In the western part of the front, our vigorous counter-attacks enabled us recapture in the region of Hills 321 and 520 a large part of the lost ground and to drive back the Germans within reach of Thiaumont work which they still occupy. A struggle developed, particularly violent, at the outskirts of Fleury village between Fumin and Chenois woods. We regained by counter-attacks all the ele-ments of trenches that the enemy had captured from us during the night of the 21st to 22nd. U. S. STERN NOTE TO MEXICO.

WASHINGTON, To-day, A demand for the immediate re lease of American troopers taken prisoners at Carrizal, coupled with the stern notification that the United the purpose of the Carranza Govern ment, was telegraphed to Mexico City to-day by Secretary of State Lansing. The note disclosed that the State Department received yesterday a communication from the de facto govern ment stating the Carrizal fighting was the direct result of orders to attack American soldiers moving otherwise than toward the border, which were personally issued by General Carran-za to General Trevino, but later communicated to General Pershing. In reply, Secretary Lansing requires the de facto government to transmit a definite statement as to the course of action it has determined upon through the usual diplomatic channels, and not through subordinate military officers. The Mexican communication is construed, Secretary Lansing states, as a formal avowal of deliberately heatile action against the forces of the United States now-in Mexico and a purpose to attack without provocation whenever they move from their pre-sent position, despite the friendly mission on which they are engaged and which is reaffirmed in the american rejoinder. General Carranza is required to place himself on record formally, and a plain intimation lies behind the restrained language of Lan-sing's communication that force will be met with force. Apparently, how-ever, the Washington Government has determined that the de facto govforced upon the United States.






