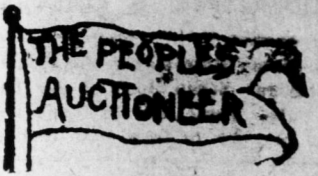

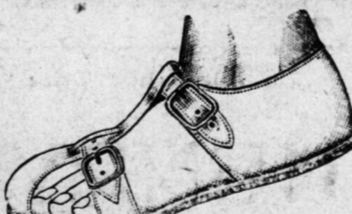

Jack Sullivan Make an Attack on Webber, the Informer!

New York, August 11.—During exercise hour in the West Side prison today, Jacob Reich, alias "Jack Sullivan", one of the four Rosenthal murder suspects confined there, made a vicious attack on "Bridgie" Webber. Reich was pulled off by other prisoners and keepers before he had done Webber any particular harm, and a watch will be put on the pugnacious "King of Newsboys."

Reich also paid his respects to bald-headed "Jack" Rose in the choicest language of East Fourteenth Street. The epithets shouted by Reich at Rose amazed even the prisoners held for examination in the Magistrate's Court. Reich had read the morning papers. What aroused him was the report that Webber, in his testimony before the Grand Jury yesterday, had gone into details concerning the payment of 1,000 in cash to "Lefty Louie", "Gyp the Blood", "Whitey" Lewis, and "Dago Frank" Crofici, the four gun-men who killed Herman Rosenthal.

According to the published account of Webber's testimony the informer said Reich had been sent twice in the capacity of messenger, to Lieut. Becker, with a demand on that police officer to make good to Webber \$1,000 which had been turned over to the murderers.

When Reich got the full significance of this he began to boil up, but his anger did not explode until he, Webber, Rose and Harry Valon were turned out at 7 o'clock for exercise in the corridor outside their adjoining cells.

No sooner had the quartette of prisoners been turned loose than Reich who had a reputation as a fist fighter, made a rush for "Bridgie" Webber. The gambler retreated, but Reich got to him and landed a couple of smashers. Then keepers and prisoners crowded in and pulled Reich away from Webber, who retreated to his cell.

Then Reich cut loose vocally. He denounced the confessions of Rose and Webber as lies, and gave his opinion of Rose in a tone of voice that penetrated to every part of the prison. His denunciation took the form of accusing Rose and Webber of framing up lies to satisfy the District Attorney.

Astounding Evidence Before Grand Jury.

New York, August 14.—In the relentless search for evidence to convict the murderers of the gambler Herman Rosenthal, the State's attorney and the Grand Jury have unearthed a wealth of information showing the gamblers and keepers of disorderly houses paid sums aggregating hundreds of thousands of dollars yearly for police protection.

Evidence now before the Grand Jury shows that every form of gambling and vice paid a prescribed toll, and that these tariffs varied according to the location in the city.

The monthly tariffs paid to the police vary. A first class uptown gambling house paid \$1,000; a middle-class gambling house paid \$500; an East Side gambling house paid anywhere from \$100 to \$400; high-class pool rooms \$600; poker dice games paid \$300; uptown disorderly houses paid \$600; while the East Side resorts paid \$100.

With the co-operation of all the banks in the city, District Attorney Whitman has been able to secure the names of four police inspectors whose bank accounts run into several hundred thousands.

One inspector is said to have accumulated a million dollars. The indictments of these officials are not before the Grand Jury.

The Dying Salvation Chief.

The message in to-day's issue would make it appear that the hours of the Salvation Army chief are numbered. For some weeks past it has been evident that the life of General Booth was passing away. The thoughts of men therefore turn to the immense personality of the man, the extraordinary wide stage on which he has played a world part, and the stature of the man who will be called upon to follow him. The power of his personality is unique among living men.

Of humble birth, owing nothing to great family name, assisted by no ancient and powerful institution, he has a name as well known as any monarch, and is as much revered as any prince of a Church.

