The weather during this week has been fine and hot throughout the greater portion of the Pacific Slope. No rain has occurred in this province excepting in the vicinity of Port Simpson and Rivers Inlet. The maximum daily temperature at Victoria exceeded 80 degrees upon four days of the week, while upon the Lower Mainland it was about 80 upon the first five days, and in Kootenay it ranged from 82 to 94 during the entire week. This hot spell was due to the prevalence of high barometric pressure over the northern portion of the province, while further south the barometer remained comparatively low. The winds therefore were chiefly from the heated interior. Instead of off the cool waters of the Pacific. Lord Hopetoun Whose Resigna-

Among the passengers who arrived on the Canadian-Australian liner Miowera yesterday was the Earl of Hopetoun, the first Governor-General of Australia, who is on his way home to Emgland, having resigned, because he found that he could not continue to fill the position which he occupied during the last year. He cannot live on fifty thousand dollars a year. The incident which has caused him to relinquish the position to which he was appointed little more than a year ago, is certainly unique in the history of democratic institutions.

The salary provided under the Australian constitution for the Governor-General is £10,000 sterling, or \$50,000, the same remuneration as is paid the Governor-General of Canada, the President of the United States, and a score or more of presidents of railway companies and numerous heads of industrial establishments on this continent.

At first blush \$50,000 a year is a large income, especially when one reflects upon the vast number of able and distinguished men who render services to humanity immeasurably greater than are those rendered by the titular heads of states or presidents of railway companies and captains of industry; but Lord Hopetoun's case really presents features which combinant sympathy.

His own private patrimony is so limited that he dare not infringe upon it for such entertainment, having regard to the obligation incumbent upon him to pass his estate unencumbered on to his heir, who inherits the title.
