Close Season for Caribor

At a meeting held last night the lovernment approved of the regula-ions of the Game Board ordering a close season of three years for Caribou. The new law becomes effective January 1st, 1925. The reports show a rapid fucrease of moose but there is reason to fear that many are being slaughtered. The free use of fire arms in the various logging camps is said to be responsible for some of the unlaw-ful destruction. There are also grave complaints against the use of wire snares for taking fur bearing animals As it has been found that being chear to erect, trappers do not trouble to son is over. The consequence is that many females have been found rotting in the snares, whilst the young have starved to death. It is probable that legislation to prevent this practice will be enacted, but it will be made so as not to conflict with the snaring of rabbits.

TO RELIEVING OFFICERS, STIPENDIARY MAGIS-TRATES, AND OTHERS:-

The expenditure of public money upon hospitals and a milar charitable institutions, the care of outside patients, and transportation to and fro has grown to alarming proportions. Disregard of instructions as to the ser ding of patients to St. John's from the Outports has not only increased the expenditure, but has caused inconvenience to the authorities, and unnecessary suffering for the ailing. Room in the hospitals has not. at times. been available for patients arriving here, and it has been found necessary to send to boardinghouses to await their turn for entering a hospital, many who would have been better cared for at home during the period of waiting. These and other considerations have made it advisable to state the facts, and to reveat and add to instructions.

It is the policy of the Legislature and Government to limit. as closely as possible. the expenditure of public mone v in the case of the sick in public hospitals, and their transportation to and fro. to provision for those patients only who are unable to pay for their own care, and whose natural protectors are unable to pay for them. The aid given is a charity for the sick and helpless, and it should only be accepted consistently with self-respect. Those who are able to pay in whole or in part for their own treatment are expected to do so. Parents are expected to pay for the care of children, and children for the care of parents, wholly or partly. where they are able to do so.

Only Relieving Officers, or Stipendiary Magistrates, acting in lieu of such Officers, have authority to send patients, at the expense of the Colony, for treatment in the public wards of hospitals.

Where a Relieving Officer resides conveniently near he alcme has authority.

Where hy reason of the remoteness of a Relieving Officer, and the nature of the malady, delay until such Officer could act would seem to a Stipendiary Magistrate to be undesirable, such Magistrate may act in lieu of a Relieving Officer, but Magistrates are requested to observe as far as possible the rule that dealing with the sick at pubilc expense is specially the province of Relieving Officers.

Clergymen and others whose attention is drawn to persons askillig treatment at public expense are requested to refer such patients to Relieving Officers or Magistrates in their order (wherever such reference can be made without danger to the sick), and to refer to Mr. Bartlet t only in instances in which no Relieving Officer or Magristrate is near enough to deal with the

matter adequately. It is desired that the discretion of sending forward patients shall be exercised wherever convenient by Relieving Officers and Magistrates only, in the order named, except as provided in the next following paragraph hereof.

Except in "Emergency cases," as herein defined, no patient may be forwarded by Relieving Officers, Magistrates or other & at public expense, unless permission has been first asked and obtained of Mr. Lewis Bartlett, Public Hea Ith Officer, St. John's. Patients suffering from serious accidents, or from appendicitis, or whose condition requires immediate surgical attention. may be forwarded without the prior consent of Mr. Bartlett, but he must be immediately notified by telegram of the coming of the patient, and of the ailment thereof. Every such instance will be strictly inquired into, and unless the condition of the patient made the forwarding there of without prior permission reasonably necessary, the person forwarding will be considered to have acted without discretion, and be held liable to pay the incurred.

When application is made to forward a patient for hospital treatment, a Relieving Officer, or Stipendiary Magistrate, as the case may be, should, before complying, satisfy him self that the patient, or the person liable for the care (it the patient, is not able to pay the expense of treatment, and that such expense should be a charge upon the Colony, and if it seems to such Relieving Officer or: Magistrate that the financial and physical conditions of the patient call for treatment at public expense, a Doctor, where one is conveniently near, should be asked to examine and report whether hospital or other treatment is necessary or expedient. The certificate of the Relieving Officer, or Magistrate, as the case may be, that the case is one for treatment at public expense, and the report, if any, of the Doctor upon the patient's condition, should be forwarded to Mr. Bartlett, with application for permission to forward the patient. When it seems desirable to telegraph for Mr. Bartlett's permis sion, the telegram should indicate the effect of the Doctor's report. If a Doctor is not conveniently near, the Relieving Officer or Magistrate, or other person intervening on behalf of the patient. should state to Mr. 13 artlett as fully as possible the nature of the ailment complained of.

