Dog Owners Should Note.

Dr. McCally states that some of the leading citizens and dog fanciers of Toronto are in communication with him on the matter of waiting on the Government and asking for an act making dog chateaux, in consequence of his communication in these columns last week. Toronto has long been noted for dog chateaux. These chateaux steal dogs, sell them for sums of money varying from \$1 to \$50 or more; they fly their detestable trade under the very noses of the owners. The owners are forced to pay taxes as if dogs were chateaux; they have to pay any detestable dog tax; they must own the dog against all their own interests, but a thief may steal a dog worth \$1000, but the owner is not allowed to sue to get the dog and throw a way he cannot be arrested, and the owner, if he tries to recover his property, must do so at an expensive rate. The law on this subject is a farce, and dog owners should unite at once and demand of the Legislature now in session an act to protect owners and recognize ownership.

Trustees Opened For School Supplies—Trustees say They Cannot do Without the Kindergarten—The Great Continued to the Business Industrial School Notes.

Yesterday was a busy day in the Public School buildings. The general board meeting takes place Thursday night, and all reports are supposed to be in shape for that meeting.

The Supply Committee met for the purpose of opening the tenders for the year's supplies.

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A delegation from the Bookbinders' Union was heard, who asked that in considering the tenders which were then to be opened, all other things being equal, the committee give the preference to those firms which pay union wages and observe the contract.

After the deputation had been submitted to a vigorous cross-examination by the trustees, the committee was asked to give their proposition serious consideration and as far as possible comply with their requests.

The Finance Committee met to deal with the unfinished business left over from the meeting of last Wednesday night.

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A strong fight was made by some present for salary reductions, but after a thorough discussion of every phase of each case, no material change was made.

Two officers have been practically abolished—superintendent of drawing and drill instructor—as the salaries have been cut about 75 per cent. The committee had no power to discharge the men, but they made arrangements to have them removed, and the board will consequently have to ask them to step out.

ANOTHER NEW RAILWAY

Mr. A. P. Kilgusson of the town of Little Current and Col. Shaw, Messrs. Thomas McGee, W. A. Howland, Alexander Marshall (umberman), C. H. Clarke and Joseph Division of this city, were introduced to Sir Oliver Mowat and other members of the Government by Mr. Combes, M.L.A., last evening.

They appeared to urge upon the administration the desirability of making a mileage grant to the Manitowlin and North Shore Railway, which is projected to run from Little Current to Wabigoon, in Nipissing district, a distance of 88 miles.

It will cross at Nairn the C.P.R., of which it will be a very considerable feeder. The population of Manitowlin Island is 17,000, distributed amongst 16 large municipalities, engaged in lumbering, mining and agriculture.

The great portion of the steamboat traffic between Collingwood and Sault Ste. Marie is said to come from Manitowlin and 10 steamers ply on this route. During the past year at Little Current 15,000 tons of merchandise were exported and 8000 tons were imported.

There were no engagements of gold at New York for export on Saturday last, and although foreign exchange keeps near the gold exporting point it is improbable that there will be any heavy movement.

The amount of bullion sent to the Bank of England on balance to-day was \$200,000. The loans of New York banks amount to \$40,000,000, as against \$38,000,000, as against \$47,000,000 a year ago.
