We understand that a commission is to investigate the working of the Central prison and certain charges that have been laid against the warden by parties who have been officially or semi-officially connected with the institution. What these charges amount to we cannot as yet say, but we know this, that the Central prison will never be efficiently administered as long as politics are allowed to influence the appointment of the various officers under the warden. The warden ought to have supreme power. He ought to appoint the assistants, guards, and every one else connected with the institution. When those under him are appointed through the influence of a member of the legislature or of a member of the government, they are in a measure independent of the warden and measure independe take an almost mutinous attitude towards him. We should think that the ministers and members would be rather pleased than otherwise to have the patronage con hands of the warden. Wherever politics are allowed to interefere in things of this nature, discipline is made to take a second place. We cannot afford, in the conduct of an institution like the Central prison, to allow politics, religion or nationality to creep into the administration. Make a good man warden and then hold him responsible for every man subject to his orders.