These regulations have, of course, nothing whatever to do with trans portation or treatment in hospitals of patients the charges for whom will be paid by them or their friends. But in respect of such patients, as the hospi tals are frequently overcrowded. application to Mr. Bar tlett to ascertain if a bed can be obtained, will be proraptly replied to. .

An increase in trans-atlantic pasenger rates affecting first class, secand class, and west bound third class accommodations will come into effect on December 15th, it was officially announced by local steamship lines to-day. 

A Close up on Russian Conditions

Council of Commisars, on the one hand, and Emma Goldman on the other, we are getting a first hand view of public affairs in that bedeviled

present Russian economic situation practically admits failure. As he puts it they have "bent the stick too far and too fast in combatting private trade." In other words he admits, what many already are convinced of, that state industry, or government another way, is a rank failure,

Co-operative and state organization which replaced private industry in Russia has in all instances failed to meet the requirements. "We have only included," says Rykoff in speaking of his budget, "such items of expenditure as we can meet from our state income, without resorting to paper money. We have not sufficient money for such urgent need as education, health and the like."

In going into details Rykoff states that in metal production the year's output is only 66 per cent. of the prewar figures, and he sees no way of increasing the metal output as Russia has not the money for big undertakings, such as railway building. Therefore, he says, "we must rely on our home markets and especially upon the peasantry, to furnish us with revenue." Of course the poor farmers will be pillaged. They always have been under the Bolshevik regime.

So much for M. Rykoff and the dismal financial picture he paints. Let us now turn to Emma Goldman, who as a very troublesome person was deported some years ago from the United States and went to Russia thinking that at last she had reached the haven of all her desires. However "Red Emma" awoke to Russia's real condition and is now in England ,seeking asylum, safe from the Bolshevik. At a recent dinner given in London, attended by many British notables, tended by many British notables,that is the British way,-Miss Goldman gave an address concerning the Bolshevik regime. Miss Goldman was deported from the United States in 1919 as an undesirable alien and made her way shortly afterwards to Russia where she spent two years among the people, whose language she speaks.

In the course of her remarks Miss Goldman said that she wished to explode the preposterous theory that the present Russian government represents the workers of that country. The oppressed masses in that country, she said, were being silenced as they never were under a Czar and all ideals had been discredited by the ruling forces.

"It is superstition," she said, "that confuses the revolution with the ruling party to-day. There are thousands in prisons and concentration camps in Russia, not for opposing the government, but for opinions sake. To call the present Soviet government a worker's experiment is the most preposterous lie ever told. The party in power has emasculated the revolution.

It is slowly undermining all that is best in Russia."

Miss Goldman then went on to read Miss Goldman then went on to read to her hearers, many of whom had apparently favored the "great experiment," a lesson. She said that the time had come when British Communists should be warned of the Russian Communists. sian failure. "Unless you understand," she said, "the mistakes of Russia in the past seven years, it is likely there will be repetitions elsewhere. One hears remarks that the Communist party is so small in Great Britain. Remember it does not require many people to destroy things, but it takes a good many people to build things up."

Tanks for Divers

Modern salvage enterprises demand greater and greater ranges in deepsea diving, and the depths to which the diver can descend is limited by the pressure of water his body can sustain without risk of callapse, improved form or diving suits and accessories are being continually devised.

F'cw of these, however, increase the diver's range of operations by more than a few fathoms, and the maximum deoth to which even the most expert diver can go remains at about 200

Artually men have gone to as great a depth as 300 feet, but under such commons no work could be attempted libreover, the men who made this record were permanently incapac tated as a result.

