Household Notes.

To soften the old paint brushes you used last year put them in a can of coal oil. When soft they can be washed in warm suds.

To blanch almonds pour boiling water over them and leave them till the water is cold, when the skins will be quite loose.

For aching feet, due to walking, change the shoes at least twice a day. This will give both feet and shoes a refreshing rest.

For a refreshing dinner salad toss white cherries, bits of orange and banana in French dressing, and serve on lettuce leaves.

A few drops of alcohol rubbed on the inside of lamp chimneys will remove all trace of greasy smoke when water alone is of no avail.

In cooking broilers all the juice is saved and much of the flavor otherwise lost is retained by completely brushing over the fowl with olive oil before submitting it to the flames.

Croutons for soup are most easily made by cutting stale bread about half

an inch thick, buttering it thickly on both sides, cutting in half-inch squares and baking in the oven until brown.

There is nothing better for cleaning copper utensils than hot vinegar, salt and milk. Take a cupful of warm milk, add a quarter of a cupful of hot vinegar and a tablespoonful of salt. Rub on hard with a flannel rag.

While kerosene is now generally recognized as better than any drug-store or barber-shop preparation for the hair, it is not generally known that crude oil is better still. Used once a week, it will destroy dandruff and promote a fine growth of hair.

To clean straw matting put three pints of bran in two quarts of water and boil. When it is nearly cool wash the matting with it, and afterward dry it well with a clean cloth. Add a little salt to the water for white matting and vinegar for red.

Worn brooms or whisks may be dyed in hot-water and the uneven edges trimmed with shears, and then dipped in cold water and all the water shaken out. This makes the straws harder and the trimming makes the brush almost as good as new.

To make a good sweet-potato-pie, take a cupful of mashed potato, a teaspoonful of salt, same of nutmeg and ginger, half a cup of sugar, a cup of milk and one well-beaten egg. Bake for half an hour in a slow oven.

Piloff of chicken livers is an excellent dish for luncheon. Boil the livers until tender and put in an open dish lined with rice. Put a layer of rice over the top and turn the mound out into the dish in which it is to be served. Cover with a rich tomato sauce.

Bananas are rarely found in this country ripe enough to be digestible, although they may be perfectly yellow. To properly ripen them so that they will be excellent food, buy a bunch and hang it up in a dry place with the stem in water. In a few days they will be much improved.

QUEBEC, To-day.
M. Pelletier, Postmaster-General, at a banquet on Saturday referring to the Borden Government's naval policy said Laurier's naval policy had been abandoned. The Government would keep the Niobe and the Rainbow, but the other ten vessels would not be constructed, there would be no plebiscite to decide the question.

LONDON, To-day.
The House of Commons has finally passed the Naval Prize Bill. This is the measure upon which depends Britain's ratification of the Declaration of London, the agreement between the various governments as to prizes in time of war. The Bill passed its third reading by 172 to 125.

Rough Trip.

The S. S. Durango, Capt. Chambers, arrived here at 11 a.m. to-day from London after a run of 15 days. The ship brought 1,000 tons cargo and 7 bags of mail matter. She left London on Sunday the 26th inst. in the morning and for 2 days had exceptionally fine weather but after that was beset by hurricanes of wind from W. veering to N.W. and S.W. and causing a tremendous sea which time and again swept the ship's decks and sent spray over the foremast and up above the funnel. Once the ship could make but little headway and fell off broadside to the combers so that there was nothing for Captain Chambers to do but run his ship before it and this he did for 12 hours as to attempt to face the mountainous sea prevailing would be to court disaster. This bolterous weather continued till Friday last and often it was only at great risk that officers and crew held the decks. She brought no passengers and will sail for Halifax on Wednesday.

Daring Robbery On Schr.

TRUNK TAKEN FROM CABIN AND OPENED ON WHARF—\$27 STOLEN FROM IT—BELIEVE CAPTAIN AND MATE WERE DRUGGED.

