is So Bad That Death Alone Gives Relief.

Mothers begging for death to relieve their children's suffering, was the most tragic thing seen by Leo Wolfson, New York attorney and journalist, in seven weeks spent in Roumania, Galicia, Bessarabia and Bukowina. Mr. Wolfson, who has just returned to New York, made the trip in order to study political conditions in these countries.

"There are one and one-half million Jews in this section of Eastern Europe who are in immediate want," declared Mr. Wolfson. "In every town I visited, I saw starving, naked Jews stretching out their hands to passers-by for a piece of bread."

"They hardly look like human beings. All one sees are living skeletons, covered with yellow skin. The children are small, worn-out, frightened, little creatures, who just drag themselves aimlessly around."

"How they will live through the winter, no one knows. No one can begin to describe this picture of misery and want. But one can get an idea of it, knowing that mothers are actually praying that death take their children to relieve their terrible suffering."

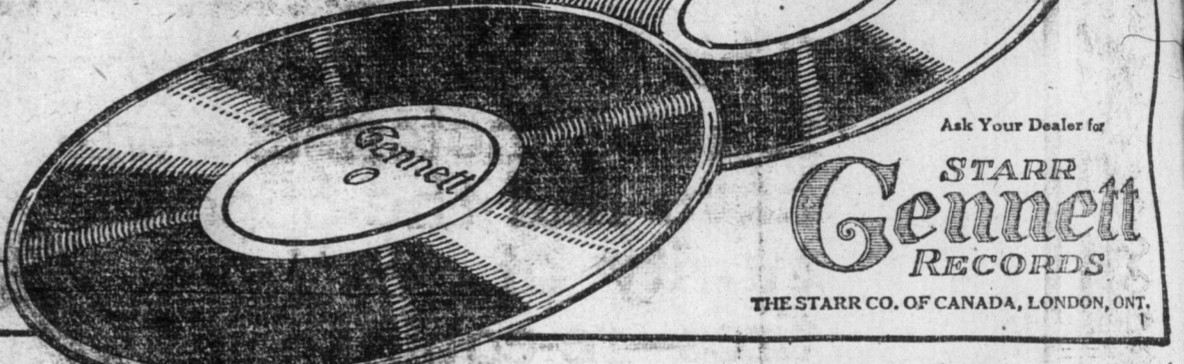

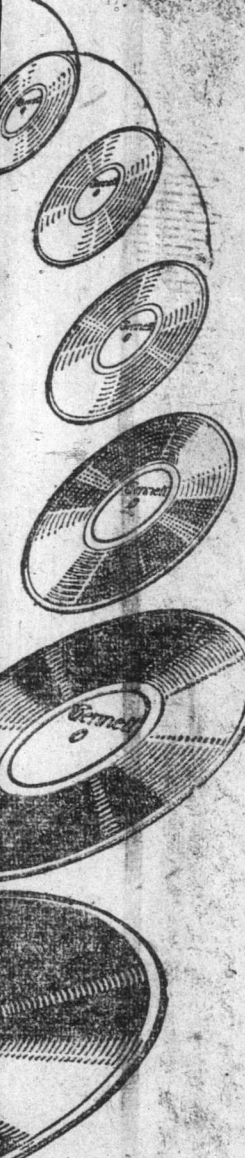

houses. It was a mournful thing, she said, if Canadian children are so shabby and empty headed that nothing but the present day movie theatre will amuse them.

Mrs. Henderson drew attention to the changing conditions in every country since the war, and gave it as her opinion that the nations are not looking to the interests of the masses. This must change. The common people are waking up and demanding rights which are theirs.

This was evident in the case of the cotton textile industry wherein it was shown in England that there is a profit of as much as 3200 per cent and the government confessed that it could do nothing when the question was brought up in the House of Commons.

Cotton is something more dear to the common run of humanity than anything else perhaps. Everybody uses it, yet the industry has been allowed to get into the hands of a few profiteers and the public pays the bill. It was stated in England that much of the huge profit goes to the middle man in Canada and before the Board of Commerce a textile manufacturer had not sought to excuse the big profits. He said he was not in the business for charity. Mrs. Henderson said the remedy for many abuses such as that was in the hands of the women of Canada, who, if they only go about it is the right way can accomplish a great deal.

She said it would be quite in order for the women to send their congratulations to the members of the Ontario legislature who have introduced the Mother's Pensions Plan. They would appreciate the kindly word she was certain. She felt that the great human force of international motherhood and womanhood if used in the natural way would make this an ideal world to live in.

Charges made against a Kitchener undertaker in connection with the death of William Walter Smallbeck late of 59 Barber Avenue, Toronto will be the subject of an official investigation to be conducted today at William Speer's Undertaking parlors 2926 Dundas Street west, Toronto, by Col. J. S. Menish, of Guelph. The charges are that the body of Pte Smallbeck, who died about a week ago in a military hospital in Kitchener, was not embalmed, and that the coffin in which the remains were shipped to Toronto was of the cheapest kind possible to obtain, and not in accordance with the requirements of the Government for the burial of returned soldiers.