A new apparatus has little in commer with the usual type of diver's outilt. It resembles a small U-boat turret, which by means of a double telephone can be kept in constant communication with the surface, and when is provided with movable arms and legs to accommodate the limbs of the diver. The arms and legs are surrounded by sleeves made of a very tough aluminium alloy.

Such a diving tank enables the divor to descend or rise at will by admitting or discharging water, replacing it with compressed air from a battery of six cylinders. One diver descended 530 feet in the course of tests, although at this depth the pressure amounted to 225lb. per square inch.

"The civilization of which we are the modern representatives began in ean Sea some six housand years ago," he says. "It is the oldest culture in the world with a continuous record, for it is now accepted that the earliest history of China does not carry us back further than some four thousand years, or that of India perhaps three thousand one hundred. Yet at least six thousand years ago there existed in the Island of Crete, and on the shores of the Levant, a nation of mariners, traders, and pirates with a civilization as high as, if not higher than, that of contemporary Egypt or

"The Cretans and the Phoenicians handed this culture to the Greeks. Under the Romans it filled the entire basin of the Mediterranean, and spread even to distant Britain. So it descended without serious break to our ancestors. Our own civilization is simply an expansion of that old culture to fill the Atlantic. Through all its history it has been founded on a about it; its characteristics have been endurance, energy, and power of

India and China.

"The principal civilizations outside Europe have been those of Egypt, Mesopotamia, China, and India. These were land civilizations founded on great navigable rivers such as the Nile, the Euphrates and Tigris, or the Ganges. Two still remain, India and China; the rest have disappeared. Such civilizations seem to follow a regular development. They may rise to considerable heights of culture,







Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.-When you spoke of the line drawn due north from Blanc Sablon to the fifty second parallel of north latitude as being the western boundary of Newfoundland Labrador, you were partly right. It is indeed part of the western boundary. The rest of the western boundary begins further west on said parallel at a point where said parallel cuts the divide between the waters which flow into the Atlantic and those which flow into Hudson's Bay and Hudson's Straits. The fifty secons parallel was evidently chosen because it most nearly approached a former northern boundary of the Province of Quebec. The "head waters of the River St. John" was once the point from which that northerly boundary was drawn in a westerly direction. The fifty second parallel was a more definite boundary. The Charter of 1680 gave the Hudson's Bay Company rights on all the land drained by all the rivers. lakes, sounds and streams which em-

ptied their waters into Hudson's Bay and Hudson's Straits. That land and these rights were bought by the Dominion of Canada, and a part of them given by the Dominion to the Province of Quebec. We claim that all of the Labrador Peninsula north of the fifty second parallel, together with a three-cornered piece south of the parallel and east of a line drawn due north to it from Blanc Sablon, was given to Newfoundland, with the exception of that part previously granted to the Hudson's Bay Company. As to what constitutes the entrance

of Hudson's Straits there are three possible interpretations. In the first place there are, strictly speaking, two entrances. The first is where the Straits enter the Bay. This is not admissable in our case, because the Hudson's Bay Company was given rights in the Straits. The other two points are Cape Chidley on the east of Ungava Bay, and Cape Walsingham on the west. Cape Walsingham was Sir William MacGregor's choice, and, as a scientist, Sir William was right, for there the Straits really begin. From a lawyer's point of view, however, Cape Chidley would most probably be the entrance: because the legal definition of a term is that in which it was commonly understood when it was written. Nucleus of **English Fox Farm**

LONDON, Dec. 4 (Can. Press)-Twenty pairs of silver foxes, just arrived from Canada, are now in spacious wire partitions at Little Baldon, six miles from Oxford. They are to be the nucleus of an English silverfox breeding industry. Captain A. S. Robertson, a man of much experience in this industry, which is a valuable one in Canada, brought them over and sees no reason why this industry should not flourish in England.

The 40 pioneer foxes seem comfortable enough. They vary from almost-black to a light silvery grey, and the dark ones are paired with the light ones, to obtain the exact shade of silvery grey which is most favored for their furs by fashionable

Land Held Two and One-Half Centuries

CHANGES HANDS IN MONTREAL For only the second time in nearly three hundred years, the strip of land situated between Cote Des Neiges Westmount Boulevard, has changed hands, says the Montreal "Star."

