The Seaforth Murder.

Last week we gave some particulars about the murder of a man and his wife named Malady, in the Township of Tuckersmith on the 9th inst. The victims of the assassin or assassins' hatred, were natives of Ireland, and had only been married about seven months, Previously they had both been married, and Malady had a grown-up family by his first wife. It would seem that the latter were displeased with their father for marrying a second time and when he brought his wife home, those of them who were at home immediately left their father's place, at the same time threatening the life of their stepmother. On Sunday, one of the deceased's sons-in-law, named Kehoe, with his wife, proceeded to the house to pay a visit, and, as was their custom, entered by the backdoor. This they found ajar, and, immediately on entering, they were startled to find the floor of the kitchen spotted with blood. Proceeding to the hall, what was their horror to find Malady lying with his head projecting from the bedroom, having his brains blown out by a pistol shot. The next object which met their gaze was still more blood curdling, being the dead body of Mrs. Malady, her head literally chopped in pieces with an axe, which still stood by her, and the room, floor, walls and ceiling covered with blood. The

The horrors of the sight beggars all description. Kehoe at once alarmed the neighbours, and a large number of people were soon on the premises. Coroner Coleman was also called, who placed a constable in charge of the bodies. One or two other medical men being called, a post mortem examination of the murdered people took place. In the meantime a number of tracks leading towards the river were discovered, and on being closely examined disclosed that the murderers (for there were the tracks of two) had approached the house—one with nothing on his feet, and the other with only his socks on. Suspicion seemed at once to point to no less a person than Malady's own son; and a brother of one of decased's sons-in-law was also suspected as having been an accomplice. These men were at once taken into custody. It would seem as if some boot marks were found, and on examination were found to correspond with the boot worn by one of the prisoners. The evidence of a large number of the witnesses seems to lead unmistakably to the deed having been committed by the young Malady and his accomplice, whose name is Donovan. The family were not noted for their excellence of character, the decased having spent a considerable time in the Penitentary, and the younger members were far from being angels.—

The Copyright Law

An important literary question is about to be decided in the English House of Lords. The case of Low agt. Routledge, in the matter of "Haunted Hearts"—a book by the late Miss Maria Cummins of Dortchester, Mass, author of "The Lampledge appeals from the decision of the Vice-Chancellor and of the Lords Justices, to the highest Court in the Kingdom, contending—against the doctrine of the plaintiff—that the residence of the author in an English colony, at the time of the first publication of her work in England, did not vest her with copyright. This question has been twice decided for the plaintiff, in the lower courts. It has since been argued before the Lords, and judgment is now awaited. The importance of the point is self-evident. Decision for the plaintiff will establish this doctrine: that the laws of England are paramount, in cases of conflict, to the local laws of canada give no copyright to Miss Cummins, because of that writer's former residence in that country—she being an American author. But if the decision of the lower courts, in Low agt. Routledgd, be affirmed by the House of Lords, then Canada must allow copyright, in this and in similar cases, precisely has in the case of an English author's work; and residence in a British colony, at the time of publication in England, will entitle the American or other foreign author to copyright on his work throughout that country and all its colonies.
