





#### Long 'Phone Message by Wireless.

Berlin, November 22 .- The transmission of wireless telephonic communication over a distance of nearly 4,000 miles, from Neustadt-Am-Ruebenbergo, in Hanover, to New Jersey, was accomplished on October 27 by a German wireless company, according to Rear-Admiral George August Emsmann in a reort to-day to the German Shipbuilding Society.

The message was sent and received in the middle of the afternoon in spite of the daytime being most unfavorable for wireless communications. The two stations are over 800 feet high. Earlier attempts had proved that clearly emitted tones were audible and finally a spoken message was transmitted and distinctly received. Let us have home made champions and not beroes imported at great cost for a few seasons only. This would not only increase the excitement in our metropolis, but it would give the little towns a chance.