Passing along Cote des Neiges Road to-day one notices that a broad expanse of the city below, heretofore obstructed by the wall built over two hundred years ago by the Gentlemen of Saint Sulpice, has now been thrown into view. For many years there have been complaints about the presence of this old wall, but it stayed on, No doubt residents of that section of the city will now rejoice with its disappearance, although the new houses being constructed on the property will blot out at least part of the picture.

The property which has just been purchased by the Newton Dakin Construction Company has been in the hands of the Sulpicians since 1657, and belonged previously to that, to the Montreal Society.

The "Societe de Montreal," as they called themselves, was a party of high church people in Paris, who received the island as a grant from the King in 1640, and raised money to send a governor and settlers here, as well as missionaries to convert the Indians

Seven years later, the town and is and of Montreal was in danger of being abandoned. Many of the members of the Society were old and others lost interest in their colony. It was then, in the year 1650 that the Gentlemen of St. Sulpice accepted charge of Montreal. Before making the actual settlement in 1657, four Sulpicians were sent to Montreal to take charge of the seigneury and the Church. Until that time the Jesuits were the only religious order that had been here and there had been no parish, and all the registers were kept in Latin. On the arrival of the Sulpicians a parish was formed, with

Gabriel Souart as its first rector. Later the Society of Montreal made definite donation of all its rights to the Seminary of St. Sulpice, who received the grant of the whole island with the understanding that they would bring out settlers. The Act of ratified by Louis XIV,, and the Sulpicians actually took possession of the island on the eighteen of August 1663, and all the land was divided

under seigneurial tenure. By degrees tenants bought over their land from the seigneurs, and became free-holders, although many farmers throughout the province still prefer to pay their rent of five or ten dollars a year, rather than buy the farms which are worth perhaps as much as fifty thousand, many of them

Russian Warship Disarmed

And Admiral Removed by French Government,

BIZERTA, Tunis, Dec. 5 .- The squadron of General Baron Peter Wrangel, who was at the head of the anti-Bolshevik compaign in the Crimea, which has been lying in Bizerta Roads since December, 1920, was disarmed to-day. All the guns, torpedo tubes and other armaments vere removed from the two battleships, two cruisers, nine torpedo boats and four submarines comprising the squadron. Part of the crews were dispersed, while the remainder have been given shelter in the French

Naval Barracks at Sidi Almez. A Soviet Commission recently was appointed by the Moscow Government to come to Bizerta and demand the return of the war craft to the Soviet Government. A threat by Admiral Exelman's Port Admiral of Bizerta and Commander-in-Chief of the French naval forces in North African waters, that he would have the Russian Commission thrown into the sea if it called on him, resulted in the Admiral being removed from his post by the French Government.

London-When the Giants and White Sox played their first exhibition baseball game in London last month, some of the newspapers sent their golf reporters out to do the story of the proceedings. Most of the journals, however, conferred the assignment upon their cricket writers. It was in the momenclature of cricket that all of them reported to the populace upon what they had seen. Each and every one of them pitied the poor batter because his bat was

so small and the fielders' gloves so large. One writer compared the bat to a broomstick, and the gloves to suet-puddings able to absorb every ball that came within reach.

But what most struck the British reporters in this "unfairness of the allocation of the armor" was the catcher's "coat of mail" was the umpires "triple wadding around the chest." Only the batsman was "subject to complete disarmament."

The Manchester Guardian reporter found hasehall "monotonous" and the veteran golf chronicler of the Morning Post adjudged it a slow game, bravely setting down that opinion in full expressed knowledge that there is no more certain way to make an American really angry. Nor does he find it easy to comprehend how a batsman can be so insensitive as to be able to do his job with the catcher chattering away on a line of

intentionally irritating remarks. That the Giants and White Sox will succeed in their aim of implanting baseball in Great Britain no native believes. To the majority of the English it seems to be a slow, monotonous game. It does not last three days like a cricket match, with several hundred runs and time out for tea and lunch. But nevertheless and notwithstanding, they do find it slow.