Shortly before 7 o'clock yesterday morning watchman Joseph Clarke, of the Smith Co's. premises, received a great surprise when he discovered under the gallery of the premises a seaman's chest or trunk with the cover beaten off it, evidently by some thief, who had ransacked it and, as the sequel proved, stole \$27 in cash out of it. The trunk was owned by William Quinton of the schr. Pandora, lying at the Smith Co pier, and the owner of which is Mr. Thomas Whately, of Haystack, P.B. It is thought the thief or thieves got on board the schooner early yesterday morning and did the deed. The schooner is a small one and has been in port since Wednesday week. She landed some fish at Barr's wharf, and only a few days ago hauled down to Smith's. The chest or trunk was in the cabin, a very small compartment, against the wall, just at the rear of the stove and opposite the entrance to the cabin. The trunk and the money it contained was owned by the skipper, Wm. Quinton, who with the mate, Christopher Hipditch, slept in the cabin. Both men turned in at 11 o'clock Saturday night after the mate had closed the doors of the cabin cover and hauled the sliding cover over the top, leaving it only a few inches open to admit the air. In the trunk besides the stolen money were the skipper's clothes, but nothing besides the money was stolen. The mate's coats and vests were hung up in the cabin and in Hipditch's coat was 80 cents, but this was not touched. Forward in the forecastle slept Melvin Best and Joseph Manning, the two others of the crew, who retired before the captain and mate. Not a man on board heard the slightest noise during the late hours of the night or early morning, neither did Watchman Clarke, and it is thought the thief boarded the vessel in a boat, which he could easily do, as the schooner is at the head of the wharf, moored at its western side. When the trunk was found the cover had been smashed in pieces and the stout lock which secured it was forced off. When Clarke made the discovery he went up on Water Street and meeting Head Const. Peet, told him of the occurrence. When he went on board the schooner it took him some time to wake the skipper of the vessel, who seemed to be in a dazed condition, and who yesterday averred to a Telegram reporter, as well as the police officers who were investigating the affair, that he felt sick and queer, and when aroused yesterday morning was some time before he could collect his senses. Hipditch also said he felt queer when aroused, and this leads to the suspicion that the thief drugged or chloroformed both men as they slept so that he could do the work he was engaged on without being disturbed. If the man had no boat with him he could not yet in the wharf by going over the many schooners which lay at the various wharves in the neighbourhood, and could escape in the same way. The police believe that two or three persons are engaged in making a specialty of robbing from schooners, and believe they are the same who attempted to take a trunk from the cabin of the schr. Rosa Bella at Goodridge's a few mornings ago. They are cool hands and it is hoped they will soon be captured.

Chicago Police Believe They Have Unearthed a Second Vermilya Case.

Chicago, Nov. 9.—Discoveries made by detectives investigating the death of John M. Quinn in his home at 7105 South Michigan avenue last Saturday morning lead them to believe that they have encountered a murder mystery similar in its essential aspects to the Vermilya case, except that a pistol in stead of a poison in alleged to have been used in taking human life.

When the police arrived Quinn told them that Dr. Fred T. Bonfield, who also was summoned, that he had been shot as he lay asleep, but did not know by whom. Mrs. Quinn declared her husband had been shot by a burglar, according to the detectives. She was asked many questions, and it is said, made unsatisfactory answers to many of them. She was finally taken into custody and held as a suspect.

Examination of Mrs. Quinn the following day led her to being asked to reveal her past life. She did this, but according to the police, told of her first marriage to a man named McDonald, and neglected to tell them of her second marriage to Warren Thorpe in Jackson, Mich. This fact led the detectives to Jackson, where they learned that Thorpe, too, had been shot and killed while asleep in bed. They learned also that his mother, who lived with him, had died under circumstances that never have been explained.

In the Thorpe death the police declare they have learned that Mrs. Thorpe, now Mrs. Quinn, insisted that her husband had been shot to death by burglars. As in the case of Quinn, she says she was awakened in the night by a pistol shot and that she found her husband mortally wounded at her side. Mrs. Thorpe was arrested at the time by the Jackson police, the Chicago detectives say, but they were never able to clear up the mystery, and she was finally set free.

