



DEATH OF VETERAN BASEBALL MANAGER

"Toronto Railway Company, Complaint Department:

"Gentlemen,-Some two or three weeks ago the writer had occasion to complain that the Parliament Street cars going west would not stop at the corner of Carlaw and Gerrard when they were running into the barns. You replied that all cars were supposed to stop at this corner, whether or not they had instruction to return to the barns.

'You evidently took the matter up with your men on this line, as the service at the above-mentioned corner has been much improved, and all cars have stopped for passengers when signalled. The last two or three days, however, the conductors and motormen have gone back to their old practice of going right through and not stopping when signalled.

"Last Friday, at 6.10 p.m., I was waiting at this corner for "Last Friday, at 6.10 p.m., I was waiting at this corner for from 10 to 15 minutes before a car came along that was going down town. There were seven or eight others in the same position. I did not get the number of the first car that would not stop, but the second one was No. 670. The third car came almost to a stop, but as I suppose the conductor saw that there were no ladies to get on this car, he gave the two bells signal while there were still about six of us waiting to get on the car. I took his number and asked him why he did this, but he said he was running his own street car, and did not take any orders from would-be roadmasters. 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



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