Living in an age of democracy, of wealth seeking and comfort finding, he instituted a religious organization, autocratic in government, rigid in discipline, whose officers had to face cheerfully poverty and hardship, and whose members must constantly practice self denial. The marvel of it all was its extraordinary extension throughout not only the English speaking world, but in many other parts of the world; and all this has been accomplished by the extraordinary personality of one man, who set his face hard against the ordinary influences of the day, but whose heart beat for humanity and who had a right to direct his feeling for humanity on practical lines.

A crucial problem will arise when that personality is no more. Is the institution still dependent on the influence of the intense magnetism of a General Booth, and if so, will that magnetism be found sufficiently energized in his successor?

There is a belief prevalent that Mr. Bramwell Booth will succeed the Great General, when he passes to his rest.

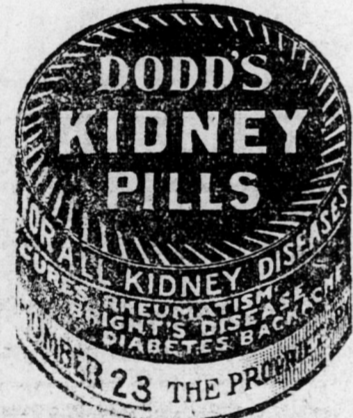

S.E. Gale and Rainstorm.

Special Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-day. President Taft closed the day's conference on the Panama Canal bill with a special message to Congress, suggesting the passage of legislation which would permit American ships to travel through the Canal toll free, and which would allow foreign nations to test the legality of this provision by suits in the States Courts. It is the belief here that a determined effort is to be made to meet the President's wishes. Although some of its leaders are inclined to believe the message meant no further action in regard to the Canal during the present session, Taft explained he was anxious to sign the present bill, but he wished to assure other Governments of fairness on the part of the States.

Threaten Impeachment.

Special Evening Telegram. PEKIN, To-day. The Chinese National Assembly has resolved to present a petition to the President, Yuan Shi Kai, demanding further explanations and the evidence on which General Chang Chen Wu and General Fong Wal, who were members of Dr. Sun Yaken's party, were seized and summarily executed. If his explanation personally should prove unsatisfactory, then the House will impeach the President and, may be, the whole Chinese Government.

The Canning Season

The canning season is an annual epidemic which disrupts the peace and quiet of the American home and drives acrimonious husbands to the dairy lunch.

Port Burwell, Ont., Aug. 15.—Pinned beneath a sunken scow about a mile out of Port Burwell, Edward West, of Port Huron, Mich., lies dead on the floor of Lake Erie, and another whose name has not been ascertained, lies here in a precarious condition.

A rescue party was soon on the scene when informed of the accident and although the unknown diver was pulled out by his life line every effort to rescue West proved unavailing. The line above the suit of the latter had been snapped in the heaveup of the vessel and the location of the disconnected body could not be ascertained up to a late hour to-night. The rescue party are still on the scene. The other man was badly crushed and though still unconscious hope is held out for his recovery.

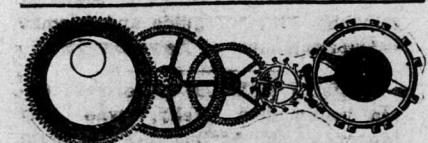

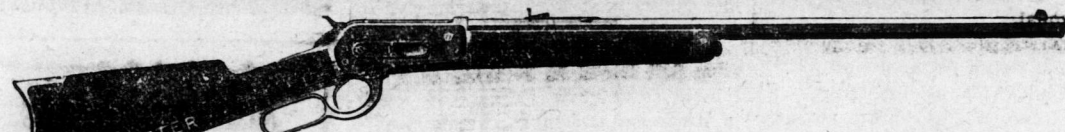

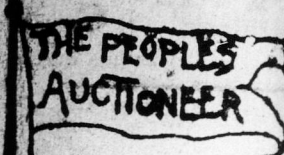
