COUNCIL SAYS CAMPERS CAN STAY AT HANLAN'S TILL END OF SEASON

Bylaw Giving Civic Employees Half-Holidays—Cyclorama to Be Leased—City Will Fight Indictments—Coronation Service in Queen's Park—Many Minor Matters.

The campers at Heber's, on the island, Ontario, where they are until Oct. 31 and then less for the season will be issued by the Assessment Commissioner. The decision was reached by the City Council after Controller Loudon and Ald. Burns had indulged in a heated exchange of doubt as to the veracity of each other. The recommendation of the Island Committee was that a new camping site be established and that the present campers be moved to it at once. Ald. Burns said that the proposal was opposed by Ald. Loudon, because there had been a lot of log rolling and wire pulling. He said the campers whom it was desired to remove were a nuisance, and that the present condition of affairs was such as to prevent the removal of the campers from the island, because there had been a lot of log rolling and wire pulling. Elevator Inspection. The request of the Legislation Committee for authority to introduce a bill to provide for the inspection of elevators and the appointment of an inspector was, on the recommendation of the Board of Control, sent back to the committee in order that the city law department may report as to the liability of the corporation in the event of any accident occurring in an elevator which has been reported upon as having been inspected under the bylaw.

Cowan-Ave. Fire Hall. The Board of Control recommended that the report of the Fire Department Committee that the lot on Queen-street adjoining Cowan-avenue fire-hall should be sold to the city law department for a short time to be used for a sufficiently signed petition for an asphalt pavement. Their request was approved.

Only Former Tenants. Ald. Loudon accused Ald. Burns of making statements in regard to the street-cleaning matter. He stated that he had seen the campers left where they are now, and thought that permits should be issued to anyone who applied, but Ald. Burns insisted that only former tenants should be so favored. If the Heber property was unsanitary, it was the fault of the civic authorities who were not doing their duty.

Scrap Iron Assessment. Corporation Counsel Fullerton was empowered to apply to the City Council for leave to appeal against the judgment of the Court of Appeal in the case affecting the scrap iron assessment of the Toronto Railway Co., Bell Telephone Co. and Toronto Electric Light Co.

Many Minor Matters. The City Solicitor was instructed to take immediate action to remove the car tracks on Parliament-street north of Wellesley-street.

Half Holiday for Laborers. The City Engineer was authorized to give all permanent employees of the city a weekly half holiday during the month of June, July, and August, and to give all temporary employees of the city a weekly half holiday during the month of September.

Those Indictments. The indictments which have been prepared against the city by the grand jury, in the case of the coronation orders, are being reviewed by the City Engineer.

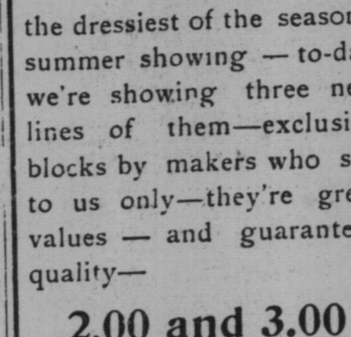
