WRESTLER KILLED IN A BOUT

Osborne Taylor Dead From Injuries Received on the Mat Monday Night.

MANSLAUGHTER WILL BE CHARGED

Toronto Police Arrest a Man Wanted by a Grocer in Hamilton.

Hamilton, Sept. 8.—Today at noon a warrant was sworn out, charging Harry Mays with aggravated assault. Mays is the wrestler who injured Osborne Taylor in what is said to have been a friendly bout last night. When he heard that the police wanted him, he walked into headquarters and gave himself up. He is a young fellow about 25 years of age, and during the night the prisoner will have to face a charge of manslaughter. Those who saw the mishap declare that there was no ill-feeling, and that it was a pure accident. The police claim they have information to the effect that Mays had said that if he ever got the nigger on the mat he would never go on one again, but Mays' friends indignantly deny this. Mays is a tool maker and has been employed by the Westinghouse Air Brake Company. The authorities are determined to get the matter to the bottom, but it is probable that the prisoner will soon be released after the investigation. At a late hour tonight Taylor was on the operating table at the City Hospital, but the doctors could do nothing for him, and he was a market gardener about 32 years of age and unmarried.
