

It then changes sunshiny, melancholy room, a charm to the chrysalis, and a few weeks later becomes the adult beetle, which comes out of the wood in the follow ing spring for the purpose of mating. "From the above it will be seen that out of the four stages of its life-his-

tory the beetle is fairly easy to get at in three, viz., the egg, the chrysalis, and the adult.

"Chemical means are used for its estruction in the application of a fuid which is sprayed on to the beams in the spring, killing the adults and eggs lying at the surface. The fluid used is of such a character that it penetrates the wood, depositing a aisonous substance capable of killing the grubs when they bore their way to the surface. The Indian Mutiny was the great revolt of the Bengal native army in 1857, which led to the transference of of Indian government from the East India Company to the Crown in 1858. The mediate cause of the mutiny was the great disproportion between the number of British and native troops in India, which gave the Sepoys an exaggerated notion of their power. Its immediate causes were a series of eircumstances which promoted active discontent with the British. One of the immediate causes was the greased cartridges. In 1857 the Minie rifle was introduced into the Indian army. The cartridges were greased and one end contained the powder in a paper case. Before loading the powder was released by tearing off the end of the cartridge, and biting off this end was a common practice among all soldiers using the Minie rifle. Whether Hindus nr Mohammedans the fat of cows and pigs are anathema. It was easy for agitators to persuade the Sepoys that the new cartridges were greased with the fat of animals sacred to the Hindus or forbiddden to the Mohammedans, and that the British Government was thus engaged in a deep-laid plot for forcing them to become Christians by first making them outcasts from their own religion. No precaution had been taken to grease the cartridges with a neutral fat, such as that of sheep and goats. The low-caste natives employed in the arsenals knew what grease was actually being employed, and taunted the Brahman Sepoys with the loss of caste that would follow their use of the cartridges. Refusals to accept the new cartridges were soon heard in the Bengal army. The agitators, who had their own reasons for fomenting mutiny, rose to the





Its present terminal is on Terminal Island. One 10,000-barrel steel tank is to be shipped to Ketchikam, Alaska.

Balance of new storage planned includes four 125,000-barrel and two 80,000-barrel tanks for California Petrolem; two 1500-barrel tanks for Shell of California and at least half a dozen 80,000-barrel tanks for Union Oil company. Standard of California ast year completed at El Segundo, its effnery site, a 3,500,000-barrel reserpoir, the largest ever constructed.

### **Germany Plans Inter-Continental Airship**

Through a nation-wide appeal to the German people, issued on the 25th anniversary of the first Zeppelin flight August 20, Dr. Hugo Eckener, head of the Zeppelin Company, expets to obtain funds sufficient for the construction of an airship not only capable of flying to the North Pole, but which would be the forerunner of a regular air line between Europe and America via the Arctic and Siberia. The arigible it is proposed to build with money obtained by voluntary popular subscription would be the pigess in the world, and more than twice the size of the Los Angeles. It would cost 7,000,000 marks, of which 3,000,000 is already guaranteed by the German state and interested industries, the balance to come from the German public.



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
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