A son of Thorpe was found in Jackson by the detectives, and he is said to have told them that he believed his mother knew more of the death of his father than she had ever told. He agreed to accompany the detectives to Chicago, and to-day when the inquiry is begun over Quinn's body he will confront the suspected woman.

A revolver of an old pattern was found in the Quinn house, according to the police, behind a bath tub. It was identified by J. W. Miller, a boarder in the Quinn house, as one he had owned for several years, and which disappeared from a drawer in his room the day before Quinn was shot. Miller, the police say, told them that he had told Mrs. Quinn of the disappearance of the revolver, and that she had told him not to tell her husband.

During the past few days more than a hundred native Princes have been received in audience by the King and their visits have been returned on the King's command, by the Viceroy, Lord Hardinge. The King and Queen yesterday watched a magnificent open air church parade.

LONDON, To-day.
Reports of the Board of Trade show that during the past 11 months the imports were valued at £615,674,640, an increase of £6,353,717 over the previous 11 months. The exports amounted to £415,710,513, an increase of £2,544,880.

LONDON, To-day.
Details as to the advances of Russian troops in Persia has been kept secret for several days. We are completely in the dark as to how large a force has been despatched by the Russian Government, and particulars of its movements are unknown in London. The public generally feel there is to be an establishment of a Russian protectorate over the best part of Persia, including the two northern capitals, Tebriz and Teheran. Newspapers and politicians generally give expression to their skepticism regarding it as unlikely that Russia once entrenched at Teheran will ever withdraw. The Times predicts that Russia's first act will be to substitute another form of Government for that of the National Council. The possible damage to British commercial interests is absorbing attention, but the blow to British prestige among Orientals causes most anxiety. The correspondent of the Daily Telegraph at Delhi emphasizes the danger. The Outlook says: "We are face to face with one of the gravest crises in the history of British Policy in Asia." The Nation says: "It means the worst blow which our prestige could suffer in the East. We appear as the weak partner who does not dare to check his powerful and unscrupulous associate." Persia has found a strong friend in Viscount Curzon of Kedleston, the former Viceroy of India, whose knowledge of the country inspires respect and whose speeches have done much to shake confidence in the policy of the Government. The British Cabinet is trying to induce Russia to abate her demands, but the crux of the matter is the tension with Germany, which overshadows all other considerations. England needs Russia's support in case of a war with Germany and cannot afford to take a stand against her.





Street Paving.

Correspondent Suggests That One Job be Finished Before Another is Started.

Dear Sir,—In reading over the report of the proceedings of the Municipal Council Friday night last, I observe the Mayor brought before the notice of that body the necessity of making preparations for the preliminary work of paving New Gower and Duckworth Streets. While I would be delighted to see streets paved, I would suggest that it would be well for the Council to consider the advisability of completing the unfinished portion of Water Street in the East End, that is from Shea & Co's premises to the terminus, which is better known as Wood's Dock. We have quite a lot of traffic in that locality from the Burgess Line of boats and from A. J. Harvey & Co's, the Standard Factory, Empire Wood Factory and other concerns. If finished it would greatly enhance the value of property in that section of the town, and the public would not have to wade half the time in wet seasons, up to their knees in mud. I should say finish one job first before making an attempt to start a second one, and not have them both in slings with no finish to either. Of course this section was greatly improved a year or two ago by raising the bed of the road in the centre to allow the water to run off, but I may say this is only good for a season, and the city authorities will see that the same thing will have to be done again, but if it was paved, there is practically an end to the expense in that direction, as the paved section of Water Street can fully demonstrate, and the money saved in this work would in the near future, soon find its way back in the possession of the Council, which could be turned to good account in many other directions towards city improvements. Trusting that you will be able to give me space in the valuable columns of your widely read paper to throw out this gentle hint. I remain, Yours sincerely, AN EAST ENDER. 


